

ARUN GANDHI, GRANDSON OF THE GREAT "MAHATMA" GANDHI, TO SPEAK

AT NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY - THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 13 AT 7:30 PM

Arun Gandhi, grandson of the great spiritual leader, Mohandas K. "Mahatma" Gandhi, will present a talk, "Nonviolence or Nonexistence: Options for the 21st Century," at Northeastern Illinois University. Gandhi will speak at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, February 13 in Alumni Hall in the university's Commuter Center. Northeastern is located at 5500 North St. Louis Avenue in Chicago. Free parking is available in the university's parking lot "D," located at the corner of Bryn Mawr and Central Park avenues. Admission to the talk and reception following is **free**.

Growing up in apartheid South Africa, the young Arun experienced humiliating and dangerous bigotry. When he was fourteen, his parents sent him to live in India with his grandfather, the "Mahatma," from whom the young Arun learned to control his rage through the principles of nonviolence. It was the late 1940's, a tumultuous time in India's struggle to free itself from British rule. The eighteen months he spent with his grandfather set the young Gandhi on his life's course.

In his early twenties Gandhi returned to India to work as a journalist and, with friends, started the Center for Social Unity to alleviate poverty and caste discrimination by providing self-help models of commerce. To date, the Center has helped over 500,000 people to open their own factories, cooperative banks, and other enterprises.

Gandhi and his wife, Sunanda, founded the M.K. Gandhi Institute for Nonviolence in 1991. Its mission is to examine, promote and apply the principles of nonviolent thought and action through research, workshops, seminars and hands-on community service. It is headquartered at the Christian Brothers University in Memphis, Tennessee, where Gandhi is also a scholar-in-residence.

An accomplished author, Gandhi has published several books, some of which are: A Patch of White, examining racism in South Africa; Morarji Papers, chronicling the rise and fall of the Janata Party in India; and Voices of Poverty, co-written with his wife and Sten Berg of Sweden, addressing poverty and its management in rural India by non-governmental agencies. Recently he envisioned and edited World Without Violence: Can Gandhi's Vision Become Reality?, a collection of essays and poetry by prominent world scientists, artists, political and social leaders addressing the principles of nonviolence.

Gandhi is a member of the U.S. National Council of the International Fellowship of Reconciliation, and a board member of the Center for Conflict Resolution. He is a recipient of the Courage of Conscience Award, among other honors that he has received.

On Saturday, February 15, Gandhi will present the keynote speech at the 8th annual T.E.A.M. (Teachers of Experiential and Adventure Methodology) Conference presented by Northeastern's College of Education.

Goldsmith created the play he called a laughing comedy in 1771. In part *She Stoops to*Conquer pokes fun at the sentimental comedy that was fashionable in Goldsmith's day. Instead of heartwarming sentiments and weepy eyes, Goldsmith wrote a play filled with good humor and hearty belly laughs.

An exciting and romantic night is anticipated at the English country home of Kate Hardcastle (Kathleen T. Shiel III). Kate is to be visited by her father's choice of a husband for her -- young Marlow (Will Melnick). Kate has not yet seen her intended. Marlow is joined by his friend Hastings (Adam Rivera), who has come along to call on his sweetheart, Constance Neville (Anastasia Harold), Mrs. Hardcastle's (Beverly Ben-David) niece and Kate's closest friend. Mrs. Hardcastle hopes for a match between her son, Tony Lumpkin (Michael F. Buino), Kate's half-brother, and Constance, though both Constance and Tony detest each other.

Marlow and Hastings, having lost their way, stop for directions at the Three Pigeon's Tavern, where Tony, as usual, is whiling away the evening with drink, flirtations, and practical jokes. On hearing the travelers' destination, Tony gets the inspiration for what he conceives to be a great prank: he sends Marlow and Hastings to the Hardcastle house thinking it is an inn.

Upon arriving at the house, and believing Mr. Hardcastle (Peter Michael Piane) to be an innkeeper, Marlow and Hastings order him about and ignore his attempts at a host's affability.

When Hastings sees Constance and asks her what she is doing at the inn, she exposes Tony's hoax. They both decide to keep up the hoax for fear that if Marlow found out, he would be so embarrassed by his behavior that he and Hastings would have to leave immediately, ruining Hastings' and Constance's plans for elopement.

During his first visit with Kate, Marlow stammers stupidly and blushes. Kate tells her father she will not have a man so reserved and timid. Her father, amazed by what Kate tells him, assumes that she must be wrong and tells her of Marlow's impudent behavior. He and Kate finally agree to await further developments before making any pronouncements on Marlow's true nature, and Kate disguises herself as the maid to find out Marlow's true nature and to see if there is more to him than the timid, retiring man she first encountered.

In the meantime, Tony, who wants Constance out of the way because she is a threat to his liberty, decides to help her and Hastings with their plans to elope. Tony steals Constance's jewels from his mother and gives them to the young couple. Mrs. Hardcastle finds out about the jewels and their plans and orders Constance off to her Aunt Pedigree's, summoning Tony to drive her and Constance at once.

In the end Kate realizes that Marlow isn't the timid little creature she first supposed and her contrivances are found out, clearing the way for their engagement. Hastings and Constance also receive a last minute reprieve when Mr. Hardcastle tells Tony that he is of age and can officially refuse to marry Constance, allowing Constance her fortune and her admirer, and Tony his freedom.

WHAT WIND WILL DO: POEMS OF LIFE AFTER LOSS BY NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY PROFESSOR DEBRA BRUCE AUTHOR TO READ ON WEDNESDAY, APRIL 2 AT 7:30 P.M.

What Wind Will Do is the new book of poems by Debra Bruce, an Associate Professor of English and Women's Studies at Northeastern Illinois University (NEIU). Bruce will read from her book at NEIU's Heritage Room Wednesday, April 2, at 7:30 p.m.

In <u>Wind</u>, Bruce examines the unpredictability of life and the pain that can come from losing something one would normally take for granted. She confronts a number of difficult subjects ranging from cancer to infertility, and the ordinary pleasures that make life worth living.

Before joining Northeastern in 1984, Bruce received her M.A. in English from Brown University and her M.F.A. in writing from the University of Iowa Writers' Workshop. 





While in public service, he wrote a newspaper column, "P.S./ Washington," which ran for more than 45 years and was acclaimed by journalists such as George Will and Albert Hunt.
