The university recently received a \$205,000 grant from the National Science Foundation which will be used to fund a 23-month program directed by Fred Flener, professor, Curriculum and Instruction. The new program, "A Collaborative Mathematics Institute for Urban High School Teachers and At-Risk Gifted Students," is designed to help improve the quality of mathematics instruction in urban high schools and involve talented, at-risk urban students in a rigorous mathematics enrichment program. The institutes will be held at the Illinois Mathematics and Science Academy in Aurora and most participants will reside at the residential campus during the three-week institutes.
