Nominated by the April/1976 graduating class and elected by all 1975 graduates, Dr. Thompson became the fourth recipient of this annual award which emphasizes outstanding teaching as well as service to Northeastern.

A special award was also presented to Mr. Ron Wendell, assistant to the vice president of student affairs and former director of financial aid. Mr. Wendell was recognized for his dedication, understanding and tireless efforts that have helped many students at UNI.

### UNI PARTICIPATES IN MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Three UNI students distinguished themselves and brought recognition to the university last spring while representing Syria at the National Model United Nations (NMUN) held in New York City. Sandra Scher (business major), Michael Sossin and Audrey Litvinsky (biology major), were sponsored by the forensics program and spent several months preparing for the conference. While many nations, as a courtesy, provide mission briefings for delegates to the NMUN, few extend the hospitality accorded Northeastern's delegates. Syrian Ambassador, Mr. Mowaffak Allaf, presented the briefing along with his human rights expert, Mr. Taher Al-Hussamy and his economics expert Mr. Mazin Zwayne.

Later the Ambassador invited the UNI delegates to a dinner-reception commemorating the National Day of Independence of the Syrian Arab Republic. At the reception, Sandy,

Michael and Audrey had an opportunity to talk with U. N. Secretary-General, Kurt Waldheim and Zehdi Labib Terzi, permanent observer of the Palestine Liberation Organization to the U. N.

Michael and Audrey are also veterans of the Harvard National Model United Nations Conference, where Northeastern represented the Soviet Union. Audrey was selected as one of the outstanding delegates at the meeting.

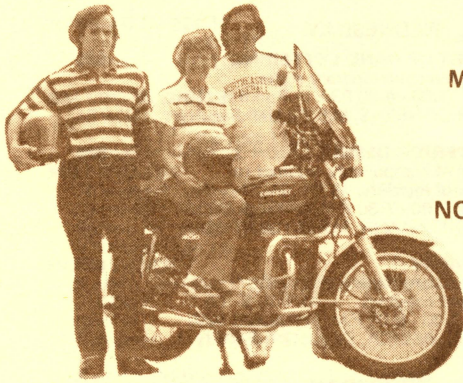

**MOTORCYCLE  
SAFETY  
COMES TO  
NORTHEASTERN**

Filled classes and happy students are typical of the Motorcycle Rider Courses offered at Northeastern. Through the work of Marjorie Jennings, an alumna and a faculty member of the physical education department, UNI was awarded a grant by the Department of Transportation, Division of Traffic Safety, to coordinate a motorcycle safety education program for Cook County.

This pilot program is available on a state-wide basis and offers the first opportunity for Illinois residents to learn motorcycle safety. The course is designed to provide at least eleven hours of classroom instruction and eleven hours of behind-the-handlebars riding instruction. Motorcycles and helmets are provided and classes are **free**. Anyone who has a drivers license or permit may register for the course.

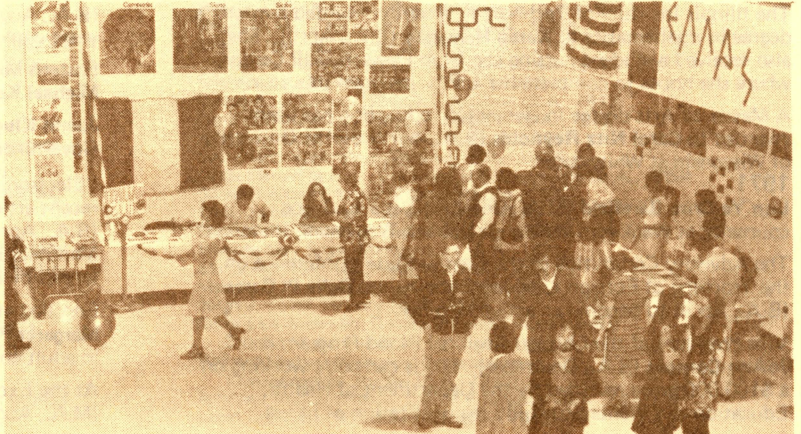
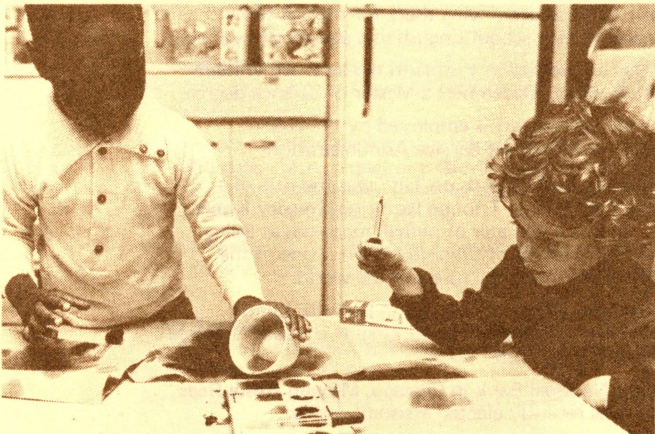
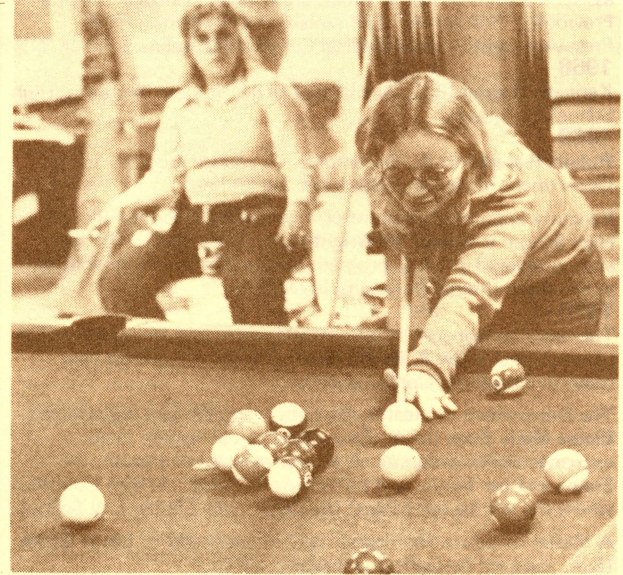
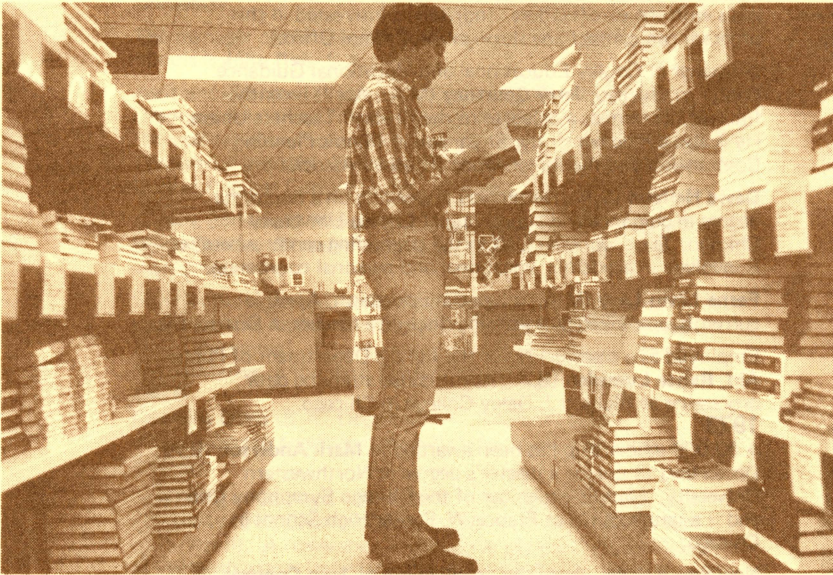
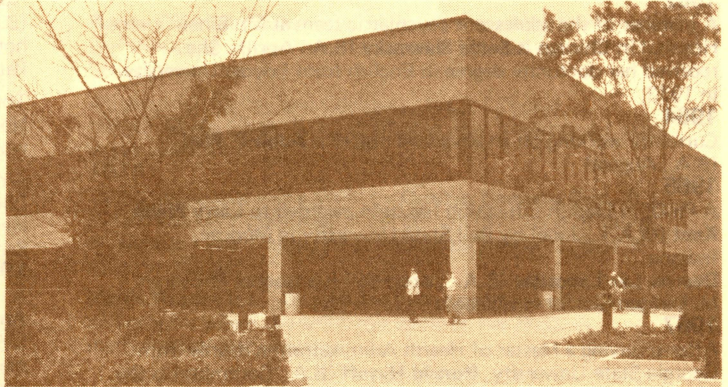
The focal point of student life on campus begins at the Commuter Center, Northeastern's student union. The new facility, completed in 1976 and located east of the gym, was paid for through a student union fee assessed to all students since the 1960's. In addition to the new building, extensive remodeling has been done to the old cafeteria and mezzanine to provide additional space for student activities.

The Commuter Center provides a wide range of services to meet many of the daily needs of the university community. Among these are: the bookstore (Book Nook) which sells new and used text books, the Service Desk, the Cafeteria which seats approximately 450, and the Food Service Vending Program. In addition, there is the Game Room, the Typing Room and the Coin-Operated Copy Service. A very special service is the

Day Care/Kindergarten program for over 100 children of students, staff, faculty and alumni. The Commuter Center also provides office space and work space for major student organizations as well as various sized meeting rooms for all campus groups.

Alumni Hall, named in honor of all alumni, especially those who paid a commuter center fee before the new center was built, is the largest and most flexible of the meeting rooms. It is well equipped to handle a wide range of special events, including on campus registration, dances, large receptions, banquets, antique shows, etc.

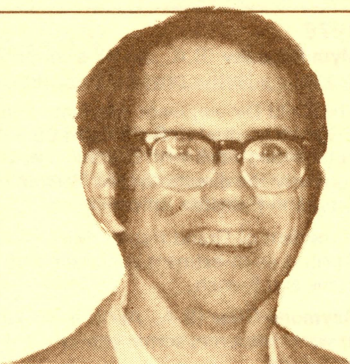

### NEW MASTER'S PROGRAM IN SPECIAL EDUCATION

In order to meet the growing need for teachers of young handicapped children, Northeastern is now offering a master's degree program to train individuals to work with special education, pre-school children. Funded in part by a Federal Assistance Grant from the U. S. Office of Education, this program is designed to prepare teachers to identify, diagnose and teach young handicapped children.

Once accepted by the Graduate College, a student can earn a master's degree in special education in one of three areas: mental retardation, learning disabilities, or behavioral disorders. It is possible to earn certification in more than one area. This program fulfills the present State of Illinois requirements in early childhood education.

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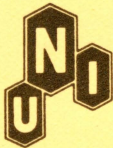
### "WE WANT YOUR BLOOD"

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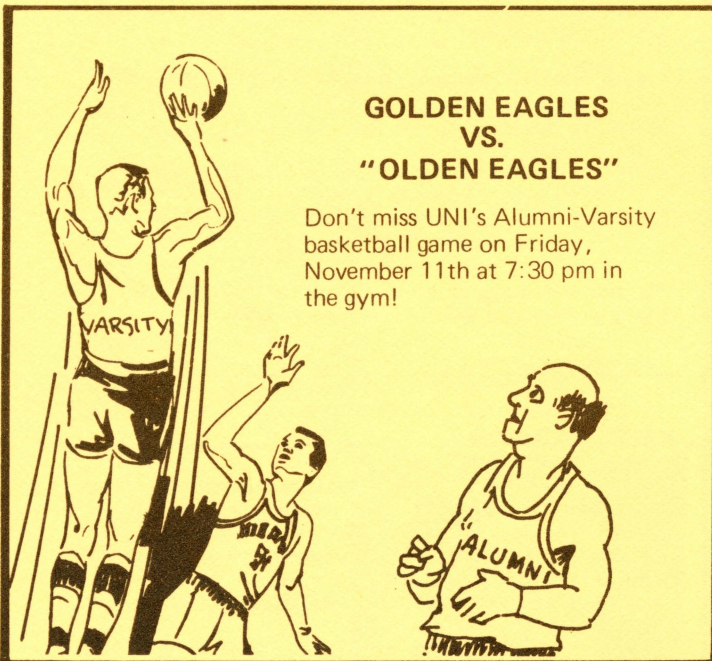
