What is your counseling experience?

It's hard to pinpoint my first experience with "counseling." My dad is a psychiatrist, and I have been exposed to ideas and conversations around mental health for as long as I can remember. I had always planned on eventually working in one of the helping professions, but it was a bit of a game of occupational Pong to figure that out. To make a long story short, I ultimately decided to take the leap to leave a potential career as a Secondary Ed teacher to go back to school (yet again) to pursue a degree in Mental Health Counseling with a certificate in Marriage and Family Therapy. Since then, I've worked in multiple community counseling clinics and private practices and also held an internship position at an in-patient hospital setting.

As a kid, what did you want to be when you grew up?

If we discount the nonsensical stuff of being a ninja turtle or a G.I. Joe, I think the first profession I ever wanted to pursue - and approached with seriousness - was a Ghostbuster.

Professor Spotlight

How long have you been at Northeastern and what do you do here?

I started teaching at NEIU in the fall semester of 2016. I have taught a wide array of classes in that brief span of time - ranging from the general and introductory courses (e.g., COUN 402, COUN 403) to the more specialized and advanced classes, especially for the family counseling program (e.g., COUN 431, COUN 432). Aside from teaching, I work towards producing one or two publications per year, and my research tends to align with subjects related to instrument development, sexuality, or empathy. In the last year or two, I've been working to help students get their research and ideas published as well and then to present that research at the state level. I'm also on several departmental, college, and university committees at NEIU.

What is one thing you wished you would have known before becoming a counselor?

Nothing is categorical, so give it up. Experience exists on a spectrum.

What's your favorite karaoke song to sing?

I don't think I've ever sung karaoke! But, if you remember those old "Rock Band" games, I happily did a terrible job singing anything 90's grunge. Kurt Cobain is my middle name.

If you were a superhero, what superpower would you want?

I have had lifelong discussions around this question and wish it amounted to one powerful and concise answer that I could deliver here. Truthfully, I would probably capitalize on the opportunity to gain a superpower but would not use it to become a superhero. Stan Lee says, "Great power comes with great responsibility," and, yeah, I get that. But, if I could just fly around quickly and easily, I think I'd really enjoy that. At this point in my life, that's all I want. Anything else can get really morally questionable.

What advice would you offer to new students in the NEIU counseling program?

You will never again have access to the resources available to you here and now to hone your counseling skills, to examine your worldview and life experiences, or to develop your understanding of yourself or others in the world. So, embrace it. It can be easy to wish you were at the next step already, but if you rush the process, you might be surprised to find yourself wishing you could go back and carve out some space for yourself to read articles, to ask questions, and even to watch videos of yourself counseling! Be where you are.
