NOVELIST HARRY MARK PETRAKIS TO LECTURE ON THURSDAY, OCT. 6 The first Distinguished Lectureship Series presentation this year will be Harry Mark Petrakis, author of six novels, three short story collections, and an autobiography. Twice nominated for the National Book Award in Fiction and winner of awards from Friends of American Writers, Friends of Literature, Society of Midland Authors and the O. Henry Award, Petrakis has been referred to as "a leading American novelist" by novelist and critic, John Cheever. The son of Greek immigrants, he was born in St. Louis and raised in Chicago. His novels are In the Land of Morning, The Hour of the Bell, A Dream of Kings, Lion at My Heart, Days of Vengeance, and The Odyssey of Kostas Volakis. Pericles on 31st Street is his most noted short story collection. His lecture on "A Writer's Reflection on His City," will be at 12:30 p.m., Thursday, October 6, in Alumni Hall.

BOG SUBMITS 1990 BUDGET TO IBHE Board of Governors trustees have approved a \$220,906,200 budget proposal for the system for fiscal 1990. The proposal includes a nine percent salary increase for faculty and staff and more than \$20 million to support academic programs and other services to students. Under the FY90 budget, Northeastern would be appropriated \$42,278,000, an increase of 19.5 percent. BOG Chancellor Thomas D. Layzell said "This is a budget which will meet the needs of the 47,000 students in the system. We will now proceed to make the case with the Illinois Board of Higher Education and the General Assembly and the Governor for this budget."

POET ALICE FULTON TO READ ON OCT. 27 Alice Fulton, winner of a 1985 National Poetry Series award for her most recent book of poems, <u>Palladium</u>, will read her poetry at 7:00 p.m. in the Golden Eagle Room on Thursday, October 27. A reception will follow. Her work has been published in <u>The Best American Poetry</u>, 1988, <u>The Atlantic</u>, <u>The New Yorker</u>, <u>Poetry</u>, <u>Parnassus</u>, and <u>The Georgia Review</u>. Ms. Fulton is an assistant professor of English at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.
