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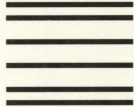

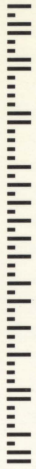

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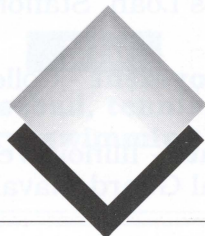
## Freshman Admission

### **Requirements**

1. Graduation from an accredited high school or passing grade on the General Education Development Test (GED).
2. ACT composite score of 19 or SAT score of 750 are required for all incoming freshmen unless they are 21 years of age or older.
3. Admission is based on high school rank in class and supporting ACT or SAT scores.
4. Beginning with the **Fall 1993** graduating class, the following high school subjects must be completed:
  - 4 years of college preparatory English
  - 3 years of college preparatory Social Science
  - 3 years of college preparatory Mathematics (Including Computer Programming)
  - 3 years of college preparatory Natural Science
  - 2 years of a combination of fine arts, foreign languages, or vocational education (only one vocational education course accepted)

### **Procedures**

1. Submit completed application for admission to the Office of Admissions.
2. Students should have their official GED scores or high school transcript reflecting sixth semester rank in class, courses in progress, and ACT or SAT scores sent directly to the Office of Admissions.
3. Veterans must submit a photocopy of their DD214.
4. Students on a visa must submit a photocopy of the I-94 form.



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## Transfer Admission

### **Requirements**

1. Overall "C" average in all coursework attempted and good academic standing at the last school attended full-time.
2. Students with less than 30 semester hours of college credit must also meet freshman requirements.

### **Procedures**

1. Submit a completed application for admission to the Office of Admissions.
2. Request that official transcripts from each college or university attended be sent directly to the Office of Admissions.
3. Students with less than 30 semester hours of college credit must also request an official high school transcript and ACT or SAT scores (if under 21 years of age).
4. Veterans must submit a photocopy of their DD214.
5. Students on a visa must submit a photocopy of the I-94 form.

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## Transferring to Northeastern

### **Transferring From A Two-Year College**

A maximum of 60 semester hours of credit will transfer from a community college. A maximum of 90 semester hours of credit is accepted from a senior institution. Additional credit hours earned beyond 60 or 90 will not be counted toward graduation.

Beginning with admission to the Fall 1993 term, students graduating with an approved ICCB (Illinois Community College Board) Model A.A. or A.S. degree will be granted junior standing and will have fulfilled our general education requirement.

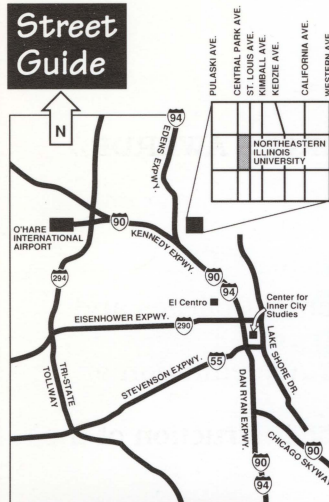
