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NEIU To Host 2nd Annual Teacher Education Conference

Northeastern Illinois University will host the second national, invitational conference of the Coalition of Universities and Businesses for Education (CUBE) on October 21-23, 1992. The coalition is a three-year project under the leadership of President Gordon H. Lamb and Northeastern's College of Education. The objective is to create new models for teacher education which will ultimately result in the improvement of education in grades K-12 throughout America.

The 1992 CUBE conference, co-sponsored with Motorola, will take place in the Galvin Center of Motorola Corporation and at the Wyndham Hamilton Hotel in Schaumburg. Speakers and teams will focus on the project objective of developing university/business partnerships for restructuring teacher education and total quality management in education, this year's conference theme.

Six-member teams from 30 universities and businesses across the country are expected to attend. Each team consists of the university/college president, the vice president for academic affairs, the dean of the college of education, the dean of the college of arts and sciences, a representative of the local school district, and a CEO from the business community. The conference provides a rare opportunity for this combination of leaders to focus on needed change and development in teacher preparation.

A panel of state chief school officers, a university president, a dean of education, and a leader from the business community will address the 1992 conference. The program also will include several breakout sessions, with teams meeting with external facilitators to develop plans for change within their teacher preparation programs.

The October conference marks the beginning of the second year of the CUBE project. The project is expected to complete its work in 1994.

Salme H. Steinberg Appointed Provost/VP For Academic Affairs

Dr. Salme H. Steinberg has been appointed provost and vice president of academic affairs, where she had been acting provost since March, 1991.

Steinberg joined NEIU's faculty in 1975 as an assistant professor of history. In 1983, she attained the rank of professor and was appointed history department chair. Steinberg is a U.S. economic and social historian. Her book, *Reformer in the Marketplace*, is a study of the relationships between mass journalism and social reform in the Progressive era.

In announcing Dr. Steinberg's appointment, university president Dr. Gordon H. Lamb said, "I am very pleased with this appointment. Dr. Steinberg has an excellent academic and administrative background. She has demonstrated her commitment to academic excellence throughout her career. She understands the needs of our highly diverse population, and works well with faculty, staff, and students. I believe she will make a significant contribution to this university."

Steinberg received a Ph.D. in history from Johns Hopkins University, and a master of arts and bachelor of arts in history from Hunter College in New York. She taught at Northwestern University, Goucher College, and Towson State before coming to Northeastern.

Lamb Named Teacher Ed's Most Supportive President

Dr. Gordon H. Lamb, Northeastern's president, was recently selected Teacher Education's Most Supportive President or Chancellor by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE). The prestigious national honor was awarded to Dr. Lamb for his outstanding contributions in advancing the education of educators. Dr. Lamb was selected from 36 nominations.

The AACTE cited Dr. Lamb's accomplishments at NEIU for showing a comprehensive view of the education continuum and the elements necessary for its success, and said that not only the university, but the entire metropolitan area has benefited from his advancement of quality education. In its criteria for award nomination, the AACTE considered the president's involvement and support of the College of Education in all its facets, and a broad, innovative mission for teacher education.

The AACTE is a national, nonprofit, voluntary association of more than 700 colleges and universities that prepare new teachers, administrators, and counselors, and provides continuing education for practitioners.

Ahmed Fareed Retires As Dean

After 13 years of providing leadership to Northeastern's College of Education, Dean Ahmed A. Fareed is retiring from his position as dean, to return to the Department of Reading faculty.

Dr. Fareed came to Northeastern in 1968 as a professor of reading in the English department. He was instrumental in establishing the

Department of Reading and an approved master's in the reading degree program. He served as chair of the department from its inception in 1971 until 1979, when he was appointed dean of the College of Education.

During his tenure as dean, the College of Education has taken significant steps toward strengthening undergraduate and graduate degree programs. Under his leadership, the College of Education has become one of the largest and most reputable colleges of education in the Chicago area, offering more than 40 programs at the bachelor's and master's degree levels. Included among the many achievements during his deanship are the following:

- Increased enrollment in the College of Education to more than double the 1979 figures.
- Creation of the Chicago Teachers' Center, a working educational center for elementary and secondary school teachers, local school members, parents, and community leaders.
- Conception and establishment of the Department of Curriculum and Instruction to include the elementary, secondary, early childhood, and instructional media education programs.

- Establishment of a stand-alone early childhood certification program, as well as a reading certification program.

- Inception of a teacher induction program.

- Expansion of the master's degree program in counselor education from 36 to 48 hours.

- Establishment of a free-standing special education undergraduate major, a master's sequence in early childhood special education, and a master's degree program in gifted education.

Before joining Northeastern's faculty, Dr. Fareed taught and conducted research at the University of Chicago, Northwestern University, and Ein Shams University in Egypt. He was born and raised in Cairo, Egypt and received his bachelor's degree in literature from Cairo University and his general diploma and master's degree in education and psychology from Ein Shams University. In 1961, he came to the U.S. and earned his Ph.D. in educational psychology and reading from the University of Chicago.

New MA Degrees Offered

• French and French/Spanish

Northeastern has entered into an agreement with the Language Department and Graduate Council of Roosevelt University for Northeastern students to receive a master of arts degree in French or French/Spanish. This degree is similar to the cooperative master's degree program in Spanish.

NEIU students must meet graduate division admission requirements and the requirements of Roosevelt's Language Department. Roosevelt will accept up to 12 semester hours of graduate courses taken in Spanish and French at Northeastern, approved by both institutions. The final 12 semester hours of the student's program must be taken at Roosevelt. There are different requirements for both specialties.

Elementary and secondary teachers, with or without masters degrees, may now receive graduate credit for appropriate French and/or Spanish language courses taken at Northeastern. Those who are working on graduate degrees may increase their credit hours, and those who need to earn a specific number of graduate credit hours in appropriate French and/or Spanish courses each year can earn them at Northeastern.

Dr. Mohan K. Sood has been named dean of the Graduate College. Sood joined the faculty of Northeastern in 1970 and previously was coordinator of the University Honors Program and acting dean of the Graduate College. He served as chair of the Department of Earth Science for

almost nine years.

Sood holds a Ph.D. in geology from the University of Western Ontario, an M.S. in geology from both Western Ontario and Panjab University, and a B.S. in physics/chemistry from Panjab University.

Sood was a visiting scientist at the Argonne National Laboratory in 1982-83 and has carried out research projects in petrology-geochemistry of igneous rocks in Alaska, India, and the United States. He has published extensively in his research area and is the author of *Modern Igneous Petrology*, published by John Wiley and Sons.

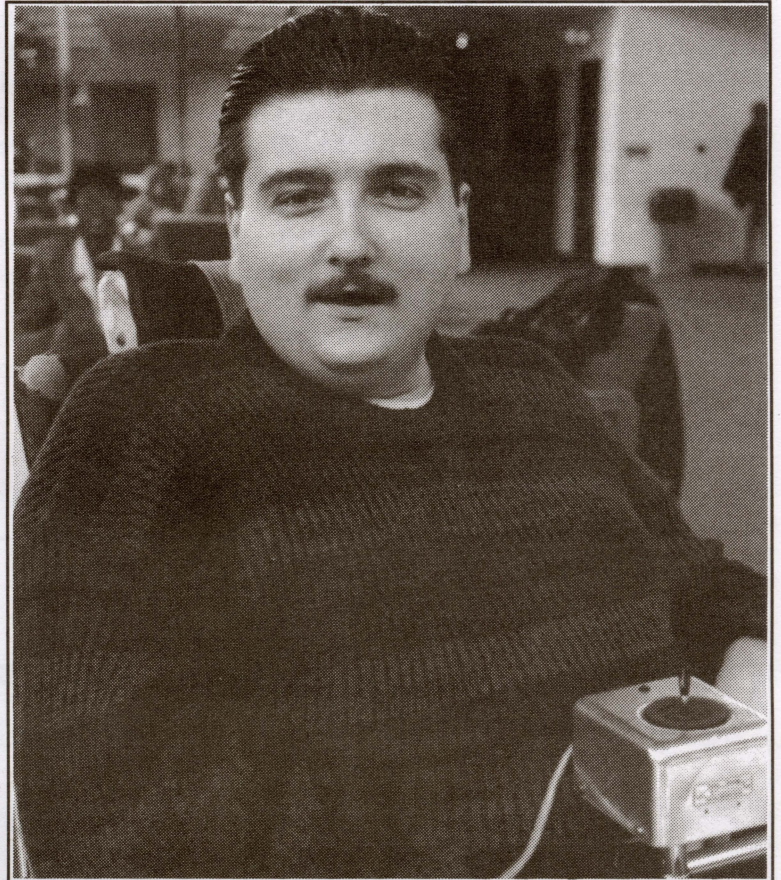
Alumnus Selected As "Best And Brightest" By *Mainstream Magazine*

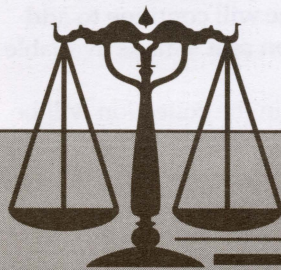

NEIU Foundation Raises \$54,000 For Scholarships And Faculty Research

The Northeastern Illinois University Foundation Board honored Northeastern's friend and neighbor William J. McCarter, president and chief executive officer of WTTW-Channel 11, at its Fifth Annual Recognition Dinner on May 9 at the Chicago Hilton and Towers. Co-chairs for the event were Donald A. Petkus, vice president of Commonwealth Edison, and attorney Jetta Norris Jones.

The evening was a tribute to Mr. McCarter's outstanding leadership in the area of public and educational broadcasting over the past 20 years. Testimonials were given by two of McCarter's close associates, John McCarter, senior vice president of Booz, Allen & Hamilton, and James Fellows, president of Central Educational Network.

Entertainment was provided by Hollywood-based comedian Anthony Griffith, the Thaddeus Exposé Trio, and the Morris Ellis Orchestra. Mr. Griffith is a 1985 NEIU graduate, and Mr. Exposé is currently enrolled at Northeastern.

A silent auction featuring 138 attractive and unique items stimulated exciting conversation and raised over \$12,000, which added to the evening's net profit of approximately \$54,000.

Business And Management Dean Olga Engelhardt Retires

After a very active and successful tenure as Northeastern's first dean of the College of Business and Management, Olga E. Engelhardt retired June 30. Before coming to Northeastern, Dean Engelhardt was chairperson and professor of

the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences at North Central College in Naperville, Illinois. During her 40 years of teaching and administration, she served on the faculties of the University of Connecticut (she was one of only two women on the faculty), Valparaiso University, and the University of Chicago's Industrial Relations Center. In addition to teaching, Dean Engelhardt devoted her time to conducting research in psychology, designing management development programs, and presenting executive seminars in the areas of managerial innovations, reassignment, and retraining.

Dean Engelhardt was awarded her bachelor of arts degree from Hunter College in New York. She received her master of arts and doctorate degrees from Columbia University and has pursued post-doctoral work at Northwestern University. She is the author of numerous scholarly articles and has presented papers at a variety of professional meetings all over the United States. "It's time to move on...time to bring some new dimensions into my life," the dean told colleagues. After half a century devoted to higher education as a professor and administrator, Dean Engelhardt and her husband are moving to Scottsdale, Arizona.

Music Reference Collection Housed At NEIU

Teachers and students of stringed instruments have an important new resource for 20th century string music, the Margaret Farish Collection of contemporary string solo and chamber music. It is the area's only fully accessible repository of 20th century string music for students. Margaret Farish is a nationally recognized authority on string instruction and editor of the authoritative bibliographies "String Music in Print" and "Orchestral Music in Print."

Made up of more than 120 pieces of sheet music for students playing from the elementary through advanced level, the collection is a result of what Farish calls her "endless curiosity" about new music. She will continue to add music to the collection as it's made available to her.

All of the music in the collection will be graded for difficulty, using the system devised by the American String Teachers Association, and plans call for area students to present concerts of music from the collection.

Farish played with the Buffalo Symphony Orchestra and the Wolanek String Quartet and has taught string music to students at every age level. While serving as a consultant with the University of Illinois String Research Project in the late 1960s, she learned more about the needs of string teachers and set out to build a contemporary repertory for string students. She began the task by asking gifted composers such as Ralph Shapey, Richard Wernick, and Halsey Stevens to write pieces for students, and was pleased when they complied with her request.

Among the composers represented in the collection are Alan Schulman, Richard Wernick, and Ralph Shapey, first prize winner in the 1990 Kennedy Center Friedheim Competition for his "Concerto for Cello, Piano and String."

UNIVERSITY GRANTS UPDATE

Developing Career Placement Opportunities for College Students with Disabilities

Award: \$111,040

Grantor: U.S. Department of Education

Project Director: Victoria Amey-Flippin, H.E.L.P. Office

This award provides second-year funding for a program which facilitates career placement opportunities for NEIU students with disabilities by providing (1) tutoring, counseling, and mentoring programs; (2) university and community-based work-experience sites and internships; and (3) in-service training and technical assistance to university faculty, staff, and community employees, while promoting awareness of the needs of those with disabilities.

Workplace Literacy Program

Award: \$408,253

Grantor: U.S. Department of Education

Project Director: Margaret Boyter-Escalona, Chicago Teachers' Center

This new program will provide job-specific literacy courses, mini-courses, and GED classes for 425 workers from nine different manufacturing companies represented by the Chicago and Central State Joint Board of the Amalgamated Clothing and Textile Workers Union (ACTWU).

Talent Search Program

Award: \$238,937

Grantor: U.S. Department of Education

Project Director: Maxine Anderson-Moffett, Chicago Teachers' Center

This continuing program administers projects at five Chicago public high schools for low-income, potentially first-generation, post-secondary students who are provided with tutoring, counseling, ACT/SAT preparation, study skills, and financial aid workshops.

Training Bilingual Teacher Aides as Special Educators

Award: \$110,014

Project Director: Rita Brusca, Special Education Department

The funding for the first year of this new four-year program will prepare approximately 30 bilingual teacher aides as fully-certified special educators who will serve pupils with limited English proficiency in the Chicago metropolitan area.

This package begins another year of professional development plans which support projects in various schools through the Chicago Teachers' Center's Interdisciplinary Professional Development Program.

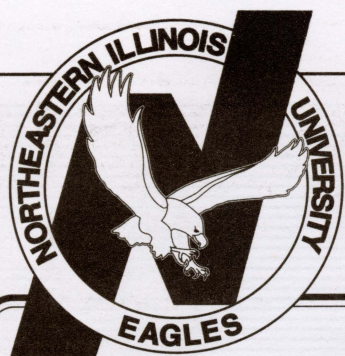
Professional Development Program

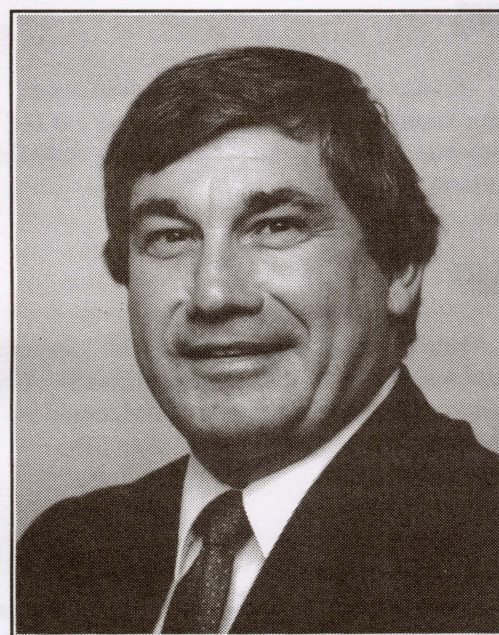

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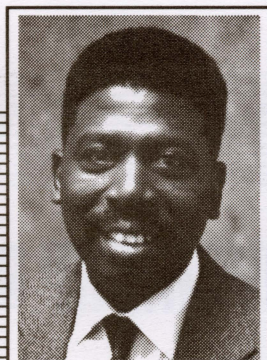

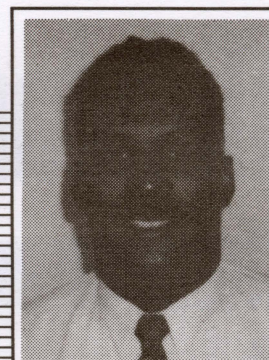
