### **CHICAGO SUN-TIMES**



### Alumni Spotlight Dan Chookaszian

Dan Chookaszian (B.A. '03 Business Management) has melded a strong spiritual life with the successful pursuit of business. "I'm grateful for all the gifts God has given me," said Chookaszian. "And I believe that the more successful I become in business, the more time and resources I can devote to the ministry work of the church."

Toby Williams (B.A. '04 Communication, Media and Theatre) met Chookaszian when they were both students at NEIU and has been under his wing ever since. 
The 2008 American Spanish Dance Festival will be held Wednesday, June 18 through Monday, June 30.



# Audrey Reynolds Distinguished Teaching Award Deadline for Nominations Extended

The deadline for nominations for the Audrey Reynolds Distinguished Teaching Award has been extended to May 30. Professor Emerita Audrey Reynolds,

linguistics, created this \$5,000 award to recognize outstanding teaching by faculty members who have a record of success and to inspire other faculty, especially young and new faculty members, to strive for excellence in teaching. One award will be presented annually to the member of the NEIU faculty who best demonstrates distinguished teaching. The award will be presented for the first time this year, with the formal presentation at the December Commencement ceremony.

Full-time tenured members of the NEIU faculty who are in their sixth year or more of service at the University and who typically carry what is defined as a full instructional load will be eligible for nomination. Any faculty member, administrator, student or alum may nominate any member of the NEIU community who meets the eligibility criteria. Self-nominations are not considered. # **NEIU Political Science Student Accepted to Prestigious Ralph Bunche Summer Institute**

NEIU McNair Scholar Andrea Cottrell, junior, political science, is one of 20 students nationwide who was recently accepted into the American Political Science Association (APSA) 2008 Ralph Bunche Summer Institute (RBSI) at Duke University.

Named in honor of the 1950 Nobel Peace Prize winner and former APSA President, the Ralph Bunche Summer Institute was established in 1986 with the goal of increasing the number of African Americans pursuing advanced degrees in political science. It later expanded to address broader issues of underrepresentation in science and political science scholarship.

At the Institute, Cottrell will take part in a five-week intense academic program designed to simulate the graduate school experience. She will have an opportunity to develop analytical writing and quantitative skills and plans to study the comparative differences in the democratization between Northeast and Southeast Asia.

In addition to her recent acceptance into RBSI, and her status as a McNair scholar, Cottrell was recently awarded the political science department's Pi Sigma Alpha 2008 scholarship for outstanding undergraduate

political science student. Upon completing the RBSI, Cottrell plans to travel to Korea, where she will spend the balance of her summer in a Korean language immersion program. Her long-term goal is to pursue a doctorate in political science with a specialization in international relations of Asia.

"We are all pleased and proud of Andrea's accomplishments," says David Leaman, chair and associate professor, political science. "She's a very focused student who has already exhibited a love of research and promise for conducting advanced study in graduate school. We're looking forward to her continued success."






