COLLEGE OF EDUCATION BRINGS PEOPLE TOGETHER TO DISCUSS BILINGUAL EDUCATION

"Bringing People Together," the Citywide Bilingual Education Conference, brought more than 500 bilingual, ESL, and Special Ed bilingual teachers, administrators and parents to Northeastern on Friday and Saturday, May 10-11, to learn ways of improving the educational opportunities of minority youth in Chicago. Planned and co-sponsored by Northeastern's College of Education and the Chicago Public Schools' Department of Language and Cultural Education, the conference brought teachers, administrators and parents together to improve the educational opportunities of minorities in Chicago. Ahmed A. Fareed, dean of the College of Education, gave a Special Address, "Global Education: Preparing Our Students for the 21st Century," on Friday. Northeastern's Rita Brusca, Special Education, Edward Odisho and Maria Korkatsch-Groszko, Curriculum and Instruction, served on the conference's planning committee and led workshops. Other Northeastern faculty who led workshops were Harvey Barrett, Curriculum and Instruction, Rory Donnelly, Linguistics, Ellen Fiedler, Special Education, Myma Knepler, Linguistics, and Rodolfo Vilaro, Curriculum and Instruction. Linguistics grad student, Debbie Chan, also led a workshop. Janet Nolan, manager, Department of Language and Cultural Education for the Chicago Public Schools, reported that the audiences were very enthusiastic and many teachers stayed later to brainstorm. She heard many comment that it was nice to have the conference at a university that supports bilingual education.

NORTHEASTERN HOSTS CONFERENCE ON UNDERSERVED GIFTED POPULATION Meanwhile, the 1991 Conference on Underserved Gifted Populations, which was also planned and sponsored by Northeastern's College of Education, had just concluded on Thursday, May 9. The conference focused on advancing the on-going effort related to finding and serving underserved gifted students, especially those from minority or economically disadvantaged populations. Its featured speaker was Philip A. Perrone, professor of Counseling Psychology, University of Wisconsin at Madison, a noted authority on minority and economically disadvantaged gifted students. Approximately 60 classroom and gifted teachers, program coordinators and other professionals in gifted programs from across the state attended the one-day conference. Conference organizer Ellen Fiedler, Special Education, gave the introductory speech and Dean Ahmed Fareed gave the welcoming address. Fiedler reports that interest was so great that everybody stayed on long after the scheduled times of the panel discussions, led by Prof. Perrone and local educators of the gifted. The conference was co-sponsored by the Illinois State Board of Education.

UNIVERSITY HONORS WARREN BACON



On Saturday, June 15, the Northeastern Illinois University Foundation will pay tribute to an outstanding community and education reform leader, **Warren H. Bacon**, at its Fourth Annual Recognition Dinner in the Grand Ballroom of the O'Hare Marriott. Seriously ill when he was selected for the award, Bacon passed away on May 29, 1991. The evening will be a celebration of his life and achievements. A part of the proceeds from the dinner will go toward an annual scholarship in his name.

Mr. Bacon is well known for his long history of exemplary leadership in civic and community affairs and for his contributions to public education. He served from 1985-90 as president of Chicago United, Inc., a multi-racial consortium of business and professional leaders working to promote positive economic and social changes in Chicago. Mr. Bacon also served with distinction for ten years (1963-73) as a member of the Chicago Board of Education. He had been a member of the education committees of the American Iron and Steel Institute and the Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry. A Chicago native, Bacon held an M.B.A. from the University of Chicago and a B.A. from Roosevelt University.
