SOME KEY ACTIONS OF APRIL BOG MEETING

The April 14 meeting of the Board of Governors of State Colleges and Universities (BOG) held in Springfield approved Northeastern's request for an increase of the Commencement Fee from the current \$8 to \$11 in 1989 and \$15 in 1990 to better meet the costs of presenting this event. The board also approved a \$2 Performing Arts Fee, concurrent with a \$2 reduction in the Student Activity Fee, to provide a separate and firm base to fund performing arts functions. Among other actions taken by the board, approval was given for intercollegiate athletic insurance at Northeastern and other member universities.

Featured on the meeting agenda was another session of the series, "The Student of the Year 2000," a board policy discussion on the assessment of learning outcomes and related issues. Key speaker was Dr. Elaine El-Khawas, vice president for Policy Analysis and Research for the American Council on Education. Gordon H. Lamb, Northeastern's president, moderated the discussion; Dr. Kathleen Carlson, acting assistant provost and assistant director of institutional planning, participated on the panel of faculty.

Effective the spring term's first day, Monday, May 2, Health Services will have a Registered Nurse (RN) on duty during the day and night hours that university activity is going on. Their new hours are: Monday-Thursday, 7:00 a.m.-10 p.m.; Friday, 7:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m.; and Saturday, 8:00 a.m.-12 Noon. Thus, at least one Health Service nurse will be available for service during the evening hours when students, faculty, and staff are using the library, the Physical Education Building, classrooms, the art gallery, the art center, and the nursery. During peak, daytime hours (8:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m.) at least two registered nurses are now on duty.

Naomi E. Millender has been named program director of the Cultural Linguistic Approach/Follow Through Program in the Inner City Studies Department. Millender, who replaces Judith Starks, has been program consultant in the cultural linguistics program since 1971.

The Northeastern-produced radio program, "Vantage Point," will move to a new time, 6:30 a.m., one hour later on Sundays, on WCLR-FM (102). On the last show to be aired at 5:30 a.m. on May 8, host David Unumb, chairperson of speech and performing arts, will discuss "Health Care Alternatives for Seniors" with Rob Skeist, director, White Crane Senior Health Center, and Ruth Shriman, founder of White Crane. The guest on the May 15 show, Jody Raphael, executive director, Chicago Literacy Coordination Center, Triton College, will discuss "Erasing Illiteracy in Illinois."

Markham Prairie, owned and operated by the university, will be dedicated as a National Natural Landmark by the National Park Service on Monday, May 23. The ceremony, sponsored by Northeastern, The Nature Conservancy, and Friends of the Indian Boundary Prairie, begins at 10:00 a.m., and the university community is invited to attend. The Markham Prairie consists of 93 acres of open grassland, 20 miles south of downtown Chicago. National natural landmarks are areas representing the best examples of the ecological and geological features composing our nation's natural history. Markham Prairie contains one of the few remnants of true prairie land, with the original flora intact, that once covered 250 million acres of the Midwest.

The prairie is located on Troy and 155th Street. I-57 is a suggested route to the area, and the preserve can be entered on Troy Street from 155th. For additional information, please call extension 3291.
