ALUMNI HIGHLIGHT: KAREN BASURTO, BA'19



1. What are you doing now?

I am preparing to start my graduate training as a clinical psychology PhD student at Rosalind Franklin University under the guidance of Dr. Racheal Ellison! I have been a bilingual neuropsychology psychometrist for the past few years and I have developed a niche understanding of culturally appropriate measures for Hispanic/Latino populations in Neuropsychology.

2. What are your responsibilities?

As a psychometrist, I ensure the collection of data from standardized measures of cognitive abilities for the diagnosis of a wide range of neurocognitive disorders. My responsibilities include the administration of tests, scoring, and recording of cognitive and behavioral performance per patient. As a bilingual psychometrist,

I have additional responsibilities to ensure proper care. I facilitate communication between English speaking clinicians with Spanish speaking patients by translating and interpreting between them. I administer standardized measures in both English and Spanish, while providing additional services wherever needed within the clinic and hospital (i.e., pre-surgical procedures, inpatient care, etc.).

3. How did NEIU prepare you for your professional journey?

NEIU's psychology department trained me for my professional journey by providing the necessary foundation of what it means to practice psychology at its core. NEIU hosted two distinct research assistantships that provided me with a sense of what to expect when conducting research and data interpretation, both qualitatively and quantitatively. The core stats classes provided core knowledge that assisted me when conducting analyses for conference presentations and development of manuscripts. The professors provided me networking opportunities that eventually lead me to be a strong candidate for graduate programs clinical psychology.

4. What advice would you give to undergraduate students?

My advice for undergraduate students would be to take a moment to find a passion and then take advantage of it. Take advantage of NEIU for all its worth! I had a genuine transition from a "complete assignment for a degree" mindset to pursuing and developing a passion for what I truly find interesting, clinical psychology. At the beginning of my academic career, I was simply a student completing the next step requirements from a community college. I had no clear idea on what I found interesting. Once I attended NEIU, I found people who genuinely loved learning and teaching psychology, which sparked a true interest in the field for me, which lead to a focused intent for my goals and aspirations. With the support of fellow students, professors, and the psychology department, I was able to adequately prepare for my next goal, graduate school.



PSYCHOLOGY FUN FACT


