BOG APPROVES FUNDING FOR FISCAL 1990

BOG VIDEOTAPES FOCUS ON FUTURE CHALLENGES IN HIGHER EDUCATION

MUSIC EDUCATION AT NORTHEASTERN AMONG TOPICS ON "VANTAGE POINT" IN MARCH Congratulations to **Gloria Helfand**, administrative secretary in the Department of Geography and Environmental Studies for almost eight years, for being named February's Employee of the Month. Ms. Helfand received her \$100 award from President **Lamb** and her picture is posted in the Civil Service bulletin board. An alumna with a B.A. in Art, Helfand exhibited her computer graphics last April in the Ronald Williams Library. The comments supporting her nomination praise Helfand for the consistently high quality of her work; her effective administration of departmental affairs; for thoroughly mastering, on her own time, computer programs for word processing and office data management; and for her prompt handling of even the most demanding faculty requests. Called the department's "heart and soul," Helfand was praised for her patient and caring training of department majors, work-study students and aides in computer, office management, and interpersonal skills.

"Technology- Strategies for Rural and Small Schools," a conference co-sponsored by the Board of Governors of State Colleges and Universities, will be held for primary and secondary faculty and staff in the state in Springfield on Tuesday, February 28. **Janet Lerner**, professor, and **Jeff Messerer**, associate professor, special education, will give one of the eight presentations by BOG faculty and staff, entitled "Using Word Processing for Students with Special Needs."

At its February 23 meeting at Governors State University, the Board of Governors approved the system's funding request for fiscal year 1990. The appropriation bill will be introduced in early March at \$224,639,300, exclusive of retirement contributions. This budget (15.3 percent above '89 funding) includes no tuition increase and a 10 percent salary increase for faculty and staff. Among the other priorities addressed by this budget is \$480,000 to begin Northeastern's Project PRIME.

The Board of Governors has produced a series of six 30-minute videotapes, called "The Student of the Year 2000," which are available to faculty for use in class. The series, based on presentations at BOG meetings last year, focuses on how universities can prepare for the educational challenges of the future. A BOG university president hosted each program, which included outside experts who addressed key topics and a panel from the BOG universities. The program topics are: (1) "Faculty"; (2) "Impact and Implications of New Technology in Instructional Delivery"; (3) "Are Colleges Succeeding?" (4) "Student Recruitment"; (5) "How Will We Meet the Needs of Students in the Year 2000?" (6) "General Education."
