Mr. Jess Gloria is planning to write his Master's paper on the following topic: Pochismo's: Changes in Culture & Language in Mexican-Americans. A look at Mexican-Americans who are in the middle stages of acculturation.

Mr. Thomas Ollenburg is planning to compile an annotated bibliography of available teaching materials which are considered appropriate for inner city high school students as the major part of his Master's paper. The notations will be evaluative.

Mr. Victor Adams, a black student at Harrison High School and a leader of the New Breed, a group demanding the inclusion of black history and more black teachers and administrators, was arrested and imprisoned for a couple of hours and released. We have not been able, at this point, to ascertain the exact nature of his offense. His trial is scheduled for November 1, 1968. All concerned blacks are urged to attend Victor's trial.
