Votes counted: No Confidence verdict

After two weeks of deliberations by UNI faculty to decide whether or not President Lamb has proven himself as an effective leader, and has successfully directed Northeastern for the future, the faculty voted no confidence against Lamb.

"The results of the vote indicate that the faculty is very unhappy. They are not being heard, even supporters of the president have expressed unhappiness," said Ron Glick, President of the Faculty Senate.

What is meant by the vote of no confidence that Lamb received is that as stated on the ballot,



the majority of the faculty voted that they "have serious doubts about most of the directions that President Lamb has chosen for the university and do not have confidence in his ability to lead us."

Out of 273 faculty members, 179 voted against Lamb, 79 voted in favor of him, 14 abstained, and one blank ballot was received.

The debate as to how the faculty as a whole

Civil rights activist Julian Bond to speak here

Julian Bond, noted civil rights activist, will give the keynote address as part of the commemoration of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday on Jan. 15. in the audtiorium, at 11:15 a.m.

Born in Nashville, Tennessee, Bond is known for being an active participant in the movements for civil rights, economic justice, and peace.

Bond has been politically active since 1965. Since then he has served on the Georgia House of Representitives and on the state senate. During his term in the Georgia General Assembly, Bond was responsible for sponsering and co-sponsoring more than 60 bills which became laws, including a sickle cell anemia testing program and a state wide program that would provide low interest home loans to low income Georgians.

Bond holds honorary degrees from 14 schools including Wesleyan University and the University of Oregan. He has served on many committees including the Robert F. Kennedy Memorial Fund and the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Nonviolent social Change.

In 1985, he received the Bill of Rights Award from the American Civil Liberties Union of Georgia.

Gameroom running out of quarters

A plush cubicle, a secretarial pool at the end of the hall, your own phone! For a few of the student clubs on campus, this will soon be a reality.

One of the gravest concerns that Dr. Melvin Terrell had when he arrived at Northeastern was the lack of space for student organizations. This problem is being corrected by a remodeling of the gameroom to create office space for ten student clubs.

The remodeling of the game room will create ten offices, one shared reception area and a conference room for student organizations. The exact design for the layout has not been finalized, as the project is still in the planning stages. Only a portion of the space in the gameroom will be used. There will still be a gameroom! This new office area created will be used entirely by students, as it is being funded out of the student activities reserve fund. This fund is made up of unspent monies from the student activity fee.

A committee awarded the contract to the architecture firm of Ross, Barney and Jenkowski whose bid was approximately \$150,000. That committee consisted of Walter Williams, Director of Student Activities; Mark Kipp, Director of Commuter Center; Gary Bryan and Sharil Yonan, Vice President of Student Senate. In order to spend design and construction fees on non-academic projects, concept approval is needed from the governing bodies of this school. The Board of Governors approved at its Dec. 6th meeting, and the IBHE is expected to give the green light to the project at its January meeting.

Who gets the offices? The allocation of these offices will be done by a student/administration committee which will be formed for that purpose. Walter Williams would like to see these allocations on a yearly basis to the clubs showing the greatest need and productivity, but the final decision on who gets the space will be up to the students on that committee.

"Student organizations need a place to call their own, first and foremost", said Dr. Terrell, Vice President of Student Affairs, explaining why this project was needed. He feels that bringing groups together will "help create an intercultural understanding of each other" and sharing a space will foster co-sponsorship of events, something he has wanted more of from the students.

The Northeastern Theatre is gearing up its 1991 season and is opening with a rather timely production Pvt. Wars. The play, a one-act written by John McLure, is a telling comedy about three Vietnam veterans who are surviving in a veteran's hospital.

The characters of the play display three different aspects of American life. Woodruff Gately is a soldier from Georgia. Natwick is a spoiled rich kid from Long Island who should never have been in the armed forces. Finally, Silvio is a streetwise Italian-American who is tough, but not cruel.

"I had no idea when I chose [to direct and produce] this show that the United States would be in such a precarious situation," said Durward Redd. "Perhaps this play will open some peoples

The show was cast with two separate casts. In the first cast, Jimmy Sheehan portrays Gately, Brian Minarcik portrays Natwick and Mike Solarte plays Silvio. She is played by Jacalyn Seaton. When asked about the dual role for both casts, Solarte replied, "I think this will be a real challenge for me. At least it's a challenge of my concentration."
