She recalled the many late nights during her college years when she balanced both her laptop and her infant daughter on her knees as she completed assignments.

Lynda concluded her commencement address with: "Years ago, standing at a crossroads, a decision had to be made on the path that I would take. In choosing to travel this road I accepted that there would be challenges, I acknowledged that there would be good times and bad-but most importantly, I promised myself that if indeed this was the road that I wanted to travel, then I would finish the course."

Graduate School Visits

During the month of July, McNair Scholars visited graduate programs at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), Loyola University, and DePaul University. The purpose of the visits was to introduce Scholars to faculty and provide insight regarding the application process at each institution. At UIC, the Scholars met with Dr. Aixa Alfonso, Associate Professor of Biological Sciences and Visiting Associate Dean of the Graduate College. Recruitment Coordinator Francisco Piña organized the visit which included conversations with Edward Potts, Director of Admissions and Financial Aid in the UIC Jane Addams School of Social Work. and NEIU McNair alumnus Keith Atterberry, Ph.D. student in Criminal Justice, along with other UIC Ph.D. students.

When the Scholars visited Lovola University's Graduate School, they met with Marcela Gallegos, Events and Outreach Coordinator, followed by individual meetings with faculty from academic departments of the Scholars' interests. At the conclusion of the visit, McNair Program Director Dr. Kim Sanborn provided a tour of the Ralph Arnold Art Annex, which houses sculpture, ceramics and dance studios. Dr. Sanborn, an instructor in the Loyola University Fine Arts Department, showed Scholars Loyola's state of the art kiln room and gave a brief overview of ceramics technology.

At DePaul University, Scholars toured the campus, attended presentations about the application process, and had individual meetings with faculty and graduate students in their disciplines.

TRIO NEWS

Congress introduced its final agreement for the FY 2012 appropriations, which includes a \$13.4 million increase for TRIO over last year's appropriation (\$826.5 million), for a total funding level of \$839.9 million. Congress did not fully embrace the \$920.1 million (8%) increase recommended by President Obama. However, this bill will provide funding for approximately 40 Upward Bound and McNair programs that otherwise would have been lost next year. President Obama made TRIO a priority in his fiscal 2012 budget request, and recently both Republicans and Democrats recognized this fact. Their actions also suggest that federal policymakers---as a consequence of increasing numbers of low-income and first generation students enrolling in college--- are beginning to appreciate the importance and necessity of "supportive services in postsecondary education. There is, for example, mounting evidence, especially from work being completed by the Pell Institute, that supportive services are essential if our colleges and universities are to improve the graduation rates of low-income students, particularly those from minority backgrounds. The Council for Opportunity in Education acknowledged the strong support of allies in the House of Representatives, who fought hard to achieve increased funding.
