

Richard Christiansen, entertainment editor for the Chicago Tribune, called the productions of "Desecration" and "How I Became a Holy Mother" at the Victory Gardens Studio "carefully polished and meticulously delivered productions." Under ARNOLD APRILL's direction, "the actors are dressed appropriately for their roles and are seated in an evocative setting of silks and incense," Christiansen said.
