IN MEMORIAM

Levi Lathen, associate professor in the Department of Special Education for almost ten years, died on Thursday, December 29. Dr. Lathen joined the faculty of Northeastern in 1974, after a distinguished career as a classroom teacher, a principal of children and adolescent services in a state hospital, a psycho-educational diagnostician in a public school district, a coordinator of a county program for children with specific learning disabilities, a special education director, and as an assistant superintendent of public instruction for the state of Illinois.

At the university level, he taught at Elgin Community College, National College of Education, Sangamon State University, and Marquette University in the area of special education. He was also the first teacher of exceptional education in the Elgin School System and founder and organizer of the North Shore Special Education Consortium. Recently, he was named director of the Special Education Supervisors Program, a grant funded by the U.S. Department of Education. Students participating in this course of study develop the skills to communicate information about their programs to the appropriate audiences, learn how to solicit support for their programs, and how to effectively manage and evaluate them.

During his career, he had published several articles and contributed chapters to books on topics of special education. His most recent publication was <u>Check That System</u>, a book on administration and supervision of special education that was published in April 1983.

"Dr. Lathen contributed greatly to the field of special education in general and dedicated his full energy to the Special Education Supervisors Program," said Dr. Janet Lerner, chairperson of the Department of Special Education. "Through his efforts, this federal program will not only benefit the university but handicapped children as well. His death is a great loss for the university community and for his colleagues nationwide in special education."

Dr. Lathen is survived by his wife, Olean, and six children, Gail, Deborah, Florence, Levi, Lorraine, and Elaine. Memorial contributions may be made in his memory to a scholarship fund for the continuing education of his children, Elaine, Lorraine, and Lévi Kevin. 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Ranked among the top 11 teacher educating institutions, Northeastern Illinois University was recently cited in <u>USA TODAY</u> and the <u>American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE) Briefs.</u> Out of 902 universities studied, Northeastern met 20 of the 24 "criteria for excellence" established by researchers James A. Johnson of Northern Illinois University and John Yates of Southlands College of Education in London, England.

Institutions were ranked by the number of criteria they met. The study included a six-page questionnaire sent to all teacher preparing institutions in the country. Yates and Johnson emphasized such points as: accreditation by the six regional accreditation associations, accreditation by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education; the person in charge of the student teaching program must devote at least 50 percent of his or her time to administration of the program; student teaching for elementary, secondary, and special education must be done full-time and off campus.
