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McNAIR SCHOLAR DELIVERS COMMENCEMENT ADDRESS

At the December 15th, 2013 graduation ceremony, McNair Scholar **Sean Dotson (11)** delivered the commencement speech to NEIU graduates, family members, faculty and staff. Sean, who that day received his bachelors degree in English, described his humble beginnings as a young man trapped in a myriad of dead-end jobs, forced to utilize his gifts of voice and creativity to amuse himself and pass the time by writing gas station "out of order" signs in haiku and reading Walt Whitman passages to his pizza delivery customers.

Those gifts would lead him down a path to the English Department at NEIU, where he found a community of peers he now considers "family." Sean spoke of the impact that had on him, including the staff and mentors of the McNair Scholars Program, who he described as "remarkable and invaluable."

On February 15th, 2014 at the LS-AMP Spring Symposium in Tinely Park, Illinois, **Yesenia Herrera (11)** and **Patricia Jaimes (11)** delivered presentations to over 300 undergraduate and graduate students on behalf of the McNair Scholars Program. Yesenia presented her research *Isotopic and Chemical Variability of CaCO₃ Microfacies in Early to Middle Triassic Limestones* while her fellow classmate, Patricia, presented *The Effects of Urbanization on the Geomorphology, Habitat and Hydrology in the Chicago Area*.

Funded by the National Science Foundation, LS-AMP is a support program focused on minority students who major in Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science and Math with the idea of enhances the recruitment, retention, and graduation rates of students in STEM disciplines. LS-AMP concluded that evening with a closing award ceremony honoring outstanding examples in STEM disciplines.

McNAIR PRESENTATIONS AT OSU

On February 19th, 2014, the OSU Research Symposium and Scholar Conference, held at Oklahoma State University, hosted scholars **Patricia Jaimes (11)**, **Antonio Villasenor (11)**, **Ricardo Rivera (11)**, **Samuel Aguirre (11)** and **Yesenia Herrera. (11)** They presented their work to other undergraduate scholars from around the nation as well as OSU undergraduates and faculty. Those presentations contributed to the annual conference in tandem with similar student research in McNair or other scholars programs. The conference featured over 900 students from over 17 states and 40 different universities, providing a platform for the students to present their work.

The scholars also had the opportunity the do a campus tour and meet with faculty to receive first-hand info regarding the graduate school programs offered by this institution.

SCHOLARS RECEIVES FELLOSHIPS

McNair Scholar **Elizabeth Rodriguez (5)** received the prestigious Presidential Fellowship, awarded by Northwestern Illinois University. Elizabeth was chosen for her “outstanding intellectual and creative ability to play an active part in the life of the Society of Fellows.” She also received The Woodrow Wilson Dissertation Fellowship in Women’s Studies, awarded on behalf of the Woodrow Wilson Foundation, which intends to cultivate “original and significant research about women.” This fellowship has been awarded in the past to presidents, distinguished faculty members, artists and novelists. Notably, many of those have gone on to win the Pulitzer Prize, MacArthur Fellows, and Guggenheim Fellows. Elizabeth is currently finishing her Ph.D. program in English at Northwestern University.

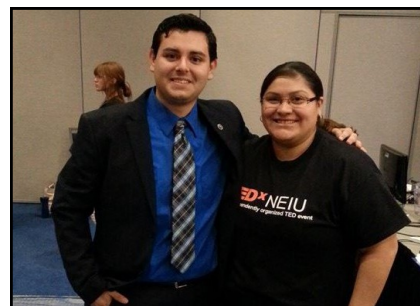

SCHOLAR PRESENTS AT TEDx TALK

On March 7th, 2014, at Northeastern Illinois University, TEDx hosted a local conference where **Samuel Aguirre (11)** presented his research titled *Bilingualism and Multilingualism in Today’s Global Era*. “...it is time for U.S. to embrace multilingualism,” Sam said. His TEDx Talk compared the status of the U.S. to that of other nations around the world in regard to the inclusion and acceptance of linguistically diverse populations.

TED, a nonprofit devoted to spreading ideas in the form of short, powerful talks, created TEDx, in order to bring together programs which feature local, self-organized events that bring people together. Scholar **Antonio Villaseñor (11)** and his mentor Dr. Siobhan B. Cooke attended the 83rd annual meeting of the American Association of Physical Anthropologists this past April 8th in Calgary, Alberta Canada.

Antonio presented his research “Palate shape and diet in Homo sapiens” which hypothesized that there are differences between the palate shapes of non-agricultural human populations who subsist on coarser foods, and that hunter-gathers have palates that are wider and shallower than agricultural populations as a result of greater masticatory forces placed on the palate both during growth and development, and throughout the lifetime of the individual. Antonio has been praised by evaluators and peers for his work and hopes to further explore this topic.

On December 13th, 2013, Loyola University Chicago Loyola Health Sciences Division welcomed SCSE Students **Emily Rendleman, Robert Fidis, Giovanni Montetto and Kevin Gallagher** in a graduate school visit organized by scholar **James Hopkins**. After learning about biomedical sciences graduate programs from **Dr. Leanne Cribbs**, Director of Graduate Programs, NEIU students visited professors at the Neuroscience, Microbiology & Immunology and Biochemistry departments. Further, following a tour of the campus, the students had lunch with **Dr. Richard H. Kennedy**, Associate Dean of the health sciences Graduate School, and **Michael Misale** and **Andy Kilianski** both graduate students who shared their experiences at Loyola. To end the visit, the students attended the Microbiology & Immunology department "Friday Meeting" a research critique session in which students present their lab projects, and receive feedback from their peers and professors. **Angela Vidal-Rodriguez** accompanied the NEIU students on this visit.
