On Thursday, February 1, **President Lamb** participated in a luncheon meeting with nine faculty members. The faculty discussed a variety of issues including improving the writing and computing skills of the students, continuing to find ways to work with less well-prepared students so they can achieve at the baccalaureate level, ways of assessing student achievement, value-added concept, and the application of academic standards. In a discussion about the strengths of the university, the culturally heterogenous character of our students and faculty was presented as the foundation for an inter-disciplinary, multi-cultural research and consultation center to consider the many problems of a pluralistic society. Dr. Lamb responded positively and requested an outline of the proposal. The faculty expressed appreciation to President Lamb for his cooperation with designing the new academic calendar. All agreed that the meeting had been fruitful as part of the efforts to strengthen the faculty/administration relationship, and a second luncheon meeting with faculty representatives has been scheduled in the latter part of March.
