# OFFICE OF CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

#### CO-CURRICULAR

A program of student clubs and organizations, under the direction of the office of Co-curricular Activities and the Students Activities Council, is supported and encouraged at Northeastern Illinois University to insure the well-rounded education of all students. These organizations are professionally and service-oriented. They often are of great social value to the University and the Community as well as the individual student.

Students desiring to form new clubs to meet special interests and needs should apply to Dean Zimmerman, (Room E-218) and follow the procedures for new clubs.

### STUDENT ACTIVITIES COUNCIL

The clubs on campus are represented in the governing 2 body of the university community by the Student Acti-

vities Council. The Student Activities Council is composed of one elected member from each recognized chartered club and the Dean of Women. The following are the responsibilities of the Council:

... to promote an Activity Festival in Fall;

... to set the criteria for Honors Convocation in Spring;

... to choose active students for honorary positions in the university community, (ex. nomination and election of Student Marshals for Graduation).

... to elect two Committee members (who are not Student Senators) to the Student Fees & Allocation Committee;

... to elect two members to serve on the Commencement Committee;

... to elect four members to serve as an Honors Convocation Committee; ... to elect two members to Homecoming Committee;

...to act as a governing board under the Student Affairs Council and Student Senate for the Co-curricular Activities on campus.

### ACTIVITY FESTIVAL Chairman

#### Room E-222

Once a year in the early fall the Student Activity Council sponsors an Activity Festival. All clubs on campus have the opportunity at this Festival to talk to new students and to solicit new members.

This Festival gives new students a chance to have an overview of all club activities on campus before deciding on joining one of the activities.

#### SERVICES AVAILABLE TO CLUBS

A. OFFICIAL BULLETIN BOARDS are: the black bulletin boards on either side of the Auditorium; one designated board in the "A" and "B" buildings; one on the Main Floor of the Science Building outside Dean

\*SEE HONORS CONVOCATION

Hudson's Office; the Housing and Commuter Center Activity Boards outside E-128 (the old Placement Office): the Faculty Bulletin Board in the east Cafeteria; the Job Opportunity Board for Students on the South Mezzanine above the Cafeteria: the Civil Service Board near the Information Booth; and the Placement Office Board for Graduates on the Library south wall.

Campus Clubs or Organizations may have two large posters (not to exceed 28" x 21" or four small posters (not to exceed 14" x 21") on the boards for any one week. All materials, notices, forms, etc., which you wish displayed, must have authorized signature on the reverse side and must be stamped in the Activities Office, Room E-218, before being posted in one of the official spaces on the Bulletin Boards. Off-Campus Activity posters are limited to one 28" x 21" or two 14" x 21". All materials will be removed after one week.

All stamped posters will be posted on Official Bulletin Boards by the Activities Office. Official Bulletin Boards and the Carrels will be checked by the Co-curricular Staff and obsolete materials will be removed nightly. Indicate a date on any undated material so it may be removed after a reasonable time, (flyers, usually one week; posters, one to two weeks, "for sale" notices; etc., usually 30 days.) Banners should rarely be up for more than a few days.

#### B. FREE BULLETIN BOARDS

Free walls are the east brick walls diagonally across from D-104 and D-113. Posters on these walls must be affixed with masking tape only.

#### C. STUDY CARREL BULLETIN BOARDS

Materials posted by clubs on top of other materials on Carrel Boards will be destroyed. Clubs may post one copy of duplicated material on every other Carrel after 5 presentinig one copy (for their files) to the Activity Office, E-218.

Your cooperation in following these rules and regulations will facilitate finding notices quickly, save time for all concerned, and through order insure more practical, democratic procedures for the entire University Community.

#### **D. DUPLICATING**

Clubs may have free student duplicating service after they submit a master copy to the Office of Co-curricular Activities in Room E-218.

#### E. MEETING ROOMS

All clubs are allocated special rooms for their club activities during the activity hours, 1:00 Tuesday and 1:00 Thursday, through the Office of Co-curricular Activities (Room E-218).

Clubs meeting weekly are assigned a room for the trimester. Clubs meeting irregularly will be assigned rooms as they require them.

Clubs in need of campus space at other than activity hours may secure space from the Information Center after filling out the proper request forms in the Cocurricular Activities Office (Room E-218).

#### F. P. A. SYSTEM POLICY

The P.A. System is to be used for emergency announcements only. These emergency announcements should concern the health or safety of college community groups rather than individuals.

The microphone and key for the P.A. System will be located in the Security Office. Requests for announcements should be forwarded by the responsible Vice President to the Vice President for Administrative Affairs. The Security Office will be contacted to make announcements by the Administrative Affairs Office.

#### G. HONORS CONVOCATION

Every spring an Honors Convocation, giving recognition to students who have maintained a high level of scholastic excellence and to those who have shown outstanding effort in leadership and service to the University Community, is held on our campus. The following criteria were used for awarding the students the Honor Certificates in April, 1972:

1. students who are currently enrolled in their 6th, 7th, or 8th trimester, who have a cumulative grade point average of 4.5 or better, who have been on the Dean's Honor List with a 4.0 above for two or more trimesters, and who have not previously been honored at an Honors Convocation;

2. students who have shown outstanding leadership and service to the University, who are in their 6th, 7th, or 8th trimester, who have not previously been honored, who have been nominated by a Student Advisory Committee and/or the Dean of Women for consideration of an award by the Honors Convocation Committee, who have met the minimum requirements of fifteen activity points and who are in good academic standing.

#### H. ACTIVITY POINTS

Any special project that students of a club have done for the University and/or the Community for which they did not receive renumeration should be noted and sent to the Student Activities Office to be placed in the student's Activity Record file.

Files should be brought up to date, as service is rendered, so that members of a club who are nominated for Honors Convocation will have correct records when their names are scanned. It will be too late to record events at the last moment to the Honors Convocation Committee, so notify the Students Activities Office Room E-218 as soon as the service is performed. dividue and or (and many or violation of the second of the second of the first of the second of the

#### STUDENT SENATE

The Student Senate is the legislative body of the Student Community. It is composed of twenty-five Senators plus four Officers. Thirteen senators are elected during the fall trimester. Twelve senators are elected during the winter trimester. The four officers are elected in a special election held during the winter trimester.

In order to run for senator, a student must not be on academic probation. He must also have a petition signed by twenty-five students. This petition must be presented to Election Officials before he can start campaigning.

Among its responsibilities, the Student Senate fills student vacancies on several committees including Student Fees and Allocations and Student Affairs.

The purpose of the Student Senate is to protect the rights and responsibilities of the students here at Northeastern.

- Step I Secure administration approval for the activity or program you propose (This and the date must be cleared through the office of the Dean of Women, E-218, and entered on the Activities Calendar).
- Step II Pick up the proper space requisition form from the Secretary to the Dean of Women, or the Secretary for Commuter Center.
- Step III Clear the use of facilities for the event with the following people before the date is made final:

- A. The Director of the Commuter Center E-220 If the "A" or "B" Lounges, E-128, or the Commuter Center including the various dining halls, is the space desired.
- B. The Superintendent of the Physical Plant G-148 so that necessary arrangement for custodial staff and/or facilities may be arranged (ex. tables and chairs). This is especially necessary if the event will be outside of normal school operating hours and/or outside Commuter Center space.
- C. The Head of the Security Force J-101 so that necessary security arrangements for the program will be made. This, too, is especially necessary if the event is scheduled outside the normal University hours.
- D. 1. The Learning Services Staff, E-110, for

use of any electronic equipment, microphones, tape recorders, etc.

- 2. The Audio-Visual Services, E-050, for films, screen projector, or Operator.
- 3. Graphic Arts Staff, E-055, for art work for posters or program.
- E. The Commuter Center Secretary, E-220, if refreshments are to be purchased.

F. The Director of University Communications if:

- 1. outside publicity is desired-3525 Peterson.
- 2. or posters or printed materials are to be prepared, E-049.
- G. The Student Activities Office, E-218, will supply dittoes, duplicating and mailing as well as special party equipment such as tablecloths, napkins and serving pieces.

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
