





Chicago, Illinois, June 9, 1977.....Northeastern Illinois University announces a new program commencing September, 1977, to train teachers at the Masters degree level to work with special education pre-school children: The program is funded in part by a Federal Program Assistance Grant, U. S. Office of Education and is designed to prepare teachers to identify, diagnose and teach young handicapped children.

If accepted for admission by the Graduate College, the trainees can earn a masters degree in Special Education in one of three areas: Mental Retardation, Learning Disabilities, or Behaviorial Disorders. It is possible to earn certification in more than one area. The program fulfills the present State of Illinois requirements in Early Childhood Special Education.

Application for admission to the Master's degree program must be made through the Graduate College.

There is a growing concern throughout the country in the identification and teaching of young handicapped children. This development has resulted in an expanding need for trained personnel in the area of Special Education for pre-school children. Such personnel are needed in:

- \* Child Find Projects
- \* First Chance Network
- \* Headstart (Where ten percent served are to be handicapped)
- \* Early and periodic screening, diagnosis and treatment (EPSDT) programs
- \* Local school districts
- \* Nursery schools
- \* Day care centers
- \* Infant stimulation programs
- \* Regional service areas
- \* Community agencies

Those who completed last year's project are applying for positions as head teachers or directors in group care settings, members of multi-disciplinary teams serving pre-school exceptional children, teachers of the severely emotionally disturbed, and staff members with young children and their families.
