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

A tale of three conventions A look back at the GOP Convention

The Republican National Convention, held in Philadelphia in early August, showcased the GOP candidate George W. Bush and helped kick off the 2000 campaign, one with outcomes that will have crucial implications for both parties. The few television viewers who actually tuned

The conservative platform was present, but like the ever-present and controversial figures of Henry Hyde and Strom Thurmond, it was quietly pushed behind the scenes and was dealt out via TV in a heavily diluted and easy to swallow form. The convention on TV was an illusion. The real convention was happening far from the scripted speeches and handshakes, and it was much dirtier than appears on TV. I was there in Philadelphia to get a peek behind the scenes


I was selected by Northeastern to represent the school in the Washington Center for Internships' Campaign 2000 program, in which students from around the country attend lectures given by big names in politics and get a chance to work very temporary convention-oriented internships with the party, the media, and other organizations. The program strives to educate students about networking and politics. 200 students were in attendance for the GOP convention. Most were die-hard Republicans, majoring in political science or communications at prestigious universities. Many were involved in their schools' student councils, some even dabbling in big

party politics. All of them seemed to be carrying Daddy's credit cards and were suffocating in a self-importance that is rarely seen in the average NEIU student. That is beside the point. Suffice it to say, that I was an exception. I am a secondary ed/ history major. I have never dabbled in politics, although I lean conservatively. Most importantly, I carried only my own credit cards. I work, pay my taxes, and, may I say, represented the unique student body of NEIU because of these things more than I thought I could when first selected.

The Convention of the Media

At events such as a political convention, the media is king. My internship appointment saw me working in the media tents outside of the First Union Center, where the convention was being held, with the tabloid-ish and right-leaning *New York Post*. My job was to answer phones and try and get the Post's society reporters into big parties and events to which they definitely were not invited.

On the first night of the convention, the city of Philadelphia hosted a media party, complete with free food, free champagne, free music, and free dancing. The

Grass just fine for cars

At the beginning of the semester, the grass just west of the child care center served a new function as temporary parking for Northeastern students and faculty. This temporary solution was the product of a parking task force, originally called to order by Vice President Melvin Terrell on March 16. Dave Jonaitis, convenor of this task force, says that it was student input at this year's University Day meetings and discussions that prompted the formation of the task force. "We have been working on this for a long time," says Jonaitis on the parking troubles. "We will not allow parking to limit or dictate the flexibility for the academic program." However, some students have come late to class simply because they could not find parking.

especially in the fall semesters. "We recognize that the number of credit hours students sign up for are becoming greater," states Jonaitis. He, however, states that hourly surveys have been performed showing that at no time was there not a space was available in some lot. In addition, enrollment numbers are growing strong according to Jonaitis; there is a growing body of students for a fixed number of spaces. Also, students will spend more time on campus for meeting, greeting and being with people, purchasing books, registering for classes, and will do things during the first few weeks of the semester that they would not do otherwise, which results in a given vehicle occupying a campus space for a longer period of time.

MSA repairs America

According to Jonaitis, this grassy lot increased parking capacity by nearly 10%, and has worked to ease parking woes. "Our number of parking complaints as registered to Student Activities are down significantly."

The task force, which included Mark Kipp of Auxiliaries, Joe Kish of Facilities Management, Public Safety Director Steve Horton, SGA President Tom Foley and others, was set up to produce "real action, not policy action" in the words of Jonaitis.

He said that the task force had to "come up with and actually propose specific recommendations to fix the problem."

As veteran students can attest, parking is very scarce during the first few weeks of a semester, Other solutions have failed, says Jonaitis. Remote lots were often too far for convenience, and any shuttles to and from the remote lots were on a fixed see Cars continued on page 4 The Muslim Students Association (MSA) hosted a "Welcome Back" luncheon September 6th, 2000. 
NEIU PRESENTS "JEWEL BOX" CONCERT SERIES FOR 2000-2001

nearly trampled on more than one occasion by reporters rushing around the unfamiliar environment to find McCain. I knew the environment very well and found the door as McCain came walking out. The reporters saw me and nearly crushed me in an effort to get a word of disgust from McCain to take back to their editors.

At an earlier McCain event the police had set up a barricade to keep reporters at bay while McCain entered the building. The reporters whined that they had the right to pass the barricades. The policeman, leaning pompously against the barricade and resting his folded arms on his belly, ignored every word. One reporter launched his wallet ten feet over the barricade, making sure his credit cards would spill out all over the place. He told the cop, "I dropped my wallet. Better move the barricade so I can get it." The cop did not say a word and did not look for one moment at the reporter, but walked calmly over to the wallet, gathered its contents into his hands and returned them to the reporter. All the while, the reporter looked for an opportunity to jump the barricade when the cop's back was turned.


Reporters will risk anything to get to a source because every day working for a paper or TV station will likely be their last. Reporters have short memories, loud biases, and very sharp teeth.

The Convention of the Politican

If reporters were treated very well, politicians were treated like gods, especially if one was from the right state. Texas, Bush's home delegation, stayed at the finest downtown hotel. Scandal-clad George Ryan and the Illinois delegation were placed far away from Bush on the outskirts of the city in the Adams Mark Hotel, where they were forced to compete with the concurrent Star Trek convention being held there. For politicians and delegates, what mattered most was how far they could get with their credentials and how

close to Bush they could stand. Bush was the sun. At least for one week, the internal bickering that dominates the Republican party was absent.

Delegates roamed the city unaware, I think, that they were indeed in a big city where crime occurs. They were targets that the pan-handlers and muggers and violent protestors took full advantage of antagonizing. Unlike the delegates, who were focused on outdoing each other's importance by displaying their credentials, I kept mine hidden while roaming around the big city, something as a Chicagoan I am more than capable of doing. On the trolley, I witnessed a man proclaiming to be from a local labor union harassing a delegate and his wife. On another ride, a group of skinheads tried to provoke fights with anyone wearing credentials. The underground trolley system was a dangerous place to be.

All over, Philadelphians felt snubbed and pushed to the side, in favor of politicos and reporters. Outside George W. Bush's hotel, the Secret Service had cordoned off an area to stop automobiles in fear of an Oklahoma City-style bombing that would possibly take out the candidate. They stood vigilant and hard, staring into their sunglasses, roasting under the hot city sun in their cheap, government-issued suits, and every once in a while talking into their wrists. A cab driver kept nearing the hotel, occasionally stopping and slowing down. He was probably just looking for fares in the busy downtown area. A Secret Service agent approached his car and warned the cabbie to stay away. There was a hint of anger in the way the cabbie sped off down the street. After all, this was his city. A few minutes later the cabbie returned, driving down the street slowly. An agent ran toward the car and, in a single motion, grabbed

Often, at parties, the big wigs stayed for only a few minutes, leaving the reporters and low-level party foot soldiers alone. I managed to elbow my way into a party in honor of area congressman Henry Hyde, given by Illinois' Senator Fitzgerald at a museum closed for the occasion. I met both men briefly and studied carefully the way they pretended, as good politician are trained, to care about what I was saying. After an hour the elite had left the room full of reporters and waiters.

The convention on TV was all about the "diverse" Republican party. I think every high-ranking minority in the party was given a few minutes on the podium. It was a parade, a puppet show where Trent Lott, Newt Gingrich, and the like were pulling the strings from behind the scenes. It was overkill, but the delegates loved every second of it. To them, the convention was a game, a party. Modern political conventions have lost their political function. The political convention of nomination is dead, and the party elite could not be happier.

The Convention of Protest

Much of the violence happened downtown at City Hall, which is a long way from the convention area at the First Union Center, but very close to many of the delegation hotels. Many delegates told me that they were scared to go outside, holding a real and justified fear that they would be prone to violence. A few delegates were robbed of their credentials as they paraded around the city dangling their tickets from their necks and some were pulled into the minor scuffles that marked the week

While the protesters did cause a bit of hassle for the delegates, they caused the most hassle to the


police. Much more violence could have occurred if not for the patience of the police, but one must ask himself if this amount of patience would be present, absent the previous week's tragedy.

Most of the protesting methods included sit-ins and lay-downs. One group advocating human rights in Guatemala painted themselves red and laid in the streets like they were dead. One by one the officers picked them up and threw their "lifeless" bodies into police vans. Groups practiced their sit-ins on the U Penn campus where I was staying, so I

constructed. The day before the convention, the police stormed into the building where the puppets were being stored, without a warrant that I know of, and seized the puppets after a long stand-off with people who were in no way planning harm.

I talked with one protestor who told me many protestors were paying off and making deals with cops to arrest them so that they could be "martyrs" for their cause and perhaps give their cause some media exposure.

The most civil protesting occurred at the Annenberg Center, the site of Ariana Huffington's Shadow Conventions. The SC's provided those without a voice in either party to speak up, but often the childishness and pettiness of protestors got the best of them and made a mockery of Huffington's experiment. It is no wonder their causes are ignored. They fail to work within the system like Jesse Jackson, one of the SC speakers who spoke of legalizing drugs and letting all drug offenders out of prison. He was met with much applause. John McCain, another SC speaker was not so lucky. Each protestor with his own cause tried to outshine the next. They screamed out during his speech hoping the large media presence would pick up on their protests and chants. One person called out on behalf of the Navajo, another begged for an answer to global warming. One man threw his sign toward the stage screaming out, "B.S.!" whenever McCain opened his mouth. McCain stopped one time

the driver by the collar, pulled him from the open window of his stillmoving cab, and pinned him to the ground. Another agent jumped into the car to be sure it stopped before any more damage was done. The agent said, "I thought I made it clear. There will be no stopping on this street."

The police and feds tried very hard to keep the delegates and residents very far from each other. This was no easy task, considering the power of labor unions and passionate liberal traditions of the city and its people.

The politicians spent the weeks avoiding the real people that they claim to represent and, instead, partied all night. There were parties with many different levels. A group of politicians would hold a very publicized party, and then invite only the very elite to more private parties.

residents of Philly. Bomb threats in the subway forced the police to clear the entire system on two occasions that I know of. Traffic was stopped on the freeways and around City Hall. Sidewalks were blocked, all clogged with protestors.

The working people of Philly could go nowhere. Many of them lashed out at protestors. The police could do little following the nationally covered mess they had just had in Philly a few weeks before when police beat down and shot a suspect while being video-taped from a news copter. They were patient (for the most part), aloof to the drama around them, and very numerous. One officer told me that all vacations were taken back and that the stations were fully staffed. On Tuesday the protests were at their peak and many protestors got into scuffles with the

always knew what would happen the next day. One group rode down the freeway in their wheelchairs. The feared Seattle-style rioting was averted, but the very same economic anarchy groups were there spraypainting messages on city property.

The police struck hard the week before the event. They were at work long before the convention, putting away potential protest leaders on what some say were trumped up charges. One group of protestors locked themselves up in a building and was constructing large protest puppets. These puppets were expected for months by Philadelphians, who seemed almost excited about them, and it was no new news that they were being

and asked if he should even continue. Huffington came out and calmed the crowd a bit and McCain continued. I understand that the news programs showed him walking offstage, but he never did. That was wishful thinking by the reporters.

I learned a great deal about people, American politics, and the media. Everything I learned could not possibly fit into one article, though I wish to share it with as many people as possible in as many ways as possible. schedule, often out of sync with the schedules of the motorists who would park there.

Anyone who comes up with their own solution of parking in the aisles or other undesignated spaces will most likely see an orange slip of paper with a fine on it for the motorist to pay - a ticket.

Some may get away with this, but only because perhaps the ticket-writers were busy with more pressing matters and did not have a chance to ticket all offenders. Parking in the aisle is illegal because of potetial obstruction of emergency vehicles.

If a firetruck needed to get close to the Fine Arts building, for example, it may not be able to maneuver through cars parked in the aisle.

Ideas for longer-term solutions include paving new surface lots or building a parking structure, states Jonaitis. Building a surface lot would cost approximately \$2,500 per space, and \$10,000 per space would be the tab for a parking structure.


The Northeastern Illinois University Job Fair was held August 30th & 31st in Village Square. Various companies were in attendance looking to recruit some of Northeastern's finest students.





It was Anthony Porter who took Sanders for a ride. I'm sure most of us remember him, one of the poster children for the anti-capital punishment cause, who was vindicated when someone else admitted to committing the crime for which Porter was convicted, the murder of a couple on August 15, 1982.

An article in the June 6th Chicago Tribune had a disturbing update to the Anthony Porter story, a story whose interest had faded since his release from jail and domestic battery charges shortly thereafter.

Sometime in May of this year, Porter sent Sanders a fax which read "I am terminating your services as my attorney . . . Thank you for your services in this matter."

This fax came before Sanders could represent Porter in the more lucrative legal work yet to come as he has already filed suit with the city on Porter's behalf for damages from his wasting fifteen years in prison for a crime he did not commit. This work could yield potential millions for the former convict, a cut of which would have gone to Sanders, of course.

I'm not one to champion the cause of the lawyer, believe me. I see many of them as the stereotypical, money-hungry, weasels lacking the moral sense it would take to not represent people like O.J. Simpson (Funny I should mention O.J., because Johnnie Cochran joined Porter's legal team in April last year.).

However, I believe there should be a base level of loyalty in the situation. What I mean is that Sanders should have never been cut out of the action, the civil suit he and Pincham filed that would have had a significant financial payoff for him.

According to that article in the Tribune, Sanders focused most, if not all of his energy into freeing Porter, or at least saving his life. He represented him after other attorneys refused to do so. In the process of fighting for him, Sanders neglected his practice, other clients, and mounting bills from credit cards and other creditors demanding payment of bills, many of which were attributed to the Porter case. This lawyer sacrificed a great deal for a death-row inmate.

I would imagine that after all Sanders had done for him, Porter would be more grateful. Perhaps, however, it is not his fault for firing Sanders.

An important fact that led to Porter's release was his IQ: a 51, far below average according to a doctor who examined him. It was not this fact alone that got Porter out of prison, but this fact led to a delay in his execution to hold a hearing to determine his fitness for execution. It was before the hearings that the other man confessed to the crime.

In short, not only is Porter dumb, but someone else's confession proved he didn't commit the crime for which his being dumb could have saved his life if his hearings yielded the results he hoped for.

It is based on Porter's low intelligence that I speculate why he discontinued using Sanders as his or one of his lawyers. Perhaps he is not smart enough to really appreciate what Sanders did and did not recognize exactly how he screwed Sanders by firing him. Maybe he saw a better payoff with someone like Johnnie Cochran than with someone like Sanders and thought, "No big deal." Perhaps Cochran found Porter and convinced him to dump Sanders for him, when otherwise he would not have changed lawyers. Cochran has a smooth tongue and perhaps lubricated Porter's small mind with fancy rhetoric, and Porter fell victim to the shyster who is Johnnie Cochran, similar to the way Tommy Gunn switched managers in Rocky V. Or maybe Porter is more intelligent than the I.Q. test gives him credit for. He maybe saw the better payoff with Cochran, recognized what Sanders did and how he would have screwed him by changing lawyers but simply did not care and was only concerned with money.



Other Ones take it Further than they should

EAST TROY, Wisconsin Roaming reporter Joe Kelly is back from the "Dead" to cover this year's edition of the fifth season of the Further Festival. It has been two long years since Bob Weir of Grateful Dead fame and his traveling band of musicians have graced the stage at the Alpine Valley ski resort in southern Wisconsin. Last year's Further Festival skipped over both Alpine Valley and the New World Amphitheater, going straight east to Deer Creek in Indiana, much to the disappointment of Chicagoland Bob Weir enthusiasts. This year, the Further Festival returned to it's home in America's Dairy Land, only to disappoint Chicagoland Bob Weir enthusiasts all over again.

Friday, September 1st was a beautiful, sunny day with temperatures reaching the high 90's. The day started off just the same as any other day of fun and great music at a Bob Weir performance; coolers full of beer, tape decks full of bootlegs, and floppy hats full of shaggy hair filling the cars on the long drive up US Route 12. I passed the Volkswagen busses on their way to the show from the previous stop on

the tour, and of course, cops in posses sat on the Wisconsin/Illinois border, just waiting to bust a careless perp.

The parking lot possessed a carnival-like atmosphere with vendors selling food, t-shirts, and semi-legal smoking devices. The main strip of the lot, known as "Shakedown Street," was as crowded as ever, and music of the Grateful Dead family could be heard through singing, car stereos, and drum circles alike. Everybody was smiling, dancing, drinking, and getting ready for the evening's lineup consisting of headliners Ziggy Marley and the Melody Makers, and of course, the Other Ones

I opted to skip the first half of the Ziggy Marley set. The sun was still high in the sky, I hadn't bought a tshirt yet, and I still had plenty of beer left that I wasn't ready to trade for a \$5 cup of watered-down Miller Genuine Draft on sale inside the show.

Once I had found a sufficient shirt at a reasonable price (after bartering with the hippie who designed it, it came to eight dollars and two bottles of beer), I was ready to find my seat in the pavilion. I made my way through the lawn area, passing up dancers and a few tired people who drank way too fast in the afternoon sun. After showing my ticket stub to the security guard, I made my way down to my fourth row-center seat (Woo-Hoo!).

Ziggy was in mid-jam, picking up right where his father Bob Marley left off on a terrific version of "Jammin." Everyone with a pair of legs was movin' to that one, swaying to the sweet reggae beat laid down by the Melody Makers. Ziggy called for some audience participation on his next song. The audience clapped along willingly, myself included, to a song that, frankly, sounded like something you might hear in Jabba the Hutt's palace. Ziggy concluded his set with a song entitled "Uncle Sam" that he claimed was being heard for the first time ever, but I have a sneaking suspicion that he made that boast at every stop along the tour.



of their performance was fog over the entranced audience. Some slight tuning, a few chord checks here and there, and we were underway in East Troy, Wisconsin.

The set opener "Jack Straw" surprised very few with Hornsby and Weir exchanging vocals. It was an explosive "Playin' in the Band" that took the crowd by storm with powerful harmonization on behalf of the entire band. The song never stopped, but instead led into a Mickey Hart original entitled "Babab Jingo." I assume there is some clause in Mickey's contract that entitles him to bore the crowd for at leas one song per evening. People didn't sit down, but everyone was there to hear Bob Weir.

The show took a surprise turn once Mickey was finished with his off-key caterwauling. Ziggy Marley joined the Other Ones and led an all-house sing along of his father's famous song "Stir it Up." From there, however, the show just didn't get any better. It breaks my heart to say it, and tears me up inside to put it in ink, but this was by far the worst Bob Weir performance I have ever witnessed. I have been to dozens of Bob Weir concerts. Whether it was with the Grateful Dead, Rat Dog, or the Other Ones, until September 1st this year, I had never walked away from Bob Weir disappointed. My opinion seemed to ring through the disappointed crowd as the flood of unsatisfied concert goers poured into the parking lot after the suspiciously short single-set show. Songs such as "Bird Song" and "Wharf Rat" were a treat to hear from the sweet voice of Jerry Garcia years ago; they just don't have the same effect coming out of Bruce Hornsby and Bobby

Weir.

Songs such as "St. Stephen" are always welcome, but grow tiresome quickly when fifteen minutes pass without a single lyric uttered. The only uplifting portion of the second half of the show was an acoustic version of the Beatles' "Blackbird" as played by Weir and Johnson, followed by a foot-stompin' drum solo featuring 30-year Grateful Dead veterans Hart and Kreutzmann, playing together for the first time since 1995.

The evening concluded with the shortest encore I have ever heard. "Johnny B. Goode" attempted to rock the house, but fell short, only to be saved by Hornsby's clownish behavior, stomping the piano keys with the heels of his feet a la Jerry Lee Lewis.

By no means will I even consider taking a pass on the next Bob Weir show that rolls through the tri-state area, but I will not lie and say that this show measured up to the standards set by Weir since 1965.

Look for Rat Dog to play the Riviera here on the North Side of Chicago come November, and hopefully redeem the image held for so many years.





At last, it was time for the Other Ones.

The audience roared and rose to their feet as the lights went down. Bob Weir (guitar, vocals), Bruce Hornsby (grand piano, accordian, vocals), Alphonso Johnson (bass, vocals), Mark Karan (guitar, vocals), Steve Kimock (guitar, vocals), Mickey Hart (drums, vocals) and Bill Kreutzman (drums) took the stage. Their presence was overwhelming, and the anticipation

Here is a preview of the many films that are coming soon to theaters around town

In September, Gwyneth Paltrow and Huey Lewis play two karaoke enthusiasts in the comedic drama Duets. The movie revolves around six strangers with a passion for karaoke who enter a \$5,000 Grand Prize Karaoke Contest in Omaha, Nebraska.

Opening on Sept. 15 is the drama Remember the Titans. It is based on the true story of a 1971 racially integrated, but polarized, high school football team in Alexandria, Virginia, and the struggle for racial equality that ensues with the hiring of a new head coach, played by Denzel Washington.

The Ladies Man, a movie based on the popular Saturday Night Live sketch by Tim Meadows, hits the screen in October. Brendan Fraser and Elizabeth Hurley star in Bedazzled, a remake of the 1968 comedy of the same name. Fraser plays a socially inept bachelor who, after being repeatedly rejected by

women, strikes a deal with the devil, played by the beguiling Hurley.

Lucky Numbers is the story of a TV weatherman, played by John Travolta, who's on the verge of financial ruin. As a result, he schemes with the TV station's lotto girl, played by Lisa Kudrow, to rig the lottery drawing. Their numbers are picked, but everything else around the two crumbles, including their getaway plan.

Joel Schumacher directs the story of a group of young men in their final stage of infantry training as they deal with their inevitable destiny of fighting in Vietnam in Tigerland.

In November, Men of Honor, another military drama, portrays Robert De Niro as a callous, angry Navy Dive School instructor who has Cuba Gooding, Jr. as a young and determined student. Gooding Jr. plays the real life character Carl Brashear, who tries to cripple the racist bureaucracy in the diving program, while simultaneously trying to become an accomplished Navy diver.

New from M. Night Shyamalan, the writer and director of The Sixth Sense, comes his latest suspense thriller, Unbreakable. The movie stars Bruce Willis as the sole survivor of a devastating train wreck and the effortlessly cool Samuel L. Jackson as a cryptic plays an advertising executive who undergoes a fluke accident that gives him the ability to read women's minds, while Hunt plays his boss with whom he falls in love with

O Brother, Where Art Thou? is the modern day story based on Homer's The Odyssey and is written by the Coen brothers and directed by Joel Coen. The film plays George Clooney, John Turturro and Tim Blake Nelson as three prison escapees from Mississippi, who find themselves in a surplus of odd adventures as they try to elude a cunning and determined lawman, played by Daniel Von Bargen.

In another provocative film, habitual Oscar contender Tom Hanks plays a sole survivor of a plane wreck who is forced into isolation on a remote tropical island in the drama Cast Away. Hanks, who originally thought of the idea for the movie, began developing a script with screenwriter William Broyles, Jr. when the two were working together on Apollo 13 more than five years ago.

Enemy at the Gates, starring Jude Law and Joseph Fiennes, is inspired by a true story of a Russian sharpshooter and his friendship with a savvy political officer. It is set to the backdrop of the siege of Stalingrad during World War II.

Don't tell me musicians don't mind. Don't even say they don't need the money. Not all of them play with Aerosmith, you know. And please, could someone tell me why I never heard people complaining about Bulls tickets being so expensive just so Ol' 23 could be paid extravagant salaries? Spectator sports would be good examples. There the people's champions get ridiculous amounts of money for little work AND the applause. Go figure.

My solution? End the tyranny of the record company. Who needs to pay \$17 for a couple of songs? Sure, let us buy tracks by the single. But let's BUY them. I don't care what the price will be, as long as it remains reasonable. I would say \$1, tops, per track. That would be easy to do over the web, it would allow for more choice and consumer discretion, but would also keep the creative spirit from atrophying in dismal starvation. If you love music, movies or games, you will realize this as the way to go.

If you like someone's music so much, why not make sure they stick around to produce more? Don't like someone's music? Avoid it, or listen to it online, at a friend's house, car, whatever. Don't get it for download's sake only. If you don't, you might end up using Napster et al to copy your own homegrown sounds. Not very nice...



A-Mays-ing Moods

Released just in time for Halloween and all those dark, gloomy yet titillating days that follow suit, Lyle Mays' latest release presents us with a highly intricate but all the same readily captivating soundscape of almost epic proportions.

Perhaps it was the deliciously gray Labor Day that just days ago came and went, but listening to Mr. Mays hit those ivories struck a major Fall-minded chord with this humble reviewer.

Anyone out there familiar with Pat Metheny's work of recent years will know Mays as the latter's trusty piano/keyboard/percussion wiz. In Solo (full title Solo Improvisations for Expanded Piano), Lyle has attempted to go at it from a totally liberated stance, and has succeeded big time. The record had no preconceived plan, harmony or composition of any kind. With the exception of two tracks, Mays simply "wrote" Solo spontaneously while sitting at the clavier.

Surprisingly enough in these non-spontaneous days, it works almost flawlessly.

The album features elements of new age and jazz-fusion that'll immediately attract fans of more modern works a la Chick Corea, Keith Jarrett and Mays' mentor Metheny. Lovers of George Winston's late 70's, early 80's season-inspired series of piano solo records will embrace Mays' latest without any hesitation.

Sonically, expect a contemplative mood to descend on you once you place this CD in the tray. Best listened to when rain, hail and fog surrounds you from all corners, Solo delivers 10 instrumental pieces of outstanding beauty, save for track number 4, The Imperative, which wants to be too many things

at once, namely improv overkill. Preceding this low point, first couple This Moment and Let Me Count The Ways have an eerily Autumnal scent to them that'll have you reaching for the sweater in no time at all. Third piece We Are All Alone not only winks at sci-fi content with its title, but sounds the part impeccably, as if it was tailormade to accompany some upcoming Hollywood opus.

Rounding off the record with style, last song Long Life puts in token duties of upholding more traditional Metheny (who also produced Solo) sentiments.

Although called a solo piano composition, the CD liberally incorporates other forms of keyboard for generating luscious, mood-setting textures and themes, bringing it closer to the likes of legendary Hollywood favorite Vangelis.

This does not detract from Mays' excellently unique release. Even if you think you'll balk at the prospect of being subjected to an hour of downtrodden emotive music please think again. You'd be surprised with the power inherent in this little number.


