views of unusual places to visit.

The Popular Library, located on the first floor, has books on cross-country skiing in the United States and Canada, skiing in the midwest, winter touring and guides to snow trails. There are also books on ski resorts in the United States and

Canada, including resort facilities, maps, services and other information.

The Audiovisual Center, located on the fourth floor, has a collection of audiocassettes, approximately one hour in length,

on each of the 50 states. The tapes, which include historical and geographical material, can be heard in the building or borrowed on an adult card for three weeks.

A collection of 16mm sound films, which patrons can preview on the new Cine-Scan unit, spotlight such places as Australia,

China, England, France, Germany, Ireland, Russia, Scotland and Wales. Films may be borrowed by Chicago residents only for a three-day period and a special application for film service is required.

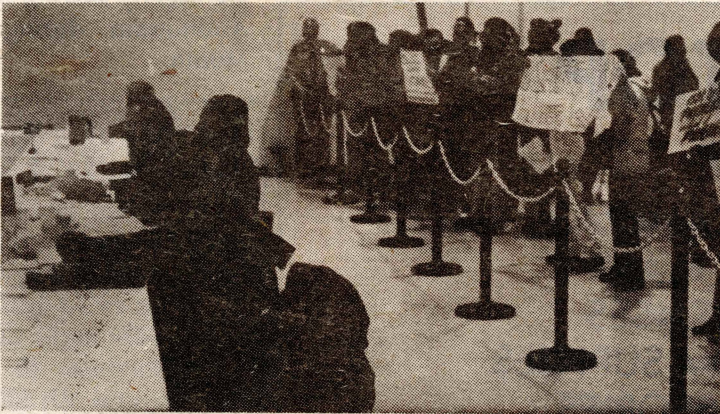
Dr. Donald E. Walters, Executive Director of the B.O.G., presented the recommendation concerning tuition for the 1982-83 academic year.

The primary reason cited for the tuition increase is low state funding.

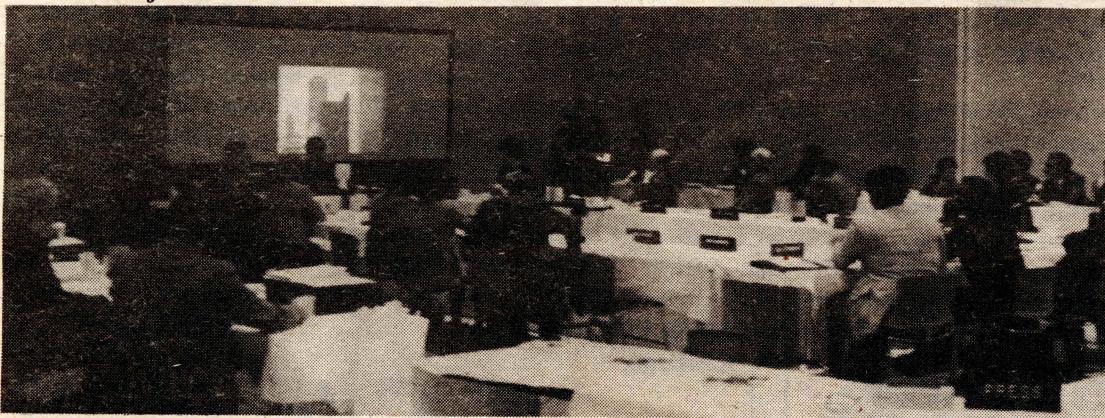
The leaders of the Progressive Student Alliance had been organizing a petition drive which was to be presented at the meeting.

Following their attendance in Alumni Hall, the student group marched through the halls shouting slogans.

New Library Theft Act

Effective January 1, 1982, library theft will be classified as a criminal offense which may be punishable by fines up to \$500 dollars or by imprisonment anywhere from six months to five years.

Public Act 82-603, enacted by the Illinois General Assembly has been amended to the "Criminal Code of 1961." It applies to all "library facilities" and describes four kinds of prohibited conduct as library theft. These include removing library materials from the premises without authorization, concealing library materials and removing them beyond a check-out station, deceptive use of a library card, and willful failure to return material which has a combined value of \$300 dollars.

Under the new act, failure to return borrowed materials is classified as a petty of-

fense. The offender may be fined up to \$500 dollars and be ordered to reimburse the library for replacement costs of the materials. Library theft which does not exceed \$300 dollars is classified as a Class A misdemeanor, and may result in imprisonment from six months to one year. Those thefts involving materials whose value exceeds \$300 is classified as a Class 3 felony and can result in imprisonment for two to five years.

Library theft has increased in recent years and the act was added because present laws make it difficult to prosecute those accused of library theft.

The act is to be posted at all service areas in the library to ensure prosecution of those accused. It is also hoped that the posting of the act will serve as a deterrent to potential thieves.

U.S. Dept. of Health & Human Services Co-Op Opportunity

DESCRIPTION:

The student will work in a position which leads to the position of Claims Representative. The position involves detail work in following up social security claims reports, and entails working directly with clients. The co-op position will begin at the clerical level (typing is not required)--Development Clerk (GS4) the second co-op term will be at the level of Service Representative and will work into the position of Data Review Technician (GS5).

Upon graduation, the successful co-op student will be eligible for claims representative training and will enter at GS7 level.

NOTE:

Several UNI students have participated in the

Co-op Program described above. All have found it very interesting, challenging, enjoyable, and valuable.

Application deadline - Dec. 18.

ELIGIBILITY:

Students must be in their junior year and have a GPA of at least 3.5 on a 5.0 scale.

Students must demonstrate the ability to work effectively with people and must have good communication skills.

All students who participate in the program will complete alternate work and school assignments of six months each. The students must complete at least two work assignments. (This means six months at full-time work, six months as a full-time student, then six months at full-time work

again, prior to graduation.)

TIME:

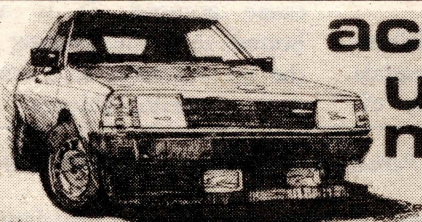
Approximately 18 months in total. During the full-time work terms, students will work full-time, five days per week for six months.

COMPENSATION:

During the work terms, students will receive full salary and benefits; during the full-time student term, students will still be covered with some of the benefit package, e.g. health insurance. Students who successfully complete the full co-op experience and who are offered positions with the agency will not have to take the PACE exam.

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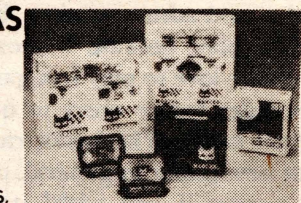
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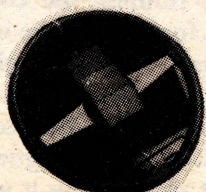
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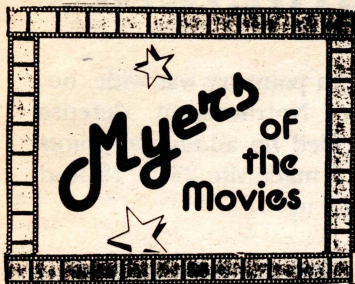
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Rich . . . Prince . . . Truffaut

The film **Rich and Famous** stars Jacqueline Bisset and Candice Bergen as two friends in college who both grow up to be authors, in competition with each other. This film has a good cast and a good director (George Cukor), and yet it still manages to be a complete disappointment. I guess they spent three million dollars on the actresses and five dollars on the script. This film is a classic example of good acting and a poor script. What a waste of talent! The script should have been put in the safe on the Titanic for safe-keeping (kept safely away from the audience that is).

The film consists mostly of a continued argument between these two women. The arguing is so intense and constant that we wonder why these two ladies were friends in the first place; and how they could possibly remain friends for more than 10 minutes. The film gets a "D". Save your money and your eardrums - and don't go.

The movie **Prince of the City** is about a New York narcotics detective. He becomes an undercover operative for the Federal

Government Narcotics Division. This new position brings him into conflict with many of his old friends on the police force, and he is constantly having to make moral judgments and decisions of great importance. Eventually, he is forced to expose some of his old friends in order to protect himself; and this leads to his isolation from the police community.

The film deals with a lot of controversial issues and some of them are interesting. However, the audience is forced to share in these moral problems, without having any power over them. This is a rather uncomfortable position for the audience to be in.

In many ways, the film is similar to the movie **Serpico** that was issued a few years ago; with the good policemen against the bad policemen. The acting of Treat Williams (as detective Danny Ciello) is exceptionally good; and well worth seeing. If you liked **Serpico**, then you will probably like this movie also. The film gets an "A".

The famous French movie director Francois Truffaut came to Chicago on November 5th in connection with the Chicago Film Festival. He brought with him the film for his latest movie **The Woman Next Door**, and two of the major stars in this movie came with him. On Friday, November 6th there was a press conference at the Mayfair Hotel

in Chicago and nearly all the of the Chicago movie critics were there to ask Mr. Truffaut about his new film, and about his amazing career.

Mr. Truffaut has directed some of the best movies ever made (**Day for Night**, **Small Change**, etc.) He has not only directed them, but he has also acted in them, and also produced some of them. What a versatile man! A director, an actor and a producer - all in one person. He has had an amazing life, and no doubt we all wish that we could be just like him.

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French Lieutenant's Woman . . . & Christmas Re-releases

French Lieutenant's Woman is an enjoyable piece of genius by Karel Reisz. The leading role is portrayed by Meryl Streep who portrays an outcast from her Victorian village for having an alleged affair with a shipwrecked frenchman. Enter Jeremy Irons who portrays an English Gentleman and scientist who becomes obsessed with "the woman" and the mystery that surrounds her. Eventually he gives up everything for her and then comes up empty handed.

The interesting thing about this film is that in the first scene we see a Dodge. They were no trucks in the 1800's but this film is two stories in one. Besides the Victorian story there is the

story of the two leads and their off camera relationship and how it parallels the story in the film. The photography in this film is outstanding along with the way the film interweaves the two story lines. The film makes a good statement on how we handle our relationships today. Definitely see **French Lieutenant's Woman**.

A few short notes: A number of films that were released this summer have been re-released for the holiday season. They deserve a second look or definitely a first if you have not seen them.

Raiders of the Lost Ark the combined talent of

George Lucas (**Star Wars**) and Steven Spielberg (**Close Encounters**) stars Harrison Ford and Karen Allen equal a movie that puts you on the edge of your seat and keeps you there right up to the end. If at all possible don't miss this one.

Arthur has Dudley Moore as a millionaire drunk playboy. Liza Minnelli's performance leaves something to be desired but John Giegud by far makes up for it, as Arthur's mentor and companion. This one is worth a few laughs.

Body Heat is an excellent cliff hanger which William Hurt gets skillfully manipulated by Kathleen Turner. It ends with a twist that you won't expect. If you

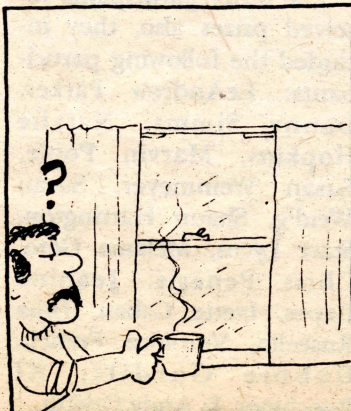
don't mind the sexual overtones, **Body Heat** is one of the year's more hopefuls.

Stir Crazy has Gene Wilder and Richard Pryor as a pair of New Yorkers who get fed up with life in the big city and move out west. But they get themselves framed for a bank robbery and get sent to the pen. Wilder's and Pryor's old gimmicks still come off fairly well. Worth a second look.

The only film I don't recommend spending money on is **Stripes** because **CCAB** will be showing it in March. Bill Murray's portrayal of Army life is not that bad until the last 1/2 hour. If you don't want to wait 3 months to see it, then go spend your money.

Head Coach Named "Coach of the Year"

Northeastern Illinois University head football coach Bill Bergman has been named the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics District 20 "Coach of the Year." In his third year as head coach at Northeastern, Bergman guided the Golden Eagles to a record of six wins, four losses and a tie, and an Illini-Badger Conference co-championship. Six Northeastern players were named to the N.A.I.A. all-district 20 teams. They are Paul Hobbs, quarterback; Byron Harrell, running back; Michael Gray, wide receiver; Tom French, guard; Chip Gatto, defensive line; and Stanford Durham de-

fensive back. Chip Gatto was the district 20 leading vote-getter for All-American honors.

Five Northeastern players were named to the Illini-Badger All-Conference team. They are Harrell, tight end Dan Trapp, offensive tackle, Darrell Traeger, Gatto, and Durham.

Golden Eagles Tie in Conference

The Northeastern football team defeated Monmouth College 23 to 12 at Monmouth, Illinois on November 7. The win gave Northeastern an overall record of six wins, three losses, and a tie. Northeastern gained a share of the Illini-Badger Conference title this weekend when Concordia College of Milwaukee defeated Milton College 14 to 13. The weeks results leaves Milton, Concordia of Milwaukee, and Northeastern all with records of three wins, one loss and a tie in the conference.

Northeastern scored in the first quarter when Paul Hobbs (Austin H.S.) scored a touchdown on a one yard run. Pat Shine (Leo H.S.) kicked the extra point to give Northeastern a 7 to 0 lead. Monmouth kicked a 30 yard field goal to make the

score 7 to 3. In the second quarter Shine kicked a 26 yard field goal to increase Northeastern's lead to 10 to 3. On the last play of the first half Monmouth kicked a 35 yard field goal to make the halftime score Northeastern 10 Monmouth 6.

Northeastern's Michael Gray (Calumet H.S.) took the second half opening kickoff and ran it all the way back for a 97 yard touchdown. Shine added the extra point to put Northeastern in front 17 to 6. Monmouth scored next on an eight yard run by their tailback, but the extra point try was not good and Northeastern held a 17 to 12 lead. Northeastern put together a 75 yard scoring drive with Hobbs scoring his second touchdown of the day on a 36 yard run. The

extra point try was wide, but the Northeastern defense yielded no additional points and made the 23 to 12 lead hold up.

Northeastern gained a total of 322 yards to Monmouth's 197 yards. Hobbs completed 9 of 16 passes for 120 yards while gaining 52 carries for Northeastern and Gray besides his 97 yard kickoff return caught four passes for 48 yards, and gained 23 yards on three carries. For Northeastern's defense Dennis Warkins (Carver H.S.) intercepted three passes, and Gualano Davis (South Shore H.S.) intercepted a pass and recovered a fumble. Chip Gatto (Prairie View H.S.) led the defense in tackles with three solos and 10 assists, seven of which were for losses.

tryouts were really tough. The first thing that she had to do was fill out an application and send it to A-Plus Talent Agency along with a picture. There were about 2,000 applicants when she tried out. Out of the 2,000

500 girls were called to tryout. The girls had to dance and were asked a lot of questions. Then the number was cut down to 100. As the tryouts continued, there were more cuts. Twenty three new

Honeybears were picked and 17 old Honeybears were picked. So the final results are as follows, out of about 2,000 applicants, 40 girls were kept! This is an example of how hard it is to make it into the squad. When asked if this was her ultimate goal, she said - "I always wanted to be a Honeybear."

When asked how long the Honeybears workout, she said that they work out for nine months out of the year.

Cindy has also had experience in modeling. She started modeling four years ago. Since then, she has done fashion shows, conventions at McCormick Place and other shows. She has also done promotions with the Sun-Times, Christian Dior and Amlings flowers. She has recently done a commercial for Goodwill Industries for jeans.

When done with school, Cindy says she would like to continue to model and to work with Jafrá products.

Basketball Team Evens Up

The Northeastern Illinois University basketball team defeated Marycrest College 100 to 84 on November 20 in Davenport, Iowa. The win evens Northeastern's record at one win and one loss.

Northeastern jumped out to an early lead behind the hot shooting of senior guard Phil Schaefer who scored 18 of his 27 points in the first half. Northeastern led at halftime 51 to 34. Marycrest never threatened the Northeastern lead in the

second half.

Other top scorers for Northeastern were Tom Horn with 20 points, William Hawkins with 14 points, and Anthony Sturdivant with 12 points. Hawkins was the leading rebounder for Northeastern with 13. Northeastern shot 58.9% from the field making 43 of 73 shots. The game was Marycrest's first of the year and gives them a record of no wins and one loss.

Gary Fencik: A Winner

Although statistically the Bears are not doing well this season, the individual efforts of some of the players are noteworthy.

One in particular is the Bears Strong Safety, Number 45, Gary Fencik. Gary joined the Bears as a free agent in 1976. He graduated from Yale where he served as a wide receiver and earned a B.A. in History.

At Yale, Gary set a record with 82 receptions for 1,435 yards and 7 touchdowns. (It since has been broken by John Spagnola.) He held the Yale records for game, season, and career receiving.

Professionally, some of Gary's past achievements are: made his first pro interception off Joe Namath; led the Bears in tackles last season for the third time in four years after finishing third behind Linebacker Jerry Muckensturm and Free Safety Doug Plank in 1979; shared the team lead with 3 fumble recoveries; had 6 double figure tackle games last year; and was voted to NFC Pro Bowl squad for the first time after the 1980 season as a back-up to Nolan Cromwell and Randy Logan. Gary entered the 1981 season with a string of 4 consecutive 100 tackle seasons. He is one to keep your eye on.
