DR. VIVIAN L. FULLER

Athletic Director

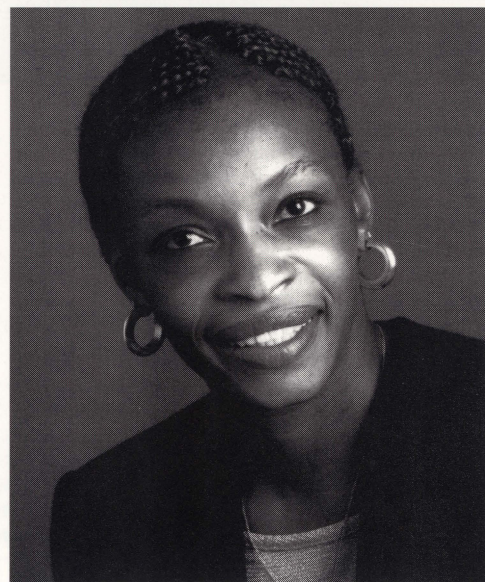
Now in her fourth year as the Golden Eagles Athletic Director, Dr. Vivian Fuller has the Northeastern Illinois program in its second year of Mid-Continent Conference play in 1995-96. A top goal of the Athletic Department has been to secure conference membership and the fit is a good one in the Mid-Continent for the sixth-year NCAA Division I program. The building process of a competitive program in both men's and women's athletics is a tough task that Dr. Fuller tackles with her tireless work ethic. Adding women's golf and men's soccer in 1993 has the Golden Eagle program with 14 varsity sports competing for championship honors in the Mid-Continent Conference.

Fuller was hired at Northeastern in the fall of 1992, coming to Chicago following five years (1987-92) as associate director of athletics at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, an NCAA Division II program. Fuller was directly responsible for the internal operations of the athletic program, involving supervising non-revenue sports, fund-raising, advising and academic programs, career planning for student-athletes and professional development seminars for high-risk student athletes.

Dr. Fuller is also the chairperson for the National Youth Sports Programs (NYSP). Under the auspices of the NCAA, the NYSP helped sponsor programs on college campuses for economically disadvantaged youth. Dr. Fuller is a member of the NCAA Gender Equity Task Force studying equity opportunities for student athletes in Division I, II and III. Over the past seven years Dr. Fuller has made over 20 national, regional and local presentations on athletic administration, minorities and women in athletics and higher education. Last fall she was named to the NCAA Council, an appointment through 1998.

Dr. Fuller received her doctorate in higher education administration from Iowa State University in 1985. She earned her master of education degree in 1978 from the University of Idaho. She graduated from Fayetteville State University in 1977 with a bachelor of science degree in health, physical education and recreation.

A veteran administrator, Fuller served as an assistant director of athletics at North Carolina A&T University (1984-87). She worked also as an acting women's AD, women's volleyball coach, an assistant professor and assistant AD for advisement and director of intramurals at AT&T (1980-82) before attending graduate school at Iowa State.

The race for quality has no finish line, and since the inception of the Mid-Continent Conference in 1982 (formerly the Association of Mid-Continent Universities or AMCU), the league has continued to enhance its

intercollegiate athletic stance, while continuing a tradition of ethics and integrity.

The Mid-Continent Conference was formed when eight Midwestern Universities joined together as a new NCAA Division I Conference for men's athletics. Representing six states, AMCU-8 members included Cleveland State University, Eastern Illinois, University of Illinois of Chicago, University of Northern Iowa, Southwest Missouri State University, Valparaiso University, Western Illinois University and the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay. In addition to basketball, the AMCU-8 sponsored eight other sports including soccer, baseball, cross country, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, golf and tennis.

One of the goals of this newly formed league was to secure automatic qualification into the NCAA Division I basketball tournament. The objective was finally reached in 1987. The Mid-Continent Conference first made its presence known in the college basketball world in 1986. After posting a 27-3 record, Cleveland State received an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament and promptly upset Indiana in the first round. The Viking eventually advanced to the Sweet 16 before failing to All-American David Robinson and Navy by one point. That same year, Southwest Missouri State advanced to the quarter-finals of the National Invitational Tournament. For the first time in 1990, three Mid-Con teams advanced to postseason play. Northern Iowa shocked formerly number one ranked Missouri in the first round of the NCAA, and then took Minnesota to the wire before losing by three. In the Midwest Regional, Southwest Missouri State took on North Carolina and lost a heartbreaker, 70-83. And in their first NIT appearance a lasting impression of Mid-Con basketball loomed as Wisconsin-Green Bay made the most of their presence by beating Southern Illinois in the first round of the tournament.

The 1992-93 season marked an additional milestone for the Mid-Continent Conference. After a decade as a men's athletic conference, the Mid-Con became both a men's and women's athletic conference. With the addition of the former North Star Conference, the Mid-Con sponsored 13 championship sports including volleyball, cross country (M & W), swimming and diving (M & W), basketball (M & W), golf, tennis (M & W), softball and baseball. Conference membership also changed as Northern Illinois was admitted in 1989, Wright

State and Youngstown State in 1991, and Wisconsin-Milwaukee in 1992.

Mid-Con women's athletics made a definite impact on the Conference's continuing record of success during their first year of membership. In 1992, Northern Illinois was invited to the Southeast Regional at Purdue University where the Huskies took the LA Tech and defeated the Lady Techsters 77-71 in overtime. In the second round, NIU fell to the Boilermakers, 62-98. Once again in 1993, Northern Illinois received an automatic bid to the NCAA Regional and lost a disappointing 74-76 to the Lady Tigers of Georgetown. In the spring of 1995, Western Illinois captured the Mid-Con Championship and automatically qualified for the NCAA Tournament. The NCAA berth was the first in school annals, as WIU posted an overall record of 17-11 and Mid-Con mark of 14-4. The Westerners were seeded 14th in the West Regional and took a third seeded North Carolina in Chapel Hill. But the defending National Champion, UNC defeated Western Illinois 48-89.

The Mid-Con is comprised of 10 well-established Universities: University at Buffalo, Central Connecticut State University, Chicago State University, Eastern Illinois University, University of Missouri-Kansas City, Northeastern Illinois University, Troy State University, Valparaiso State University. With a current enrollment of more than 153,000 students, Mid-Con schools draw students from all 50 states and over 100 foreign countries. Diverse academic programs are offered at the Mid-Con institutions with literally hundreds of degree-granting programs. The Mid-Continent Conference currently boasts schools from seven states; Alabama, Connecticut, Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, New York and Ohio.

To date the Mid-Con currently sponsors 17 championship sports. For men, the Mid-Con sponsors basketball, baseball, soccer, swimming, golf, indoor and outdoor track, tennis and cross country. Equally competitive is the women's sports program, which includes championships in basketball, softball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis and cross country.

Throughout its existence the Mid-Con has continually strived towards an ambitious marketing program, generating increased exposure and revenues through a variety of marketing and promotional programs. In 1988 a television package with SportsChannel was developed for the telecast of Mid-Con basketball games on a regular basis for the first time on league history. Since that time, the Mid-Continent Conference, SportsChannel and Prime Sports have joined forces to broadcast Mid-Con events to fans across the nation, including coverage of both men's and women's basketball.

Northeastern Illinois University Head Women's Basketball Coach Denise Taylor

Coach Taylor has lofty expectations for her 1995-96 Golden Eagle basketball team. The third-year NEIU head coach is looking for a Mid-Continent Conference championship and an NCAA bid. "We have high goals this season and we are working from day one with our minds focused on winning the Mid-Continent Conference championship," said Coach Taylor in early September.

For the second time in her coaching career, Coach "T" has turned a losing program into a winning one. The Golden Eagles improvement under Taylor in 1993-94 completed one of the top turnarounds in the NCAA Division I ranks with NEIU's 15-13 season coming off a 5-23 record in 1992-93. The Northeastern Illinois women's program was 9-19, 2-25, 2-25, 1-26 and 0-23 the previous five seasons before Taylor's arrival in Chicago in 1993.

Rebuilding a program is nothing new to Coach "T" as her last coaching stop at American International College in Springfield, Massachusetts saw her turn the AIC program into winners in only two seasons. Before Taylor's arrival at AIC, the women totaled only 17 wins in the three previous seasons. Denise led AIC to a 32-23 overall record in two years including the 1992-93 team which set nine new school records and compiled an 18-11 record to finish third in the Northeast-10 Conference (highest finish ever in school history).

Denise, a 1980 graduate of East Side High School in Cleveland, Mississippi played college basketball at Texas-Southern University. She was the eighth all-time leading scorer and the fifth all-time rebounder and top ten on the TSU assists and steals career charts. Taylor was a four-year letterwinner and basketball team captain for the Lady Tigers. She earned her bachelor's degree from TSU and later coached and earned a master's degree at Texas-Southern in 1989.

Prior to her first head coaching job at American International College, Taylor was an assistant coach at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas and was part of LU's 29-4 NCAA "Elite Eight" team which defeated LSU, Texas and Arkansas before losing to eventual NCAA runner-up Virginia in the regional finals. Denise is the daughter of Mamie Taylor of Cleveland, Mississippi.

Coach "T" has worked as a clinician at basketball camps across the country, including Pete Newell's NBA "Big Man Camp" in Hawaii.

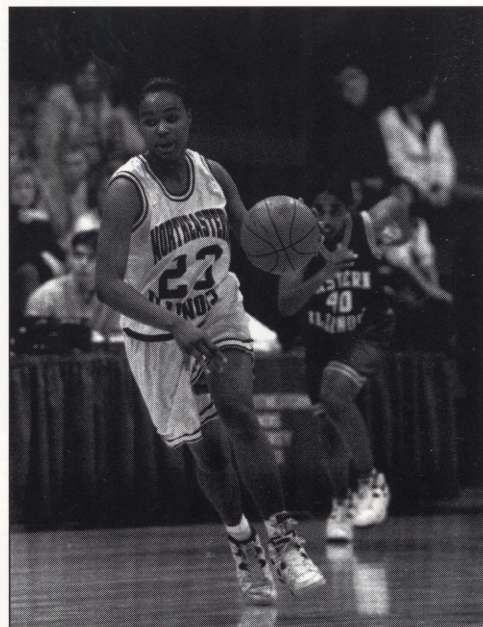


"Taylor Made" Golden Eagles shoot for Mid-Continent Conference championship and NCAA Tournament Bid.

Northeastern Illinois' top returning scorer and rebounder Delores Jones (6-1, So. C) leads the Golden Eagles into the 1995-96 season. Jones, an all-Mid-Continent Conference second team selection last year, averaged 13.3 points/9.3 rebs and a league-leading/10th in NCAA 2.7 blocks per game last season.

Two-time scoring leader Jeannie Hinkey will not play her senior season at NEIU to pursue academics....Hinkey's scoring load (16.7) will be filled by a host of newcomers as Head Coach Denise Taylor signed seven new players for 1995-96. Heading the list of newcomers is former Long Beach State walk-on player Rayjanette Lampkin (5-9, Jr. F) from Carson, California and Renee Gates (6-0, F-C, Sr.) from Chicago Luther North High School.

Cat-quick junior point guard Clentana Dawkins set new NEIU steals records in 1994-95 and was 10th in the NCAA stats with 3.9 steals/game. Dawkins also led the Golden Eagles in assists (5.6) to rank among the Mid-Con/NCAA leaders. Sophomore forward Heather Farquharson had an outstanding freshman season averaging 10.8 points and 6.9 rebounds starting 16 games last year for the Golden Eagles.

Tough Schedule/Possible Host of Mid-Continent Conference Tournament

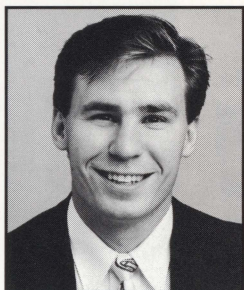
A challenging schedule includes road games at DePaul, Akron, Ball State and the University of Houston Holiday Tournament in late December before opening Mid-Con league play January 4 at Valparaiso. NEIU will play 12 home games including the Mid-Con women's TV Game of the Week January 6 vs. Troy State University at the PE Complex. The 1996 Mid-Continent Conference Women's Tournament will be hosted by the school who leads the league standings as of February 13. "It's our goal to win the Mid-Continent Conference Tournament and hosting the post-season tournament here at Northeastern Illinois would be great," said NEIU Coach Denise Taylor. "We want to be leading the league standings in February and be the tournament host."



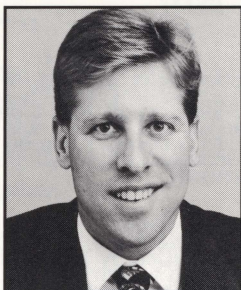

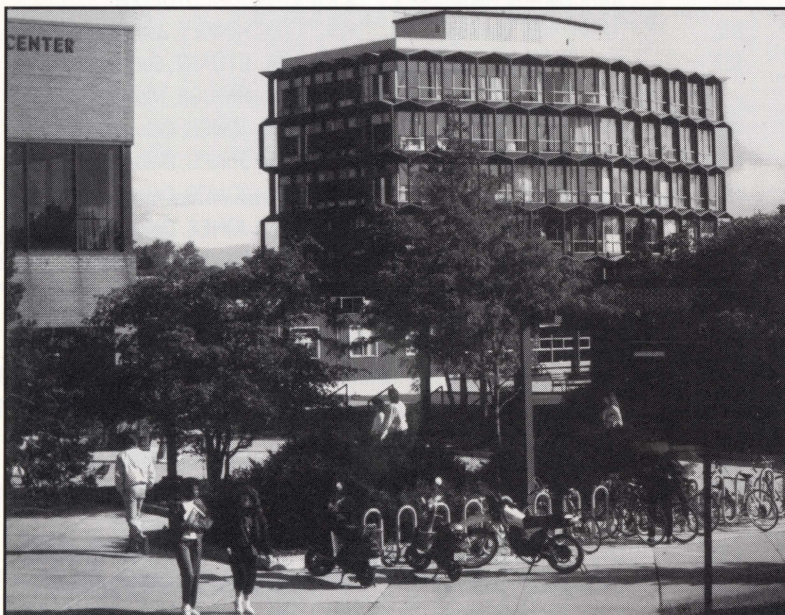
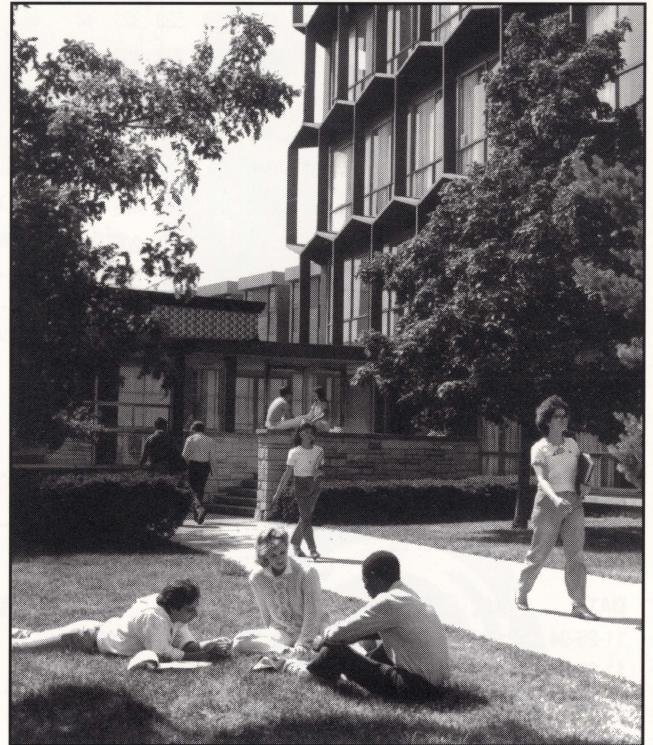
NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY

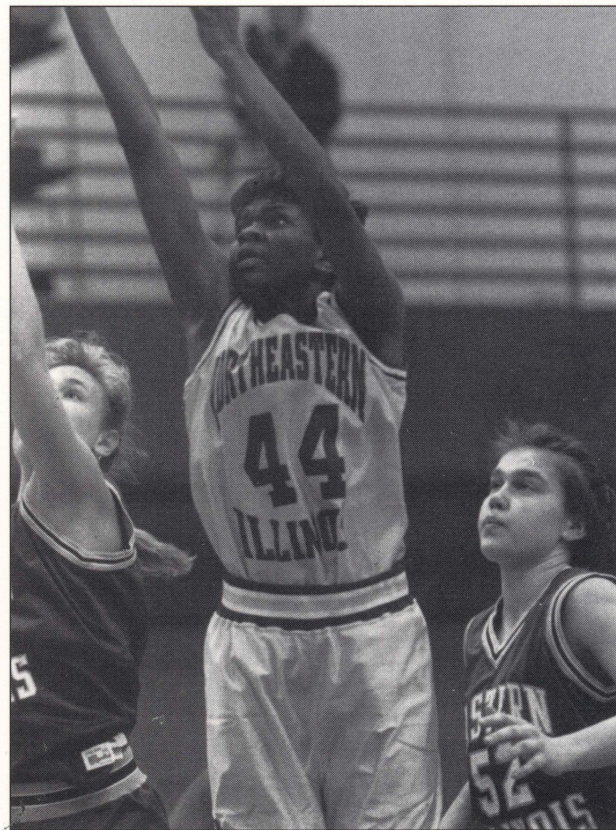
Northeastern serves as an affordable educational and cultural resource for the northern metropolitan Chicago area, fulfilling an important role in Illinois higher education.
