RECENT GRANTS	<u>Chicagoland Consortium for Drug Prevention in Commuter Institutions</u> , an offshoot from Partners in Prevention, received a \$39,224 award from the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE). With Northeastern as the lead institution, the consortium will develop alcohol and drug prevention information and training programs. Other consor- tium members are: Chicago State, Governors State, Depaul and Loyola Universities; Indiana University Northwest (Gary), University of Illinois-Chicago, Oakton Community College, St. Augustine, Harper, Morton, Mundelein, and Prairie State Colleges.
