PSYCHOLOGY "GREATS" GATHER HERE FOR COLLOQUIM JUNE 25-27

Many of the 'greats' in psychology or their relatives will be on campus this Friday and Saturday for the International Colloquim in History of Psychology to be held here and at the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel, June 25 - 27. The occasion is the formation of an international museum of psychology at NISC.

Dr. Rafi Khan, chairman of the department of psychology, said the colloquim and the museum are both part of a new concept in the teaching of psychology, the historical approach.

The first and the most recent intelligence testing will be represented by the granddaughters of Alfred Binet, the originator of the intelligence test, and Dr. David Wechsler, author of the most recent tests. Geraldine and Georgette Binet will reminisce about their grandfather. Wechsler will speak about 'Relation between Ability and Intelligence', following a dinner at the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel in the evening of June 27.

Also on the program of the colloquim is Dr. G. Ferdiere, Parisian neuro-psychiatrist, who will illustrate his lecture on "Creative Alienation" with paintings of mental patients. The paintings are not only from his own collection but also from Belgium, St. Anne's hospital, Paris, and from the United States.

Dr. Michael Wertheimer, executive officer of the American Psychology Association, will reminisce about his father, Max

Wertheimer, originator of gestalt psychology.

Dr. Harry Harlow, director of the primate laboratory, University of Wisconsin, will give two lectures.

Dr. David Bakan, president of the philosophical psychology section of the American Association of Psychology, will speak about the "Social Context of Psychology." Dr. Rubel Lucero, originator of psychodrama, will give a demonstration.

Registration for the colloquim will be held, 8 a. m. - 3 p. m., June 25 and 26, outside the auditorium. The registration fee is \$2.50 for general attendance, \$1.50 for students. The 7 p. m. dinner at the Sheraton-Blackstone Hotel is \$9.75 a person. Reservations can be made at the registration desk.

Girls who are VERY fat--60 percent above average weight for their height as teen agers--are twice as likely to develop diabetes as girls who are standard weight.

This is one finding of a study involving 85,000 obese women members of TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly).

A massive outbreak of polio, diptheria, and measles will sweep the country if steps to immunize are not taken immediately--so says the Center for Disease Control, Atlanta, Georgia. The triple threat is forecast because of a breakdown in vacinating pre-school age youngsters.

In Cook County, only two positive cases of rabies have been reported each year since 1954 and these were in skunks and rats. No rabid dogs reported in 15 years.

CAREER COUNSELOR

Interested in teaching where the city is your classroom? Then the Chicago Public High Schools for Metropolitan Studies may be the place for you!

June 22, 1971 at 10:00 a.m. in the Placement Office, Richard Johnson of the Urban Research Corporation (the private research organization which planned METRO) will speak with applicants who are interested in teaching in a 'high school without walls.' Interviews are by appointment only. For a more detailed description of METRO High School, the curriculum, the student attitudes and problems, stop in the Placement Office.

Four teachers are needed: one high school math, one high school physical science, one counseling and one combination of everything in art, such as industrial arts, some background of drafting, drawing, making models, etc. Any teacher hired must be one who can lend his or her background to a very flexible situation. Teachers who are selected by the project are then hired thru the Chicago Public Schools and receive the regular Chicago salary. A 4-week workshop with full salary will start July 5, 1971. Teachers selected need not have previous experience, but must have the qualifications required by the Chicago Board of Education.

Mitrovic wins decathalon

Milan Mitrovic took first place in the mens' intramural decathlon. In doing so, he broke the school record for the standing broad jump by jumping 10 feet 2 inches.
