There were over 200 members from the Avondale and Logan Square neighborhoods interested in taking the English as a Second Language (ESL) Workshops at El Centro Campus. All of the new students, approximately 90 of them, took the ESL placement exam in order to participate in one of the three ESL level workshops offered. ESL students are thankkful for this program and their instructor, as they have given positive reviews about their classroom experience and their ESL Workshop Facilitator, Courtney Francis. Courtney Francis is a graduate student in the Teaching English as a Second Language Program at Northeastern Illinois University.

ESL students that have completed all three levels are more confident in their language abilities, both written and verbal. They are also able to communicate better in public, at school with the teachers of their children, and at work. Anyone interested in learning English for free, regardless of their background or skill level, is encouraged to visit El Centro Campus for more information. The only requirements to register for the workshop are to take a placement exam and to have a strong desire to learn. 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

Student Success Story: *Sherry Cornelio*



Sherry Cornelio, a senior, social work, is President of the Alliance for Student Social Workers, and enjoys being a student leader at NEIU. Sherry's poised and confident demeanor suggests that things have always come easily to her in life, but that is not Sherry's story.

One of the biggest challenges of Sherry's life happened at the age of

three, when her family immigrated to the U.S. The family left behind their home country with the idea that things would be better in the U.S. After arriving in Chicago, Sherry attended two different schools, one middle school, and two different high schools. Her family had to move frequently from one neighborhood to another, and during this time she experienced firsthand the diversity of communities that Chicago is known for. Throughout this time she was oblivious to her condition to the fact that she was undocumented. Reality hit her during her junior year of high school when she realized how much she wanted to go to college. Sherry was very self conscious about her immigration status, thinking that she could never attend college, but she had the willingness and determination to succeed and knew that obtaining an education was important in order for her to be successful.



While she never lost the hope of attending college, she began to explore possible alternatives during her senior year of high school. Shortly before graduation, she learned of the Summer Transition Program (STP) at Northeastern's El Centro Campus. She was excited by a program that would accept her regardless of her citizenship status and provide her with a head start on a college degree.

In 2007, Sherry was accepted to STP, and while it was challenging at times, she completed the program with flying colors. Of her experience, Sherry noted, "STP and the staff from El Centro have always been extremely helpful, encouraging, and involved in my education." Through STP, Sherry learned how important education is and the major role that determination would have to play if she were going to reach her goals. Since she was undocumented, her school tuition had to be paid out of pocket, and Sherry did not have the means to pay for it. She decided to take a year off to work and save money for school and to adjust her legal status. In March of 2008, she became a legal permanent resident of the U.S., and immediately re-enrolled at NEIU.

Sherry commented, "If it had not been for STP I probably would have decided to put school off for a couple or many years. STP provided me with the experience I needed to fuel my determination. If there is something I have learned throughout my years of schooling it is that, it takes dedication to do the work, to study, and stay focused even when you do not feel like it. I am so happy that I found that determination, and now I know I'm on the path to success."





Ask Me! Campaign at El Centro Campus

NEIU-El Centro Campus kicked off the ASK ME! Campaign on Saturday, August 25, and continued until Friday, August 31. At the beginning of each semester, El Centro staff and student leaders wear official ASK ME! buttons and display the campaign logo at an information table to welcome first year, transfer, and returning students to El Centro and answer questions. This campaign helps students gather important information including classroom locations, Beck's Bookstore locations, parking information, and general information about NEIU. El Centro ASK ME! representatives received about 100 inquiries each day during the first week of classes and were able to help students.



New Beginnings, New Opportunities

The Summer Transition Program (STP) at El Centro Campus began with a welcome ceremony for students from all NEIU Campuses, on

Monday, July 2 in Alumni Hall on NEIU's main campus. El Centro registered a full cohort of 19 students this fall, each of whom participated in STP this summer. Students were supported with tutoring and workshops to enhance their math, reading comprehension, and writing skills prior to enrolling at NEIU for their first college semester. This year the Summer Transition Program at El Centro included informational tours of NEIU's Main

Campus and the Carruthers Center for Inner City Studies. STP students also participated in civic engagement workshops that provided students with opportunities to learn about work being done in their communities. Some of the students joined the El Centro Serve and Learn Volunteer Program, whose mission is to enhance civic engagement of NEIU students by providing them with experiential opportunities designed to help them grow professionally. The STP El Centro students were provided with a mentor from the GUidance Inspiration and Academic Support (GUIAS) mentoring

program. The mentors, who themselves were once mentees, worked with the new STP students twice a week, about an hour each session. Mentors offered support and shared insights about how to navigate NEIU successfully as new freshmen. Mentors also provide information about university resources, tutoring, and social support, helping the new students plan for how they will reach their educational and personal goals. The STP students also participated

in a retreat featuring team building activities that touched on the importance of time management, networking, and reaching out for help.

A closing ceremony was held on Friday, August 17, in Alumni Hall. All STP students were recognized. This year's STP, like other years has created a lasting network of support and resources that continue to make an impact in the continued success of our students.











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
