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

DR. GORDON H. LAMB

Dr. Gordon H. Lamb will arrive at Northeastern in mid-September to assume his duties as president of the university. The Board of Governors of State Colleges and Universities (BOG) selected Dr. Lamb out of a field of 116 candidates at its board meeting on July 24.

In accepting the position, Dr. Lamb said he views his new job as an exciting challenge. "Initially, I would like to establish a higher profile for the university within the city and to work with university and community leaders to determine where Northeastern's focus shall be," he added.

BOG members are pleased that Dr. Lamb has accepted the position. They feel he has the background and qualifications necessary to be an excellent president and will provide highly effective leadership to the students and faculty of the university.

Prior to his appointment, Dr. Lamb served as vice-president of academic affairs at the University of Texas at San Antonio. As vice-president, he was responsible for the academic planning of a rapidly developing urban institution serving over 12,000 students. He helped the university establish its role in the larger metropolitan area by anticipating and meeting the educational and economic needs of a growing city.

Dr. Lamb began his career in education in 1956 as a music teacher in the Iowa Public School System. In 1969, he was appointed assistant professor at the University of Wisconsin, Stevens Point, and, in 1970, he joined the faculty of the University of Texas at Austin, where he remained until 1974. He then served as professor and director of the Division of Music at the University of Texas at San Antonio until his appointment as vice-president of academic affairs.

Dr. Lamb has written and edited various books and articles for publication on choral directing and techniques. Among his many accomplishments, he was honored by receiving the Robert McCowen Memorial Award for Outstanding Contributions to Choral Music in Iowa. He has been listed in the Who's Who in the South and Southwest, the International Who's Who in Music, and the American Who's Who in Music. In addition, he is a member of numerous professional educational and music organizations, including the American Council on

Graduate Education, the Council of Graduate Schools in the United States, the American Choral Directors Association, and the American Association of Choral Conductors.

He received his bachelors in music education from Simpson College in Iowa; his masters in music from the University of Nebraska; and his doctorate from the University of Iowa.

Dr. Lamb is married and has three children.

On July 1, the university introduced a new health care plan as part of the comprehensive benefits package offered to employees of the state of Illinois. As part of this program, the state is offering employees four other benefit plans - a free dental care plan, a dependent care plan, a university life program, and a deferred compensation plan.

#### Dental Care Plan

Effective October 1, employees, retirees, and eligible dependents who are currently enrolled in the Basic State Health Plan or one of the HMO option plans will automatically receive certain dental benefits through the Delta Dental Plan of Illinois. These benefits are provided without any employee contribution, deductible, or co-payment. Option coverage may be purchased to supplement this plan. This is the first of a three-phase implementation process, with additional dental benefits beginning July 1, 1987, and July 1, 1988.

# Dependent Care Plan

On January 1, 1987, state employees will be eligible to participate in the Dependent Care Plan. Through this new benefit program, individuals may contribute up to \$5000 of their annual income to an individual dependent care reimbursement account.

### University Life Program

The University Life Program offers employees traditional life insurance protection, a savings fund that earns competitive interest rates, and adjustable premiums. Through Metropolitan Insurance and Annunity Company, employees of the state of Illinois, age 18 to 70, are eligible to participate in this program after six months of service.

# Deferred Compensation Plan

The Deferred Compensation Plan is an investment

program that allows employees to use before tax dollars to build savings for a more secure financial future. All state employees are eligible to participate in this plan.
