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NEIU, EPA SIGN MEMORAN-DUM OF UNDERSTANDING

On March 3, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed between representatives of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Northeastern Illinois University. The MOU formalizes ties and sets in motion joint efforts toward several goals, such as: meeting the growing need for qualified professionals for environmental research and development programs, increasing the numbers of students, particularly minorities, electing to pursue scientific and engineering majors, and to establish and maintain an on-campus environmental program. NEIU/EPA planning so far includes such projects as:

Faculty Research Participation. Visits of NEIU faculty, staff and students to EPA facilities for consultations, meetings, workshops, short courses and research participation.

Joint Research Projects. NEIU would participate in research sponsored by EPA, which would provide technical assistance or research opportunities.

Student Internship and Employment.

There are many programs at EPA operated facilities that are designed for student research participation and training.

NEIU/EPA Staff/Faculty Appointments. NEIU will provide adjunct faculty appointments for EPA staff members who are significantly involved in this program. Guest Teachers. The EPA will provide resource persons to teach courses in computer science, biology, zoology, physical sciences, chemistry, engineering, environmental science, public finance and other courses.

Loan of Equipment. The EPA will provide excess or surplus research, scientific equipment and office furniture to Northeastern for current or planned program needs.

The NEIU representatives on the joint committee administering this program are the director of Placement; chair of Economics and Geography and Environmental Studies; two faculty members with academic interests in environmental issues, and the assistant dean of student affairs.

NEIU BUDGET PICTURE FOR 1994-95

The Governor's support of a 3.4 percent increase in North-eastern's operating budget for next year is welcome news following several lean years in a row for higher education. If approved by the General Assembly, NEIU would realize over \$1.5 million new dollars next year earmarked for program and support increases and salary increases.

Drescher, who has been involved with Northeastern's Project Success, is president of the Smith Barney Shearson foundation which funds two scholarships for NEIU students.

As in the past, proceeds from the dinner will be used to fund scholarships for minority students and research or scholarly projects for faculty. For This is the first time in memory that a Governor has recommended fully funding the Illinois Board of Higher Education's budget recommendations. Governor Edgar told educators at the March IBHE meeting that his support is in recognition of the effort by the public universities over the past two years to set priorities and redirect scarce funds to instruction.

Salary increases averaging 3.5 percent for faculty and staff have been recommended in the FY95 budget, the largest pool of funds provided by the state for salaries since 1989. For the past three years, salary money from the state has totaled 0.8 percent, compelling the universities to repeatedly reallocate to provide much-needed and deserved pay hikes.

None of the budget numbers are final until the General Assembly acts on them this spring. As you know, there is pressure for increased funding at the human service agencies this year and there is a Medicaid crisis that must be dealt with as well. But we will focus on making our case to lawmakers to preserve the budget level the Governor has recommended.

Why Can't Johnny Sit Still?

Attention-Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) is a condition that affects a large number of children and their families. This disorder is found most frequently in boys and is typically diagnosed at the outset of school. Having a child affected by ADHD can be frustrating and until proper diagnosis, very confusing. Being able to identify characteristics of ADHD and appropriate resources will help in reducing feelings of frustration.

Children affected by ADHD are inattentive and restless and may display hyperactivity. Consequently, behavioral problems quickly surface at school. Disruptive behavior including excessive talking, interrupting and non-compliance often results in a great deal of criticism and negative attention. As a result, these children may develop emotional, social, academic and family problems.

The treatment of ADHD consists of individual counseling with a strong family component and a pharmacological intervention.

If you suspect your child has ADHD, you should have him or her screened and evaluated by a professional. Additionally, there are support groups for parents of ADHD children. Your Employee Assistance Program (EAP) can discuss your options and appropriate resources to address this concern. To schedule an assessment, call (708) 590-5973 or (800) 233-4960.

Student's Campaign for **Braille Literacy Wins Award**

NEIU student Erika A. Musser has been awarded an "Illinois Reaches Out" award for her efforts in Congress and elsewhere to improve braille literacy by increasing the number of professionals qualified to teach braille. Musser, whose daughter, Heidi, also a student at NEIU, is blind, has dedicated 27 years of her life to helping the blind and visually impaired. She won the support of Senator Paul Simon and the result was federal funding to train rehabilitation professionals.

Set up to recognize Illinois citizens who have volunteered their time and talents to better their communities, Illinois Reaches Out is a joint program of First Lady Brenda Edgar and the state chambers of commerce. The Lincolnwood Chamber of Commerce nominated Musser.
