Welcome to the eighth issue of **ComMuniTy**, the official newsletter of the Department of Communication, Media and Theatre (CMT) at NEIU. **ComMuniTy** allows us to maintain contact with CMT alumni, inform alumni and current students about the CMT program, and celebrate our successes as students, alumni, faculty, and as a department.

CMT is the 7th most popular major at NEIU. CMT has consistently been in the top ten majors since 2010. We owe this distinction to the interest and enthusiasm of our students, as well as the talent and dedication of our faculty and staff.

CMT continues to excel with student and faculty research and creative activities. In 2017, Ann Hartdegen participated in the Faculty Research and Creative Activities Symposium and Nancy McVittie had her book Fade to Gray: Aging in American Cinema published by the University of Texas Press. Professor Edie Rubinowitz and two of her journalism students, Maria Xoy and Jason Merel, presented at the Illinois Humanities People-Powered Publishing Conference with a panel titled "Educational Impasse: Teaching and Learning Storytelling When You Are the Story." In 2017 and 2018, four CMT students-Laura Wagner, Samantha Sepulveda, Liz Varmecky, and Elise Taylor each presented at the NEIU Annual Student Research and Creative Activities Symposium. Edie Rubinowitz attended the Solutions Journalism Academy Conference in Portland, Oregon and also published a book review in Electronic News Journal. Sarah Fabian had her scenic design work featured at Chicagoland theaters and had great reviews by the Chicago Tribune among others. Matthew Sage created the sound design and played guitar in Pope.L.'s "The Escape" at the Art Institute of Chicago. Leslie Hull participated in a gallery installation titled "Outcry" by Whitney Bradshaw at DePaul University Museum.

Our faculty have also been recognized with several awards recently. John Bliss and Kate Kane each received an Excellence Award for Teaching. Lizz Otto-Cramer was awarded a semester-long Educational Leave, and four CMT faculty members were awarded "Senior Instructor" status: John Ross, Dan Wirth, Kate Kane, and Bob Ritsema. Sarah Fabian received a Faculty Excellence Award for Research and Creative Activities and both Bob Ritsema and Dan Wirth received Instructor Excellence Awards. Sarah Fabian was also recognized by her alma mater Hope College with the "10 Under 10 Award," which honors emerging leaders in their field.

There have been noteworthy changes to CMT faculty lately. Our former Department Chair, **Katrina Bell-Jordan** moved from Associate Dean to Acting Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Nanette Potee retired after 18 years at NEIU, and Tony Adams moved to a position as the Chair of the Communication department at Bradley University. Wilfredo Alvarez moved to a position at Southern Connecticut State University. In 2018, we also welcomed a new tenure-track faculty member in theatre: Adam Goldstein. Adam's areas of expertise are in performance and directing, and we are excited to have him join the CMT faculty. We have also welcomed Leslie Hull and Matthew Sage as new instructors in the department. We have plans to hire new Communication faculty members in upcoming years.

There are changes in our office staff as well. Linda Leyva retired in December 2017, and Peter Goldman and Jeff Wade are now our CMT Office Administrators.

Thanks to **Edie Rubinowitz**, NEIU and the CMT Department have received a \$35,000 grant from the Online News Association to produce the "DACAmentation Project," a series of podcast episodes on Dreamers. These will be produced by DACA students and recent alumni, and the episodes will air on Spanish Public Radio (an international online radio station with headquarters in Chicago).

Our successful partnership with the **Chicago Film Society** continues. We celebrated our eleventh season of screening 35mm prints of classic and rare films in the NEIU Auditorium. We have also created a new course, CMTM 390: NEIU Cinémathèque, where students attend these film screenings and learn about the materiality of analog film archives, preservation, and restoration.

Sarah Fabian has secured NEIU as the host of the 2019 Chicago Youth TheatreFest where over 200 middle and high school CPS students will come to campus to compete, attend workshops, and network with theatre programs.

IN MEMORIUM - DR. BERNARD BROMMEL

Dr. Bernard J. Brommel, Professor Emeritus of Communication at Northeastern Illinois University, died September 22 at his home in Kalamazoo, Michigan. He was 88 years old.

Dr. Brommel taught at Northeastern Illinois University (NEIU) for 28 years and in retirement became one of the institution's most generous donors. Dr. Brommel was born in 1930 in St. Marys, Iowa, south of Des Moines, one of nine children who grew up on the family farm.

He earned his Ph.D. from Indiana University in Communication, with a minor in Education and Theatre, and later earned a Master of Science from Northeastern Illinois University in Counseling and Family Therapy, and a post-doctorate degree from Northwestern.

His important early research focused on American labor movements, and he published an award-winning biography of Eugene Debs. He was a foundational scholar in the discipline of family communication and co-authored the textbook *Family Communication: Cohesion and Change*, which continues to be used today. He was a counselor and worked in private practice in individual and family therapy for 25 years. As a teacher, scholar, and philanthropist, Dr. Brommel shaped NEIU and the field of family communication. NCA named the Bernard J. Brommel Award for Outstanding Scholarship or Distinguished Service in Family Communication after him.

He is survived by his partner of more than 20 years, Carl Ratner, as well as his children Michaela, Brian, Debra, Brent, Brad and Blair.

There were two fall semester main stage productions: Kenneth Lonergan's *This is Our Youth*, directed by **John Bliss**, and Nilaja Sun's *No Child*, directed by **Mary Kroeck**. In the spring semester we produced Howard Korder's *Episode 26* directed by **Dan Wirth** and Jose Rivera's *Marisol* directed by **Adam Goldstein**.

Our Children's Theatre Workshop also had an exciting 2017-2018 with **Ann Hartdegen** directing two shows for local elementary, middle, and high schools. In fall 2017 it was *Faces of Freedom* written by Cynthia Mercati, and spring 2018 was *Silk Road Stories* based on tales by 13th century Persian poets Rumi, Saadi, and Attar.

This year's 2018-2019 season will kick off this fall with Bertolt Brecht's *Antigone* directed by **John Bliss**, followed by the rock musical *High Fidelity* written by Amanda Green, Tom Kitt, and David Lindsay-Abaire and directed by **Adam Goldstein**.
