About the Performers

Carl Rather began his career as a stage director for opera. He learned his craft assisting noted directors at many of the world's premiere opera houses, including Covent Garden, the Munich Opera, the Spoleto Festival in Italy, the Metropolitan Opera, Lyric Opera of Chicago, San Francisco Opera and many others. He served as Artistic Director of Chamber Opera Chicago from 1985 to 1993 and of Chicago Opera Theater from 1994-1999.

More recently as a singer, he received his Masters degree in Vocal Pedagogy from Northeastern Illinois University and is currently completing his doctorate in vocal performance from Northwestern University. He has performed the roles of Papageno in The Magic Flute, Ford in The Merry Wives of Windsor, John Proctor in The Crucible and the title role of Gianni Schicchi, among others.

His concert repertory includes the Baritone solos in Belshazaar's Feast of William Walton, Carmina Burana of Carl Orff, Ralph Vaughan Williams's Dona Nobis Pacem, and the Ernest Bloch Sacred Service.

He currently serves as Director of Opera for Western Michigan University.

Jane Hamilton Kenas-Heller is the staff accompanist at Northeastern Illinois University, where she received a Masters degree in vocal pedagogy. She is the organist at Edgewater Presbyterian Church, accompanies the Park Ridge Chorale and conducts the High Holiday Choir at Temple Beth El in Northbrook. A former Bel Canto Competition finalist, she has sung with Chicago Opera Theatre, Du Page Opera and toured with the Lyric Opera Center for American Artists.

As a member of the Harlequin Players Children's Theatre troupe, Ms. Kenas-Heller composed the musical score for numerous productions. Her one-act opera, ROMANCE NOVEL, was premiered by the NEIU Opera Workshop. Ms. Kenas-Heller is fortunate to have toured twice for the USO, performing on US military bases in Europe, Greenland, Iceland and Canada.

Cellist Matthew Agnew moved to Chicago nine years ago to attend DePaul University. He studied with William Cernota of the Lyric Opera orchestra. While at DePaul, Matthew presented numerous recitals, covering sonatas by Brahms, Beethoven, and Bach, unaccompanied suites by Bach, and the Haydn cello concerti. He performed with the Elgin Symphony Orchestra during the 2002 - 2003 season as co-principal, and was subsequently awarded the sole principal position for the 2003 - 2004 season. This is Matthew's first appearance on the *Mostly Music at NEIU series*.
