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

RULES COLLIDE - MANY AUTHORS RENAMED

If you are used to looking in library card catalogs for books on the University of Chicago under CHICAGO. UNIVERSITY, you may need to look elsewhere. And forget about looking under COLOMBO, CRISTOFORO because COLUMBUS, CHRISTOPHER will be the new heading. These and hundreds of others are being renamed by libraries around the world.

What's going on? The answer is that the library community adopted a new cataloging code in January, abandoning a much-maligned and somewhat capricious earlier one. In essence, libraries are now assigning author headings as they generally appear on titlepages, regardless of any variation with the person's real name.

Pseudonymns such as TWAIN, MARK will be favored. Similarly, VIRGIL will replace VERGILIUS MARO, PUBLIUS, while ARISTOTLES becomes ARISTOTLE. A bit more surprising is that COPENHAGEN. UNIVERSITY will be listed under KØBENHAVNS UNIVERSITET. The reason: most publications (and title-pages) of that institution appear in Danish.

But what about all those millions of catalog cards under the older, now obselete, names? Won't they conflict with the revised headings? Libraries are addressing the problem in various ways. For example, the Library of Congress chose to "freeze" its old catalog and is beginning an entirely new catalog for all current cataloging. This catalog will be consistent with the new rules and will not attempt to relate to the previous catalog. That means that users will often have to search both catalogs under different headings.

However, most libraries, including UNI's, will continue their present catalogs with updating headings and thereby hoping to resolve conflicts between old and new rules. Appropriate reference cards are being used to link the variant headings to each other. At worst, this is a temporary inconvenience soon to be abated by automated catalogs.

NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY LIBRARY DISPLAY POLICY

Northeastern Illinois University is an urban community campus. Within this setting the University Library plays several vital roles. It is the center of learning resources, communicator of information, and the facilitator and enhancer of knowledge. Displays are the visual representations of the Library's active and creative role in university life. It is in this spirit that the Library makes its facilities available for exhibits to the University as an added source of information and enjoyment.

A. Who may display:

Display facilities are available to members of the university community.

B. Criteria for displays:

- 1. Materials to be displayed should reflect:
 - (a) the intellectual, artistic, or recreational commitments, needs, and demands of the university community
 - (b) the activities of campus organizations MODING
 - (c) community interest
 - (d) personal achievement
- The quality of the materials displayed should be compatible with the standards and goals of Northeastern Illinois University and the University Library. In case of questions experts in the particular area will be consulted in the decision-making process.

C. Procedures:

Requests for displays should be addressed to the University Library Administration Office.

D. Liability:

All reasonable efforts will be made to preserve and to protect materials displayed in the Library. Since the University does not carry insurance on displayed items, the Library cannot assume responsibility for theft, breakage, or vandalism.

It is an inherent right in a free society that free ideas are freely expressed. The University Library supports this premise and makes its facilities available for exhibits on a wide variety of subjects. The ideas promoted in any given display are not necessarily endorsed by the University or the Library.

USE OF THE LIBRARY CLASSROOM

The Library Classroom is available for library-related instruction only. Reservation for the Classroom must be made in the Library Office, where the room schedule is maintained. If AV materials are required for the class meeting, arrangements should be made with the respective department in Learning Services or the Educational Reference Department on the third floor of the Library. No refreshments may be served in the Classroom, unless prior arrangements have been made with the Library Administration. The University policy on selling and serving food and alcoholic beverages governs also all Library facilities.

OVERDUE BOOKS

The most overdue book taken out by a known borrower was a book on febrile diseases (London, 1805, by Dr. J. Currie) checked out in 1823 from the University of Cincinnati Medical Library and reported returned Dec. 7, 1968, by the borrower's great-grandson Richard Dodd. The fine was calculated as \$2,264, but waived.

KURZWEIL READING MACHINES (KRM)

Through the Kurzweil Reading Machines, the resources of the Chicago Public Library are now available to the blind and visually handicapped. These machines convert printed materials into spoken English. Users will need to make appointments for training sessions of the KRM. Each session lasts about two hours, and most people need about three to five before gaining sufficient proficiency in the use of the machines. Appointments for training sessions can be made by calling 269-2975. KRM's are located at the Cultural Center and the Temporary Central Library. Both the training sessions and the use of the machines is free of charge.

FOREIGN NEWSPAPER HOLDINGS

The Center for Research Libraries, 5712 Cottage Grove, Chicago 60637, recently acquired rather extensive collections of newspapers on microfilm. Titles are both domestic and foreign. UNI is a member of the Center, and its resources are available to us.
