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

The President Returns to the Classroom

As a rule, college presidents aren't classroom teachers. Dr. Jerome Sachs is an exception, because he has taught at least one course a year ever since coming to Northeastern as Academic Dean in 1961. Last trimester it was "Mathematical Concepts," as it is most times, but once it was a graduate course, "The History of Mathematics".

"I think most college presidents would like to teach," says Dr. Sachs, "but they just don't do it. I find teaching relaxing; it gives me the contact with students I think I need."

Before coming to Northeastern, Dr. Sachs had taught in most of the universities in Chicago--Northwestern, University of Chicago, Illinois Tech, and DePaul. Asked if today's students were much different from those he taught then, he replied, "There have been no basic changes. I do think students are much more knowledgeable now; they have much more basic background information."

Dr. Sachs said he hoped his students soon forgot that the President was their teach-

er. "When I found out the President was teaching the course, I thought it was going to be a real challenge," says Edwin Claudio, one of the students. "It turned out to be one of the best math courses I've had in a long, long time. No one dropped the course: no one was bored."

Asked if there was anything he didn't like about his teaching experience, President Sachs said, "I didn't like the text. . . but then I don't like my own anymore, either."

SYMPOSIUM PLANNED

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ALUMNI EXPRESS...

Northeastern has changed its name so many times that I'm really confused. Can you provide a little of the school's history?

We'll try. Follow closely . . .
In 1949, a branch of Chicago Teachers
College (now Chicago State University)
was opened at Shers High School to accommodate those students living north
of Madison Street. This was subsequently closed in 1957 when three other
northern branches were opened--Foreman,
Crane, and Sabin.

In 1961, a permanent branch of Chicago Teachers College was opened at St. Louis and Bryn Mawr Avenues, the site of Northeastern today, and the Sabin, Crane, and Foreman branches were dissolved. The new Chicago Teachers College-North became Illinois Teachers

College North when the institution came under the control of the Board of Governors in 1965. Then in 1967 the institution became known as Northeastern Illinois State College, which it remained until 1971 when the school finally became Northeastern Illinois University.

The name-change "vexation" is not unique to Northeastern. Many public institutions have undergone similar changes as their enrollments increased and the scopes of their programs expanded.

NORTHEASTERN **ACQUIRES** VIRGIN PRAIRIE

Northeastern Illinois University and the Illinois Nature Conservancy recently received a gift of approximately 50 acres of virgin grassland. The land was do-nated by Louis, David, and Myer Gensburg, all former Chicago real estate dealers, and constitutes half of a 100 acre tract of virgin prairie located within the city limits of Markham twenty miles south of the Loop. Northeastern and the Nature Conservancy are trying to raise money to purchase the remaining 50 acres and have applied for a grant of \$200,000 from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation.

Other than the five-acre Peacock Prairie in Glenview, the Gensburg-Markham Prairie (as it has come to be known) constitutes the only remaining example of the lacustrine plain on which Chicago was built. Dr. Robert Betz of the Northeastern faculty, who was instrumental in the acquisition of the land for the University, has identified more than 155 varieties of plant life and several species of animal life on the prairie which are otherwise nearly extinct in the Chicago area.

Northeastern Illinois University is committed to preserving this tract of land in its natural state for this and future generations. As such, the Markham Prairie is foreseen as an area for study by students of all levels, by garden clubs and conservation groups, and by research scientists in the comparision of the qualities of soil and wildlife in its natural state to that which has been treated with fertilizers and chemical sprays. This tract of land has already provided the seeds of many species of prairie plants used to reestablish the prairie at the Morton Arboretum. The Markham area will be opened to the public at specified times for general appreciation of its natural beauty.



Outstanding **Educators Award** to Dr. Pedrosa

Dr. Angelina Pedrosa, assistant professor of Spanish at Northeastern Illinois University, Bryn Mawr at St. Louis Ave., has been selected one of the Outstanding Educators of America for 1971. Dr. Pedrosa, a native of Cuba, was an attorney before coming to the United States.

Dr. Pedrosa accepted the award "in the name of my students and colleagues, who have helped me in my development as a teacher."

The outstanding educator award is given "in recognition of contributions to the advancement of higher education and service to the community."

Dr. Pedrosa's biography and the record of her accomplishments is recorded in the 1971 edition of "Outstanding Educators of America."
