

IAZZETTO LECTURE TO BEGIN "TUESDAY TALKS" SERIES

Several Northeastern faculty members will be on foreign assignments this term, including three Fulbright recipients: **Rory D. Donnelly**, associate professor, linguistics, on Fulbright scholarship, to lecture on English as a Foreign Language at the National Pedagogical Institute, Budapest, Hungary, January-June; **John P. Maher**, professor, linguistics, on a Fulbright, to lecture on English grammar at Edvard Kardelj University of Ljubljana, Yugoslavia, February-June; **Ignacio J. Mendez**, associate professor, history, on a Fulbright, to lecture on U.S. Diplomatic History at National University of Lujan, Lujan, Argentina; April-June. **Joseph C. Morton**, professor, history, in the Exchange Professorship Program, goes to Nanjing University, Nanjing, Peoples Republic of China, February-June.

Erick Howenstine, who joined the Department of Geography and Environmental Studies as a Visiting Lecturer in September 1989, began his tenure track appointment as Assistant Professor, effective January 1, 1990. Previously, Howenstine was a Teaching Assistant at the University of Washington. He earned his M.A. in Communications and Geography at Southern Illinois University, and he was recently awarded his Ph.D. in geography at the University of Washington. He has had articles published in several academic journals. Howenstine's office is located in S-344A, ext. 2617. . . . **Narendar Rao** has been appointed an assistant professor in the Department of Accounting, Business Law, and Finance, effective January 1, 1990. Rao was a teaching/research assistant in the Department of Finance at the University of Cincinnati. He has co-authored several articles in academic publications. The Civil Service Employee Excellence Award Selection Committee has chosen Judy R. Cascone, Personnel Assistant III, Personnel Department, for the January employee of the month award. Cascone has worked in Personnel at Northeastern since 1984 and has been the university's Testing Officer since April 1, 1987. She schedules, administers and grades the Civil Service exams (more than 1000 every year) and maintains all testing records. The testing officer is one of the first persons applicants meet at the university. Nominators rated Cascone as an outstanding representative for the university because of her courteous, friendly and helpful presence administering tests, and they see her as "an inspiration to all of us in Civil Service."
