

CTC Hosts Day of Professional Development for CPS Teachers

More than 500 Chicago Public School (CPS) teachers recently attended a day of professional development hosted by the College of Education's Chicago Teachers' Center (CTC). The program was held in conjunction with CTC's involvement in the Interactive Teaching & Learning (ITL) Project, a partnership between CTC and 14 Chicago public schools. The partnership was established a little over two years ago and is designed with the goal of raising student achievement levels. ITL is one of several projects funded by the Chicago Board of Education as part of its school improvement initiative.

"Education for Understanding" was the theme for the day's activities. Throughout the day, teachers attended workshops involving the contrast between knowing and understanding, and learned more about activities that provide students with opportunities for engaging in "understanding" performances. The workshops were led by College of Education and CTC faculty and included such topics as reading strategies for interactive learning, questions and questioning strategies, and understanding science.

According to Sharon Ransom, ITL Project Director feedback on the workshops was very favorable. "The workshops were designed to underline much of what we've already been working on with the teachers, and to introduce some new ideas that we'll be bringing into focus in the weeks and months to come. We're de-lighted that so many teachers were able to par-ticipate and that they found the information so helpful."

The two 8'x16' panels are now up, one on the third floor, around the corner from the Curriculum Materials desk; the other on the east wall of the fourth floor.


Spring 1997 Open House to Be Hosted by NEIU

The relationship has flourished because of the continued high quality and variety of talent that has always been offered to Northeastern audiences over the years.

The Master Class with Ray Still for Chamber Music Audience on March 7, listed above, is a recent example of Mostly Music's innovative programming, which often seems to strive to bring the audience closer to the music and to the art of performance.

Northeastern talent is usually well represented in the chamber series, which ends this season with a Gala Chamber Ensemble featuring NEIU's Allen Anderson, Phyllis Hurt, Vincent Oddo, and William Schutt, and guest artists Stephanie Meis and Gary Stucka. They will perform on Friday, April 18, at 7:30 p.m. in the Auditorium.

NCAA Certification Program

In January 1993, the NCAA membership voted to adopt legislation requiring an Athletics Certification program for all Division I institutions. Northeastern has begun its certification process by initiating the self-study portion of the program. The university community and alumni are encouraged to participate by reviewing the self-study (available in the library March 1997) and providing feedback to the steering committee. An external peer review team will visit the campus in October 1997 to verify the self-study and evaluate the institution's performance in relation to the fundamental operating principles.
