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

### NEIU PARTNERSHIP WINS ISBE AWARD

Northeastern and the Northside Learning Center (NLC), a Chicago public high school for cognitively disabled students, were chosen to receive a 1993 Exemplary Award from the Illinois State Board of Education in their Business-Education Partnership Recognition Program. Our partnership was selected from among the more than 100 nominations received and was recognized at the awards ceremony of the Second Annual Illinois State Council on **Business-Education** Partnerships Conference on February 1 in Chicago. TheNEIU/NLC partnership programs were showcased at the conference on the following day.

The NEIU-Northside partnership training program for the special education students was started in 1983. William Smith and the NLC teaching staff have worked with Rita Brusca, Special Education, and other NEIU coordinators from the Special Education Department on a variety of projects through the years including field experiences, practice teaching, educational testing, and practicum experience for NEIU students. In addition to a variety of instructional trips and leisure activities at Northeastern, NLC students have benefitted from many vocational and community based endeavors. The

NEIU cafeteria, Special Ed department, and Library serve as work training sites on a daily basis for nine NLC students. NLC students also learn to use computers, rearrange and care for plants in university offices, and participate in a fitness program at the Physical Education Complex.

### UNIVERSITY TO HOST CHICAGO SCHOOL REFORM CONFERENCE FEB. 22


Local School Council (LSC) members from the Northwest Side, as well as parents, teachers, principals, and community leaders, will learn from the success of other LSCs at a School Change Conference on February 22 from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. in room 217 of the Commuter Center.

Co-sponsored by Northeastern, the North River Commission, the Publicity Club of Chicago, and Roosevelt High School, the meeting will feature LSC programs that demonstrate successful change. These mini case histories show LSCs solving tough problems such as budgeting and reforming the curriculum. The February 22 session includes workshops, exercises and a survey. Between February 22 and a second meeting on March 22, attendees will complete the survey. Workshops in the second meeting will show LSC members how to move from survey results to a plan and successful action.

Ana Carlo Benson, of Roosevelt High's LSC, Wendy Jo Harmston, education coordinator, the North River Commission, and Jeanne Baxter, NEIU Dept. of Educational Foundations, will help participants set goals and objectives. ### NEIU TO PRESENT FIRST ANNUAL STUDENT RESEARCH SYMPOSIUM

On Friday, April 16, Northeastern will hold its first annual Student Research Symposium. NEIU undergraduate and graduate students engaged in research and other creative activities will have an opportunity to interact with each other and present their works before an audience of their peers. The experience will be useful for students who will make presenta-



tions in the future at state, regional and national conferences. The symposium will serve to enhance communication in the area of student research among the colleges. It will also create a research atmosphere at

Northeastern that may help in promoting different sorts of academic interactions among students themselves as well as with their instructors.

The symposium steering committee is asking faculty members to encourage their undergraduate and graduate students who are engaged in research and creative activities to plan on presenting the results of their work at the symposium. The committee is also asking faculty members to encourage students who are not presently involved in research to attend the symposium.

#### STUDENT WINS TOP CPA AWARD

Yerachmiel Weinstein, NEIU student-at-large, has won the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants' Elijah Watt Sells Award for top performance on all four sections of the Uniform Certified Public Accountant Examination at one time. Weinstein, a returning adult student, earned a degree elsewhere and came to NEIU to prepare for the CPA examination, as a student-at-large. He has been accepted to the NEIU MBA program. His was the second highest score in the state, making him one of only 145 individuals out of approximately 65,000 test-takers nationwide to receive this honor.

Brusca received a grant from the U.S. Dept. of Education for a project to train 30 bilingual teacher aides as special educators.

#### A Report on DARIC

The Department of Curriculum & Instruction has formed an Academic/Research Interaction Committee (DARIC) to promote the exchange of research and academic experiences among its faculty. So far, DARIC has held three successful meetings during which Janet Bercik, Beverly Otto, Elizabeth Landerholm and Edward Odisho conducted presentations.

Work is already in progress to broaden the scope of this committee to include all College of Education departments and programs.

"Interagency Collaboration: Rationale, Barriers, and Implementation," an article by **BARBARA LOWENTH-AL**, Special Education, was published in *Infant-Toddler Intervention*. J. FRED MACDONALD, History, has received extensive publicity in New York City for his retrospective, "Changing the Picture: The Emergence of African Americans in Television," which runs Jan. 9-Mar. 28 at the American Museum of the Moving Image in Astoria (Queens). The retrospective's highlights include a leadoff seminar by MacDonald, guest curator, and later seminars with black notables (actors Diahann Carroll and Malcolm-Jamal Warner, writer-director Melvin Van Peebles, producer William Greaves), and numerous screenings of TV shows from the

medium's 45year history, including many shows never seen on television. MacDonald was interviewed for



lengthy articles which appeared in New York Newsday and The New York Times (Metropolitan New York edition).... While in New York, MacDonald, who is also NEI-U's Distinguished Professor of the Year, appeared on the NBC-TV Today Show for his insights into the evolution in the media of baby boomers from World War II to the Clintons in the White House.

DRAGAN MILOVANOVIC, Cri-

minal Justice, has been selected for the Distinguished Achievement Award for 1992-1993 of the Division on Critical Criminology of the American Society of Criminology. The awards committee noted that Milovanovic "has easily been the most important theorist in North America to attempt to bring cutting edge Continental thought to criminology.... The Critical Criminologist, which he founded with Bernard Headley, is the most important newsletter ever in criminology." **STEVEN RIESS,** History, lectured on "Race, Ethnicity and Sport in American Society" at the Midwest Faculty Seminar, "The Cultural Work of American Sport," at the University of Chicago.

MELVIN C. TERRELL, Vice

President, Student Affairs, is editor of *Diversity, Disunity and Campus Community,* (published by the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators) a book of research articles by noted professionals in student and academic affairs in post-secondary education.
