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Senior Art Majors Get Help to Launch Their Careers

In the catalog, Art 392: Senior Project is described as "Portfolio preparation in a chosen field; exhibition of selected works." Its teacher, Jane Weintraub, Associate Professor of Art, calls it "a class I would have wanted as a senior."

The most significant thing about Senior Project, of course, are the student art exhibits—seniors' projects—in the library every spring. (This spring's schedule of exhibits appears at the end of the article.) "Senior Project," says Weintraub, "has traditionally been a class where graduating art majors learned about what life after school was going to be like, and the culmination of the class was putting up a one-person exhibition."

"What I added when I took over the course about seven years ago was a career module. Each year I look at the make-up of the class to see what the students' areas of interest are and then bring in appropriate career (continued on page 2)

(NEIU Art Majors, continued from page 1) people--about five each term--to talk to them. The speakers have included a photo stylist, a modelmaker, a scene painter, computer graphics people, and we've been to Channel 5 to see their computer graphics setup."

The topics covered in Senior Project include the setting of professional goals, how to mat and frame pieces, resume and cover letter preparation, portfolio preparation, exhibition opportunities, publicity, grant writing, applying for shows, packing and shipping art—"the nuts and bolts of being an artist."

Not many schools have this kind of class, Weintraub points out, "though more and more of them are adding it to their curriculum."

The class is offered once a year and enrollment runs 8-10 students, "though I've had up to 20," says Weintraub. Each student has a week-long exhibit, usually held in the library. "I have a few students who also show at the Northeastern Gallery in the Commuter Center.

"We are interested in making our students marketable, and our students are more and more interested in being marketable."
