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CAMPUS TODAY


Have you been on campus lately? If you have, you may have noticed that the campus has changed considerably during the last few years. This is due to the addition of two new buildings on campus: The Science Building and the Classroom Building.

No longer do students have all their classes in the good ol' A and B wings. Instead, Northeastern has taken on the looks of a campus with students going to the various buildings for their classes.

June 2, 1971 marks the day that the ground was broken for the Science Building which is located on the southeast side of the campus on St. Louis Avenue. Classes started there during the Spring 1972 trimester. This 3-story building was officially dedicated on October 2, 1972.

The Science Building houses the departments of Biology, Chemistry, Earth Science, Economics, Environmental Studies, Geography, Mathematics, Psychology, and Physics.

The University received an award from the Chicago Lighting Institute for interior lighting in the building on March 15.

CLASSROOM BUILDING

Ground was broken for the Classroom Building on January 4, 1971. This 4-story building is located on Bryn Mawr Avenue, east of the parking lot. Classes started there during the Winter 1973 trimester. The building was officially dedicated on April 2, 1973.

This building is the home of the College of Arts and Sciences and houses the departments of Anthropology, Computer Science, English, Foreign Language, History, Linguistics, Political Science, and Sociology. It is also the home of the College of Education and the departments of Early Childhood Education, Educational Foundations, Elementary Education, Secondary Education, Special Education, and Student The Graduate College is also Teaching. located here. The offices of Instructional Media, Reading, Educational Assistance, Business and Purchasing can be found here.

FACULTY

Dr. Victor Dufour is on campus an average of fifty to sixty hours per week. While in his office, one gets the feeling that he is not a department head who hides behind paperwork. A steady stream of students walk in to ask questions, say "hello", and to borrow books. The Psychology Department library is located in his office so that he can keep in touch with students and offer them advice in their research.

Dr. Dufour has several basic theories concerning college life; the main premise being that schools should be geared more completely to students' learning; after all, a school's end product is what it has done for its students. He believes a curriculum should be guided by the students, for the students.

Dr. Dufour's time is spent on student related work ---- clubs, new programs, curriculum, and, of course, teaching.

He is actively involved as a consultant to the Parapsychology Club, a lively group whose members pursue their inter-ests in the science of learning about and studying psychic phenomena. He is also the campus advisor to Psi Chi, the National Honor Society in Psychology.

In addition to his long hours as head of the Psychology Department, Dr. Dufour is involved in a Free School for children which focuses on student interest centered methods of teaching young children.

Despite his busy schedule, Dr. Dufour strives to maintain an "open door"

What are Catholic theologians saying? This course will investigate the currents of thought among Catholic theologians both in this country and in Europe. The discussion will center on the major shifts in emphasis in Roman Catholic doctrinal explanations that have taken place in the past five years. Discussion topics are as follows:

> May 1 ----Can the Church's teaching change? May 8 ----How about Papal infallibility? May 15 --- Who is Jesus Christ? May 22 --- Have we forgotten Original Sin? May 29 --- What morality did Jesus teach? June 5 --- How should we explain the Eucharist?

This course is open to all interested parties and does fulfill the theology course requirement of the Catholic School Board for teachers in Catholic Schools. Instructing the course will be Reverend John R. Price, M.A., UNI Campus Catholic Minister. Fee for the course is \$10.00.

You will be awarded a certificate of accomplishment on completion of the requirements of any one of the following Mini 'U' offerings: ASTROLOGY: AN IN-DEPTH LOOK; ASTROLOGY: AN INTRODUCTORY COURSE; NUMEROLOGY: AN INTRODUCTORY COURSE. There will be no required materials for you to purchase and no required out-ofclass assignments for these three courses. The instructor for each of these classes will be Maryann Gall (August '64, August '66). The registration fee is \$10 per course; however, if you wish to register for both ASTROLOGY: AN IN-DEPTH LOOK and NUMEROLOGY: AN INTRODUCTORY COURSE at the same time, the fee is ---- no longer \$10 per course or a total of \$20 --- but instead BOTH COURSES FOR ONLY \$16.

(hereinafter referred to as GTA) and cooperating agents act only in the capacity of agents for the passenger in all matters pertaining to hotel accommodations, sightseeing,tours and transportation whether by railroad, motor bus, motor car, steamship, plane and any other means of conveyance, and as such they shall not be liable for any loss or damage to baggage or property or for any injury, personal injury, death, accident, delay or irregularity which may be occasioned either by reason of any defect in any vehicle, accommodation or through the acts, omissions or default of any company or person engaged in conveying or housing or otherwise servicing the passenger, or in carrying out the arrangements of the tour(s). GTA reserves the right with or without notice to make changes in transportation or lodging as GTA determines to be necessary.

No notice of cancellation shall be valid unless forwarded to GTA by certified mail, return receipt requested. 
No refunds will be made for unused tour services, ie., transportation or lodging.




ALUMNI NEWS
