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

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Faculty of the year . . . Thompson (1977), Bernstein (1978)

Last week the Northeastern Illinois University Alumni Association proudly announced the results of the 1977-1978 faculty of the year award. The graduating seniors of their respective years elected Dr. Glen Thompson to receive the 1977 faculty member of the year award and Dr. Dorothy Bernstein to reveive the 1978 faculty member of the year award. Thompson and Bernstein are both full-time faculty members of the Special Education Department. Seven such awards have been given since 1972; four have gone to members of the Special Education Department.

Thompson, a second time winner of the award, is best known by members of the university as Chairman of the Special Education Department. He has gained the respect of the student body inside the classroom through his superior teaching technigues and outside the classroom by attending, participating, and actively supporting student activities, particularly those of the Student Council for Exceptional Children.

Bernstein's contributions to the university have been equally outstanding. She has demonstrated her superior teaching methods, and a refreshingly positive outlook on life, to her students not only in the classroom but also at Camp Do-Mor, which she ran for several years. This outdoor laboratory in learning served children with special needs at different developmental levis taking their cognitive, physical, social, and emotional development into consideration. UNI students received course credit for serving as camp counselors enhancing their Special Education traning through practical experience.

Bernstein and Thompson will

receive their awards at the annual Alumni Association Spring Thing on Monday June 5, 1977. Other presentations will be given that night by the Association, along with a concert and reception for alumns, students, faculty, staff, and the community.

Receiving a special award will be Marion Etten, director of UNI Health Services. Etten has been serving the university community continuously throughout the years, running an office that does everything from serving as a valuable source of information on health care to handling emergencies efficiently, effectively, and excellently.

Marion Holtzer, an active member of the Alumni Board of Directors will receive the Alumnus of the Year award to recognize her outstanding and continued contribution to her field and her service to the university. Joel Hall will be receiving the Alumni Merit Award for contributions in his firld and Ellen Friedmen will be awarded the Alumni Service Award for her work with the Job Network.

The Alumni Association will present the yearly student Art Purchase Award to Kathy Zellermayer to recognize her outstanding works.

The Spring Thing begins at 7 pm and admission is free.

Dr. Edgar Gangware will direct a "concert under the stars" performed by the Alumni Band and the UNI Pep Band. Gangware, UNI band director and last years recepient of the Special Award, has put together an alumni band which practices on Monday nights and is offered under the mini-u program. They performed last year for the first time at the Sprint Thing, so this concert will serve as a sort of anniversary-reunion for the group. The location of the Spring Thing will be the same as last year to be held in front of the B-hive building. The catchy yellow fliers throughout the university state "in case of snow (just kidding) the program will be moved to the auditorium"; this includes in case of rain.

The actual awards will be given out about mid-point of the concert. At that time the Alumni Board of Directors election results will be announced.

Immediately after the concert there will be a reception in the Golden Eagles Room in the Commuter Center. All are invited to attend.



suggested that they sing the finale of the play. The song is titled "Thank God".

His background in media, a Masters and Ph.D. from Northwestern University in Radio, T.V., and Film has helped him handle the success and attention he's received. He claims, "The degrees in media have been an advantage. They took away the misticism, although I don't think I would have been impressed anyway."

When asked, "What inspired you to start writing?", he replied, "A failure in everything else. I was a bad student, bad athlete, and had a bad personality." He may not continue writing. He considers himself to be "someone who writes" rather than a "writer". He writes because he has something to say, and will continue until he has nothing ore to say.

He chose to write this play when Libby Mages (the producer) came to him with the idea a year and a half ago. "Do Black Patent Leather Shoes Really Reflect Up" was chosen over the other two books because it had a number of movie offers, it was attempted before, and it lent itself to theatre.

Although John Powers has considered the idea of becoming a performer, there are no plans in his immediate future in that direction. "It demands a lifestyle I wouldn't be fond of".

His quick mind and spontaneous humor are qualities ideal for a talk show host. If Fred Silverman knew John Powers, he would have to look no further for a replacement for Johnny Carson. All of his problems would be solved. Ed McMahon wouldn't even have to change the opening introduction of "Here's Johnny".

Although his new play seems like such a sure thing, John Powers remains very realistic. "There are no such things as sure fire hits", he said.

From what I viewed last Friday at rehearsals, "Do Black Patent Leather Shoes Really Reflect Up" will not quit after the Forum Theatre. After Broadway it will hit Hollywood, and John Powers, the genius with the smart-ass smile, may one day make Northeastern famous.

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Faloona named Coach-ofthe-year


