



### NATIONAL EDUCATION REFORM CONFERENCE AT NEIU, OCTOBER 24-25

Northeastern will host a national invitational conference of business leaders and university presidents, education deans and liberal arts deans to explore the issues of teacher recruiting, training and professional development. Entitled "Developing University-Business Partnerships for Restructuring Teacher



Education," the conference is the start of a three-year effort at Northeastern to create and introduce new strategies and models which can be put into immediate pilot practice at the participating institutions. It should have a significant input on how teachers are prepared for the rapidly changing classrooms of today and tomorrow.

The meetings will be held October 24-25 at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Deerfield. President Gordon H. Lamb will welcome the business and education leaders to the opening session at 9:00 a.m. on Thursday, October 24. Among the distinguished speakers will be Elena Laskaya, the Deputy Minister of Education for International Relations of the Republic of Russia. Laskaya will speak on the future of education in Russia and prospects for mutual cooperation. Other speakers will include: Ed Fiske, author of Smart Schools, Smart Kids; Ed Bales, Director of Education, Motorola Corporation; Phyllis Edmundson, Professor of Education, Boise State University, and Consultant to the National Network for Educational Renewal: Robert Galvin, Chairman of the Executive Committee, Motorala; and Joe Batten, CEO of the Batten Group and author of Tough Minded Leadership and Tough Minded Parenting.

A Gallup poll on business attitudes and opinions about teachers, their roles and teacher education will be one of the tools used by the participants; the results of the survey of 200 CEOs will be released shortly before the conference.

### NORTHEASTERN CHOSEN TO RECEIVE CONTEMPORARY MUSIC COLLECTION

Teachers and students of stringed instruments will have an important new resource for 20th century string music this fall when the Ronald Williams Library dedicates the Margaret Farish Collection of contemporary string solo and chamber music for students on Sunday, November 3, at 1:30 p.m. It will be the area's only fully accessible repository of 20th century string music for students.

Margaret Farish is a nationally recognized authority on string instruction and editor of the authoritative bibliographies "String Music in Print" and "Orchestral Music in Print." Made up of more than 120 pieces of sheet music for students playing from

the elementary through advanced level, Farish notes that she will continue to add music to the collection as it's made available to her. Among the composers represented in the collection are Alan Schuman, Richard Wernick and Ralph Shapey, first prize winner in the 1990 Kennedy Center Friedheim Competition for his "Concerto for Cello, Piano and String."

"Northeastern and all of metropolitan Chicago are receiving an extraordinary gift in this new collection," says Sylvie Koval, Music. Farish and Sylvie Koval are coordinators of the Teacher-Composer Alliance of the Chicago area American String Teachers Association, which provides new ensemble music for young stu-

dents. Participating students perform a festival concert of new compositions each year.

The new Publication Standards process has required some changes in the way University Relations handles requests for

Therefore, effective immediately, the requesting department must have the content written, and have signed approval of the appropriate dean to proceed with the project before University Relations can begin work. Also, all projects must be registered through the Director, Marti Sladek: the Assistant Director, Sheila Rotman; or the Publications Editor, Terry Katz. The department is located on the fourth floor of the Sachs Administrative Building, ext. 3291. Adherence to these procedures will avoid unnecessary delays and expenses once a project is underway, and help us improve the quality, cohesiveness and cost effectiveness of the university's marketing efforts.
