

Alpha Chi promotes and recognizes superior scholarship and service to a university. Students must be in the upper ten percent of their class to be eligible for induction into the society. Founded in 1922, Alpha Chi has more than 200 chapters in 44 states. Membership in Alpha Chi represents the highest academic honor on any member campus.

DAVID UNUMB, chairperson and associate professor of speech and performing arts and a trustee of the Arlington Heights Memorial Library Board of Directors, will be interviewed on the library's "Checking It Out" program on WSEX-FM (92.7), Sunday, December 4, at 10:00 p.m. The program topic will be "Meet Your Library Board."

J. FRED MAC DONALD, professor of history, will discuss the treatment of Japanese-Americans following the attack on Pearl Harbor on John Callaway's show, "Callaway," Wednesday, December 7, at 12:00 a.m. on WTTW-TV (Channel 11). Also appearing on the show will be Minoru Yasui, leader of the Redress Committee of the Japanese-American Citizens League.

The New York Times noted on Sunday, October 16, that "internships, once viewed as career-training programs strictly for college students, have changed. More people have discovered that internships can be a creative way to test job skills." For KAREN JANSSEN, a 30-year old mother and student in the Department of Information Science, a six-month internship was a way to get practical work experience. "Experience is very important in getting a job. A person with six months experience will get hired over someone with no real work experience," Janssen said.

RE: DECEMBER 5 LECTURE BY REPRESENTATIVE LEE DANIELS

On next Monday, December 5, State Representative Lee A. Daniels, Minority Leader of the Illinois House, will discuss "The Challenges Facing Metropolitan Chicago - A Suburban Perspective" at 11:00 a.m. in the auditorium. During the last General Assembly session, Representative Daniels emerged as the chief Republican spokesperson on issues ranging from merit selection of judges to Regional Transportation Authority reform. A four-term representative from DuPage County, he has sponsored legislation on consumer protection, increased penalties for repeat criminal offenders, and the protection of small businesses against criminal fraud.

I strongly encourage all university faculty and staff members to make arrangements so that you can attend this lecture. A substantial audience will help us demonstrate to corporations and legislators that the Northeastern community recognizes their support.
