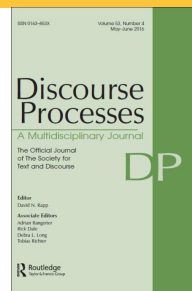
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SPRING IS HERE

Congratulations to Dr. Church for her study "Unpacking the Gestures of Chemistry Learners: What the Hands Tell Us About Correct and Incorrect Conceptions of Stereochemistry" being published in Discourse Processes! This study focuses on an individual's use of gestures when explaining a topic, in this case stereoisomers of molecules, whereby Dr. Church and her colleagues identified nine strategies that participant's utilized during those explanations. These strategies were measured and the amount of relevant strategies expressed in gestures only were found to be a precursor to that individual's ability to improve through training. What led you to major in psychology?

I have been interested in psychology for as long as I can remember. I lost a father-figure to suicide when I was only 14 years old. He had undiagnosed mental health struggles and I knew that I wanted to help people after losing him. I started out in nursing, but then changed my major to psychology and have never been happier.

What was/were your favorite class(es) while at Northeastern?

This is a tough one. There were so many amazing classes because I had amazing instructors. Dr. Dykema-Engblade helped me understand statistics, and I even use some of her creative teaching in my own psychology class that I teach. Gregory Jackson was an incredible instructor as well and I loved every political science class I took with him because he was not only understanding, but he really knew the material. Dr. Merchant was amazing, too. Even though he spoke super fast, he really knew how to connect with his students and help us all understand the topics.

What have you been doing since graduating?

I have been quite busy since graduation! I have had 3 children who are now 2, almost 5, and almost 7! I attended The Chicago School of Professional Psychology and graduated with an M.A. in Clinical Psychology with an addictions specialization and a Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor certificate in 2015. I recently passed my National Clinical Mental Health Counseling Exam (NCMHCE) and am finally a fully Licensed Clinical Professional Counselor. I am currently working on opening my own private practice in the far Northwestern suburbs. In addition to providing psychotherapy, I have also worked as an Adjunct Professor for 3 years at CLC. I have always had a passion for school and enjoy teaching.

What is your fondest memory of attending Northeastern?

What is a piece of advice you would give to undergraduates?



Keep pursuing your dreams and they will come true. It took me a long time to complete college because of life circumstances but I never gave up. Also, do not be afraid to ask for help because you don't know what you don't know!

What led you to major in psychology?

From a young age, I always knew that understanding the mind and related disorders intrigued me. After completing my undergraduate education at NEIU, I figured out that the autism population is the area I would further my education in, but NEIU fully equipped me for that path!

What was/were your favorite class(es) while at Northeastern?

As weird as it sounds, Capstone and the Lab classes were probably my favorite because it pushed us to do research and apply all our skills. Despite these classes being challenging, they taught me the most and I still use the three term contingency (ABC) that Professor Christopher Merchant taught me in Capstone every day in my current career as a RBT/future BCBA!

What have you been doing since graduating?

Since graduating, I entered the field of my dreams — Applied Behavior Analysis. I began graduate school at Capella University in December 2019 and I will be graduating with my masters in ABA in March 2021! Going to NEIU helped me get to this place and I couldn't have done it without them. Right now, I am a Registered Behavior Technician and I hope to sit for my Board Certified Behavior Analyst exam this year to become a Behavior Analyst that develops treatment plans for children on the autism spectrum!

What is your fondest memory of attending Northeastern?

My fondest memories of attending NEIU from 2016 through 2018 are the teaches that came to the university center in Lake County to teach all their students. They always pushed to get us involved at the main campus and the symposium definitely was the best memory of doing that.

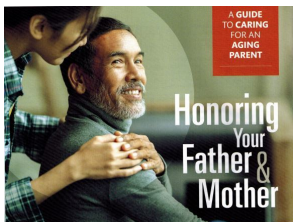
