community, and not just alone. Meditation about who we are and who we might become in these terrible times is also necessary.



ortheastern's El Centro Campus celebrates its 25th anniversary on October 15. Events will include guest

speakers, music, ethnic foods, and a student night. The celebration is part of the Hispanic Heritage Month festivities at Northeastern and throughtout Chicago.

El Centro is NEIU's educational facility meeting the educational needs of the Latino community. It is located at 3119 North Pulaski. "The need for quality education for Latinos is what gave rise to the idea of an institution like El Centro," said Dr. Caleb Rosado, the newly appointed director of El Centro. "In the mid-1970s the political climate in the city of Chicago among Latinos was demanding a greater response from academic institutions to meet the educational needs of a growing population group."

At El Centro, over 800 students participate in the General Education Program, many of them non-traditional, part-time, and returning adult students, as well as traditional first year and transfer students. Students then move to the main campus to complete their degrees. El Centro also serves as the site where educators who want to become principals can take graduate courses in School Leadership offered by the College of Education.

"El Centro is a place in Chicago where Latinos and Latinas can come for quality and affordable higher education," said Rosado. "Latinos are now the largest minority group in the nation. Latinos comprise over 20 percent of the population in Chicago."


NEIU, Chicago Historical Society Awarded NEH Grant

Northeastern, in partnership with the Chicago Historical Society, was recently awarded a National Endowment for the Humanities grant to conduct a summer seminar for college and university teachers in 2002 titled, "Sport, Society, and Modern American Culture." The six-week seminar will be held June 3 through July 12, 2002 at both Northeastern and the Chicago Historical Society.

The seminar will explore recent approaches in the field, focusing on the urban setting of modern athletic practices among other forms of cultural expression. At the core of the see

tural expression. At the core of the seminar are issues concerning the representation of the body in athletic performance.

Throughout the seminar, participants will share readings of key texts, asking how scholars have linked the athletic arena to broader fields of discussion. Members of the seminar will work on their own research projects, drawing on such resources as the Chicago Historical Society's extensive collections.

The seminar directors are Steven A. Riess, NEIU professor of History, and Patrick B. Miller, NEIU associate professor of History. Riess and Miller are social and cultural historians who have examined relationships among sport, society and culture from diverse perspectives.

Riess has been teaching and writing about sport for over 30 years, offering a range of undergraduate and graduate courses on the subject as well as courses in urban, ethnic and labor history. As author, teacher, editor and consultant, Riess has played a pioneering role in the emergence of sport history as an academic field. He is one of the founding members of the North American Society for Sport History and served as editor of the *Journal of Sport History*. He is currently completing a book titled *The Sport of Kings and the Kings of Sport: A Political History of Turf, 1865-1930*, a study of thoroughbred racing, gambling, and politics in New York and Chicago.

Miller specializes in cultural history as well as African American studies and race relations. His scholarship engages the study of sport and American culture with regard to gender ideology and racial representation, among other points of reference. Miller is the author of several works, including *The Playing Fields of American Culture: Athletics and Higher Education, 1850-1945* and coauthor of *The Unlevel Playing Field: A Documentary History of the African American Experience in Sport.*

Number of Baccalaureate Degrees earned in



Simonson will continue to work with existing contacts established by the College of Business and Management as well as to seek new business relationships. He will deal primarily with small to medium-sized businesses. One of his initial projects will be to assess the education and training needs of area companies and to match those needs with the expertise of faculty and outside contractors.

Simonson describes another aspect of his mission as director of the Business Services Bureau as "establishing linkages between the university and the various ethnic communities that exist in the university's service area."

"I am very pleased to be at Northeastern Illinois University," Simonson said. "I am looking forward to working with Dean Shub and the faculty of the College of Business and Management in developing what I think will be a very exciting enterprise."

"We are delighted to have Curtis Simonson joining our team," said Allen N. Shub, acting dean of the College of Business and Management. "With his background in community development and business services, he will help strengthen the links between the College of Business and Management and the community,".

Simonson has 18 years of experience in educational administration. He has held positions as director of Community and Business Services at Morton College and as assistant director of the Industry Education Council at Triton College.

His affiliations include the National Council of Instructional Administrators and Illinois Community College Economic Development/Workforce Preparation Association. He has been awarded the Berwyn Development Corporation Exceptional Service Award and the Berwyn Development Corporation Outstanding Service Award.

Simonson earned an M.S. in Community Development from the University of Missouri-Columbia and a B.A. in History/Government from Columbia College, Columbia, Missouri.




