

# A Construction Filled Summer

Summer finds the Northeastern campus busy with construction projects **in addition** to the Fine Arts Center. We are so accustomed to the construction of the Fine Arts building that we may forget that it will be ready for classes in January 1999. The **other** projects happen to be more under foot and consist of renovations in and around the Commuter Center and the installation of new water mains.

## The South Corridor Gets Hammered

The South Corridor--the hallway that extends west from the Village Square, past the bookstore, the Auditorium and the Fine Arts construction, to the vestibule doors that lead to the parking lots--will continue to be closed for construction for the summer. The reason is the replacement of the fire alarm system in the South Corridor ceilings, which involves the removal of asbestoscontaining material. All entries to this area are sealed off to protect university personnel from the asbestos abatement procedures.

In addition to the new fire safety devices, the hallway lighting system and floor tile will be replaced. By the end of summer the South Corridor will be reopened. Then, the same construction activity will be repeated in the North Cor-

## **Big Changes for Commuter Center**


Though the university community will once again walk in the South Corridor, a favorite destination, the Commuter Center, will be off-limits. . .for a **year**, due -you guessed it -- to construction. Now in its final phase, Phase III (Phases I and II saw renovation of all restrooms, exterior improvements, creation of a new student reading lounge, and upgrading the Village Square area) will complete the *(Continued on page 2)*

Commuter Center project. Improvements include new ceilings, finishes and lighting, a new visually open stairway, a remodeled cafeteria, conversion of the Heritage Room into a multi-purpose room, and new lounge seating. The Golden Eagles Room and Alumni Hall (the latter will serve also as a temporary dining facility) are not part of this project.

# **New Water Mains**

Construction of a new water main began in May under the old B Drive and parking lot D, continued south through lots E and F, and in June will continue through lot G and join the existing water main at the southwest corner of the Library.

The phasing of this project is intended to minimize disruption. In particular, the extent of open trenching will be minimized: each day the contractor will dig trench, install new pipe, and then cover the excavation. Thus, traffic flow and available parking will change daily.

Also involved in this project is the construction of three new underground water meter vaults, which will affect traffic on St. Louis and Bryn Mawr Avenues.

#### **Getting to Looking Good**

The bottom line is that the core of the campus is undergoing major construction activity this year. The work has been scheduled, however, to minimize overall inconvenience to the campus community. Please proceed with caution around all construction areas. Be careful but also be patient **and** optimistic. The place is getting to look better and better.

**Next year** the construction projects include the Auditorium renovation, land-scaping outside the Commuter Center, and converting the old B Drive into an attractive University Commons. At least this work will be less under foot.
