Hunt wins re-election to BOG post

The race for Board of Governors (BOG) representative was decided last week and the incumbent, Edna Hunt, won an easy victory over Ferdie Alfajora, with a margin of 175 votes. Hunt's re-election makes her the first representative to serve a second consecutive term.

Hunt received 297 votes defeating Alfajora who received 122. Ronald Lange, a former BOG representative from Northeastern, received 104 votes in his bid for re-election. Maria Rosa Paredes received 100 votes, Jeff "Sparky" Willgale finished with 10, and Phil Trocchio had 9 votes.

Write in campaigns were not forgotten with Bart Simpson leading all write-ins with four votes, Barbara Hursh, the school's Provost, received one vote as did Bozo the Clown.

The voter turnout of 648 marks one of the highest turnouts in recent history.

The BOG representative works as

an advocate and voice for students and their interests and concerns at BOG meetings, which take place once a month.

Hunt will begin her second term on July 1, 1990.

Faculty needs to raise expectations of students

Dear Editor,

While Alan Friedlander's letter in your May 22 issue showed a refreshing concern for his fellow students, he misses some important points.

No university, public or private, should be expected to be a "dumpsite" for those who can't perform. For one thing, the first twelve years of school are usually a pretty good indication of a person's limitations. Those twelve years are usually very structured with students being told what is expected and what to do. By the time they get to college, students are expected to be able to understand what is expected and find ways to succeed. The sad reality is that some people just aren't suited for college just as some people aren't suited to be pro football players, track stars, great musicians, or ballet dancers. We must be willing to accept that college is not for everyone.

For another thing, being a dumping ground for substandard students is not fair to those students who can and do make adequate-or-better grades. It lowers the standard for everyone,

and students who can make the grade find themselves short changed and unable to compete in the job market after graduation. Most colleges have special programs for those borderline students whose grades fluctuate, but for consistent underachievers, on-the-job or vocational training may be compatible with their skills and abilities.

If anything, Northeastern and its faculty need to raise their expectations, not lower them. No other school is willing to lower their standards, and if Northeastern's future graduates intend to compete for better opportunities, they must demand that Northeastern compete on the same level as other universities. Employers do not make distinctions between public or private education; they expect the people they hire to be able to do the job, no matter where they studied. If we lower our expectations of ourselves and our fellow students, the only place we'll truly fit in is in the unemployment lines.

Northeastern operating on four-day week in Summer

Northeastern will operate on a four-day week during its summer term for the eighth year in a row in order to reduce utility costs.

Almost all university operations, including classes, are being compressed into a Monday through Thursday schedule between June 25 and August 24. The university's main campus will

be open from 7 AM to 10 PM on these four days while classes are in session, and will be closed on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Normal business hours will be 8 AM to 6 PM. The Center for Inner City Studies will be open from 8:30 AM to 9:30 PM and El Centro will be open from 1 to 9 PM. Northeastern's Ronald

Williams Library will be open on Sundays from NOON to 5 PM, as well as Monday through Thursday from 7:45 AM to 10:30 PM.

There will be no cooling or ventilation during the closed days, which will result in an estimated 20 percent reduction in air conditioning during the two peak cooling months.

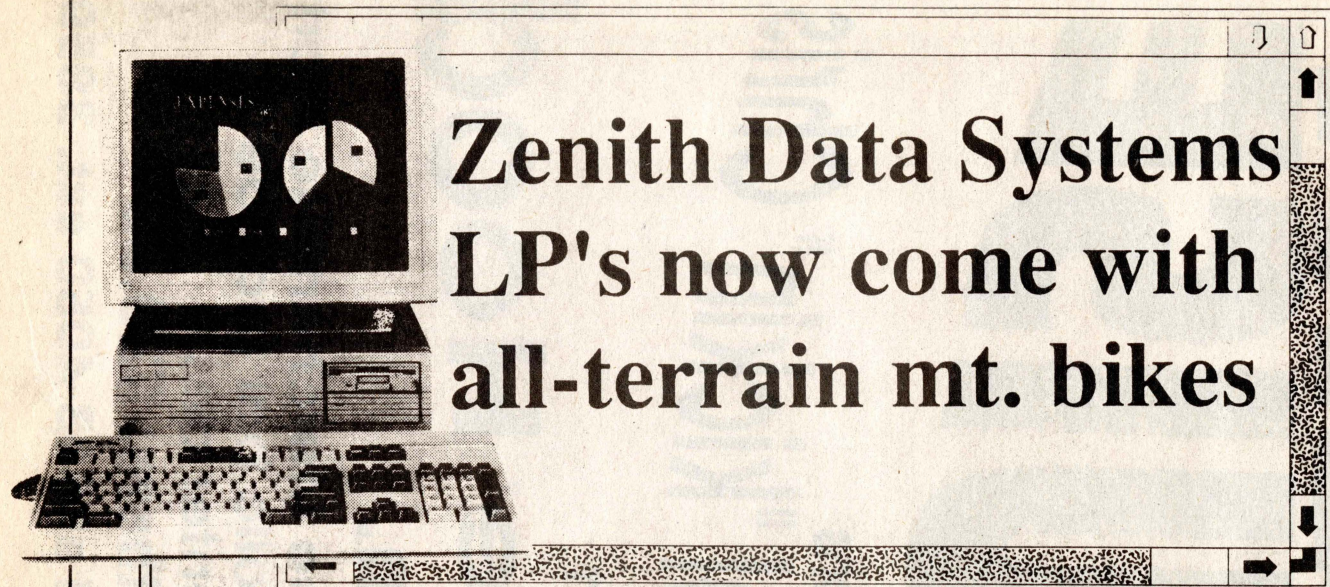
